HONOR SOCIETIES

There will be a combined induction ceremony on Tuesday, April 30 from 6:00-7:30pm in the Commons, and each inductee is welcome to bring 2-3 guests.

VOLUNTEER HOURS

Students in the Bellevue School District must earn a minimum of 40 hours of community service to receive a diploma. They may begin accruing these hours after 8th grade.

Hours are recorded in x2Vol. To log them, open Naviance through your student portal. Scroll down to the bottom right and click x2Vol. Many students have reported this has been glitching lately, so please give it a second or third try if at first you don't succeed. You're going to enter a "Personal Project" and it's vital that you have a contact name and email address for the person who can confirm your volunteer work. An email will be sent to this contact automatically as soon as you submit. Sometimes these end up in junk folder or are overlooked because recipient doesn't recognize sender (it might be "Volunteer Verification", IntelliVol, or x2Vol). **IMPORTANT:** send the sender a personal email notifying them of the expected email and its importance. **VERY important:** under the GOALS section, choose the 40-hour graduation goal. If your hours aren't verified within a week or so, follow up. Don't worry if your hours are verified but not approved. Katherine Parkin, our Registrar, reviews verified hours once a month. Hours served beyond 40 do not need to be entered in x2Vol. Consider creating a list or resume to track hours beyond 40 for use when you are completing college, award, and scholarship applications.

- NAVIANCE
 - Be in the know! Confirm parent emails in Naviance are correct to receive my weekly newsletter to 11th and 12th graders and parents next year.
 - Use Naviance to sign up for college visits in 11th grade! 5 allowed, only with teacher permission
 - Create a college list! Mark Moody's Q+D, BigFuture (College Board), and Naviance can be used to begin building a list of schools to research. Add them to "I'm Thinking About" in Naviance and receive info about those schools, including when their visit at IS is scheduled.
- ACT and SAT. A plan that has worked well for most IS students is to take the ACT in Feb and the SAT in Dec/Mar of junior year. Registering early for exams increases your likelihood of testing closer to home (some have driven to Puyallup!) One successful strategy is to study intensively for approximately 8 weeks immediately before the exam. Practice tests are available online, from books, or in testing centers. Free opportunities are out there. If interested, there are two PTSA-sponsored practice events next month:
 - May 11 – ACT or SAT @ Bellevue HS for \$35. Princeton Review
 - May 18 – Combined ACT/SAT @ Issaquah HS for \$25. Kaplan.
- College Visits! Learn more about colleges by visiting campus and attending college events. If you have time, register for a college tour. Your name on their records is considered "demonstrated interest" and might influence the school to be more inclined to accept your application. Now is a great time to get a feel for the differences between big vs. small; public vs. private; rural vs. urban campuses. We have all of those within a 2-hour drive of International School.
- Be aware: April 1st was the deadline for colleges to notify students of their decisions, and students must decide by May 1st.
- Learn about financial planning for college. The Class of 2021's FAFSA opens 10/1/2020 and will use your 2018 tax return.
- Summer pre-college program info is available on college websites and some posters are in the connecting hallway on the College Visits bulletin board.

AP EXAMS

Most of our sophomores will take their first AP exam this year. This can be unsettling for students and parents alike. I remember feeling out of the loop on this, while my child seemed in the know. Please make yourself aware of the [national testing schedule](#) and when your student will be testing. Healthy strategies for success include a balanced dinner and good rest the night before the exam followed by a good breakfast and timely arrival with allowed supplies on the day of the exam.

To provide the best testing environment, some of our tests are administered at the Wilburton Instructional Service Center (WISC). WISC is located at 12241 Main St, Bellevue 98005 and students are responsible for their own transportation.

AP BIOLOGY: Report to WISC at 7:30am on Monday, May 13th to take AP Biology.

AP WORLD HISTORY: Report to International School's book room, across from Janet Towne and Jen Sorenson's classrooms at 7:30am on Thursday, May 16th. Students will leave backpacks, including phones, in the secured book room then proceed into the library with snacks and water bottles.

I know we haven't even begun testing for this year, but I want to give you a heads up that next year College Board's AP Exams will be ordered in the fall 2019, probably October, via a new registration and ordering system. For more information, visit collegeboard.org/ap2019.

Why take exams?

1. It's a low stakes exam. You are the only one who sees your score, and you may *choose* to send it to colleges.
2. Earn college credit for \$94, potentially saving thousands
 - a. Potential for priority course registration in college
 - b. Meet prerequisite or general education requirements, allowing to take higher level or more interesting class
 - c. Graduate early or have a cushion if need to drop a class
 - d. Meet graduate school prerequisite
3. Build testing endurance prior to sitting for ACT and/or SAT
4. Many teachers require an alternate in-class exam to those who don't sit for AP exam, so you'll be tested either way.
5. Show off the knowledge you gained this year!

SENIOR PROJECT

YOU'RE INVITED! Students at International School complete an extensive capstone Senior Project which involves deep learning in an area of student choice, internships, community service, and assessment by an expert panel. A major component of this project is the presentation. CBC is tentatively scheduled for August 17-21, 2020 to coincide with Back to Business day and prior to fall sports tryouts.
