The Gospel: Mark 11:1-11

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.
People **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, “Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, ‘Why are you doing this?’ just say this, ‘The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.’” They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, “What are you doing, untying the colt?” They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

“Hosanna!
Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!
Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David!
Hosanna in the highest heaven!”

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.



Because we will have the Passion reading of Jesus’ journey to the cross and crucifixion on Good Friday and the choral offering of the Crucifixion Cantata that evening, this Palm Sunday Service will be centered on Jesus’s entry into Jerusalem as the beginning of Holy Week.





The Gospel: Mark 14:1-9

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.
People **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

It was two days before the Passover and the festival of Unleavened Bread. The chief priests and the scribes were looking for a way to arrest Jesus by stealth and

kill him; for they said, “Not during the festival, or there may be a riot among the people.”

While he was at Bethany in the house of Simon the leper, as he sat at the table, a woman came with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment of nard, and she broke open the jar and poured the ointment on his head. But some were there who said to one another in anger, “Why was the ointment wasted in this way? For this ointment could have been sold for more than three hundred denarii, and the money given to the poor.” And they scolded her. But Jesus said, “Let her alone; why do you trouble her? She has performed a good service for me. For you always have the poor with you, and you can show kindness to them whenever you wish; but you will not always have me. She has done what she could; she has anointed my body beforehand for its burial. Truly I tell you, wherever the good news is proclaimed in the whole world, what she has done will be told in remembrance of her.”

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

- **About Today's Music** The offertory anthem is an arrangement of the African-American Spiritual *Ride on, King Jesus* by composer Howard Helvey (b.1968). A composer, pianist, choral clinician, and arranger, Helvey serves as organist at choir master at the historic Calvary Episcopal Church in Cincinnati, Ohio. His works have been featured at Carnegie Hall, the White House, Westminster Abbey, National Cathedral, and St. Patrick's Cathedrals in Dublin and NYC. *Nolo mortem peccatoris* is the first line of a macaronic poem by John Redford (c.1500-1547), and assumed to have been set to music by Thomas Morley (1557-1602). Morley succeeded Redford as organist at St. Paul's Cathedral, London; the original twenty-three verse poem was signed by Redford, but the earliest known music score was unsigned. The Latin recurring line throughout the anthem reads: Nolo mortem peccatoris; haec sunt verba Salvatoris. This may be be translated as: I do not want the death of a sinner: these are the words of the Savior. Redford's poem tells the story of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, with Jesus speaking in the first person. Last Sunday we heard the chorale prelude on *Da Jesus an dem kreuze stund* (*As Jesus hung on the cross*) by Johann Pachelbel, with the chorale melody boldly sounding on the organ pedal reeds. Today we will hear the same chorale prelude as arranged by J.S. Bach (1685-1750), one of the Lenten chorales in the *Orgelbüchlein* (BWV 621). In contrast to Pachelbel, Bach accompanies the melody with gently flowing and descending lines played on the organ's clearest and most articulate Koppelflote in the choir division. Throughout the piece, the inner voices and pedal line descend to resolution in the final chord: Bach's imagery of Christ as he takes his last breaths on the cross.


