Jesus said, “This is my commandment: Love one another as I have loved you.” (Jn 15:12). There is a tendency to interpret Jesus’ commandment almost too literally and feel He is asking too much of us. Although throughout time many have indeed taken Jesus’ words literally and accepted the gift of martyrdom, most of us do not envision or own martyrdom as a desirable path to heaven.
