
Come to The Shadows Open Your Heart to the Music of Grace

The Gospel: Matthew 21:1-11

When Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying,

"Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

"Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!

"When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."



Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name,



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Announcements for Sunday, April 2, 2023

- About Today's Music The offertory anthem was composed by David H. Williams, set to a text by Bishop Jeremy Taylor (1613-1667). Born in Wales, Williams emigrated to America at eighteen years of age to study music in New York City. The lowest notes of the organ's pedal division simulate Jesus' footsteps into Jerusalem. The steady crescendo of the choir and organ throughout the piece paint a palate of triumph, with shouts of hosannas from the crowd. The communion anthem is the third movement from Joseph Martin's Song of the Shadows which will be presented in its entirety on Good Friday at the 7 pm service. A native of North Carolina, he is artist in residence at Concordia University in Austin, Texas. The recessional hymn tune was written by Hans Leo Hassler in 1600 as a secular German love song. A sacred Latin text attributed to Bernard of Clairvaux (1091-1153) was later paired with the tune. J.S. Bach arranged the tune for use in his St. Matthew Passion. Bach's version, along with the 1899 English translation by Robert Bridges is what we will sing today. The postlude, based on hymn 158, was composed by blind German organist Helmut Walcha. While studying organ at the University of Leipzig, Walcha was appointed assistant organist at the Thomaskirche (where J.S. Bach was organist). He recorded Bach's entire keyboard compositions twice, by memory. They have both recently been digitally remastered.
