A Message from Our Pastor, the Rev. Amy Gopp



Beloved of God,

Though we may try, none of us can make sense of a novel coronavirus that has wreaked havoc on all our lives. Almost every aspect of our daily lives has changed. We have adapted and adjusted, twisted and turned, compromised and converted. Uncertainty and confusion have led to anxiety, stress and depression. While some of us are isolated in our homes, all of us are isolated from the life we once knew. Mentions of a so-called "new normal" seem premature as we can only continue to navigate uncharted and very dangerous waters.

I honor the range of emotions you are experiencing. And I hope you allow yourself to feel what you are feeling—no judgment, no critique, no denial, no repression. Just feel what you feel by giving yourself permission to ride this roller coaster range of emotions we are all on. Find comfort in knowing that we are all strapped into this roller coaster ride together—even if apart.

Our COVID Advisory Team, comprised of health care professionals and a member of our Safety Committee, is to be greatly commended by the diligent, thoughtful and conscientious work they have done to ensure the safety, health and well-being of our community. They spent months tracking data, monitoring statistics, consulting other churches and organizations and praying for the wisdom to make recommendations in the best interest of everyone. Their recommendations were unanimously approved by our Council.

Thus, we forge ahead, dear friends, worshiping, studying, serving and gathering online, grateful for the technology that enables us to do so. As the summer comes to an end and the daylight lessens, the heat of the sun softens, and autumn ushers in a new season, let us enter it with wonderment. Let us begin this fall with a renewed sense of all that just may be possible in what feels like an impossible time. As resurrection people who expect life after death, don't we see the light, even dimly, at the end of this seemingly endless tunnel? As recipients of the Holy

Spirit, do we not also recall that "we are not mandated to live within the confines of modern rationality" as theologian Walter Brueggemann puts it...?

For even at such a time as this, we are called to bear witness to what is, but also to what will be. We live in the now *and* the not yet. And I invite you to sit with God, right now, and listen for God's voice. Be still. Listen for all that is possible in this season of wonderment. For even in the midst of the difficult decisions, the confusion and chaos, the risks and deep fear—God is here, present, inviting us to be still and know that God is with us.

Let us bear witness to the power of God to sustain and connect us—no matter how far apart we may be or feel. In this season of both sorrow and hope, my prayer is that we continue to feel what we need to feel while also exploring the possibilities within us and within all of humanity for what could be. Beloved, God is with us and God is for us. And through it all, know that I am here for you, too.

Moderator's Message – Jaime Baughman

Dear Friends,

It's difficult to comprehend we have had more than five months of Pandemic-enforced separation. Now, fall is in the air! The end of summer certainly forces decisions for our schools, our community and our congregation.

I cannot begin to tell you how grateful I am to our COVID-19 Advisory Team: church members Josh Case, Jim Dunlap, Heather Lohman, Felicia Lumpkin and Kim Redman. Their counsel proved critical as they reviewed risk-assessment charts and our own building limitations, CDC guidelines, Ohio's case numbers and recommendations from our own UCC Living Waters Association. Especially valuable has been their own personal experience as many work on the front lines of this health crisis.

The Advisory Team presented their recommendations to council at a Zoom meeting on Tuesday, August 18.

Based on their report and recommendations, **Council voted to continue virtual worship service through Sunday**, **January 3**, **2021**, barring any significant change to Ohio's numbers. I know this may come as a disappointment to many of you. Trust me, there is nothing I would like more than to see us all together in the Sanctuary on a Sunday morning. However, the safety, health and well-being of our congregation is our first priority.

We are blessed to have the tremendous leadership and spiritual guidance of Pastor Amy, who amazes me each Sunday with creative and meaningful worship services delivered safely via the

KUCC's YouTube channel. What's also amazing is the number of people tuning in. Since June 6, we have averaged 197 viewers for each summer worship service.

We have proven through the previous months we can continue to be the church – even when we are not worshipping together in a building. Our care for each other and those in our community is ongoing. And, thanks to Pastor Amy and Kim, Minister of Faith Formation, there have been a variety of spiritual and educational opportunities for all ages, with more to come. I never thought I would say this but, thank God for technology!

A Phase 2 plan of reopening also was approved by Council and will take affect when Ohio's daily case count has decreased consistently over a two-week period. Until then, we will continue to operate under the guidelines identified in our Phase 1 of reopening in which the building remains closed to all regular activity with the exception of weddings or memorial services for 10 or less people. Under Phase 1, groups are encouraged to continue to meet via zoom, or in socially distanced outdoor gatherings.

Phase 2 will allow for general indoor gatherings of 10 or less, scheduled through the church office and coordinated by a designated group leader. A written contract between the designated leader and the church will spell out the COVID protocols and responsibilities that <u>must</u> be followed while inside the church building. However, groups that are able are encouraged to continue to meet via zoom.

Council also voted on a few exceptions to our Phase 1. We will allow voting in our building on November 3, and have granted some limited, designated bathroom use for approved groups currently meeting on our lawn. Our staff will continue to work primarily from home, accessing the building when necessary.

So, let's do our part in reducing Ohio's daily case count. Please wear your masks, and practice social distancing. Be safe my friends.

We will worship in person together again.

Hungerford Tapestry Update



Last summer, Ellen Hogarty invited Professor Melissa Campbell to inspect the deteriorating condition of her grandmother's tapestry created in 1974 to cover the center section of organ pipes for the church's new Holtkamp organ. Following approvals of church committees, Melissa was invited to clean and restore the "Hungerford Tapestry." The task could not have been in better hands. Melissa is an internationally recognized fiber artist and currently serves as a faculty member of KSU's School of Fashion. Her weavings and textile designs have been exhibited in different venues in Europe and Asia and the U.S. Her brief report on the meaning of Irene's work and the process she followed in restoring it reflects her deep appreciation for the creative work of a fellow textile artist and its place at Kent UCC. We look forward to enjoying the renovated tapestry when sanctuary worship resumes!

It has been my pleasure to perform some 20 hours of conservation work on the Hungerford Tapestry. When Ellen Hogarty first contacted me regarding the tapestry, I was not sure I would be able to be of assistance, but after spending some time with it and learning more about Irene, I could see it was a work that had been carefully designed for that specific place by a person who was much loved and fondly remembered and that the repair work it needed fell within my specific area of fiber art knowledge.

As I became more familiar with the tapestry my admiration for the skill and creativity of Irene

Hungerford grew. The space within the organ needed a very specific type of installation, and it was clear to see that Irene had put a great deal of thought and planning into the project. She engineered a piece that could be installed within that space's unique restrictions and limited accessibility. She also took into consideration the surrounding materials, the beautiful wood, metal and stone and designed a tapestry with a pattern that complemented those elements. Irene's main challenge was to create a piece that had to play several parts; it had to blend well with the interior of the chancel, hide the inner workings of the organ,



and hang in a very high profile position right behind the cross without pulling all of focus to itself. Her design had to be one that could play all its roles and quietly, just hold the space.

My first impression of the tapestry took place in August of 2019, and it left me with the impression that it would only need a deep cleaning and some tension adjustments. Over the next 10 months permissions were obtained to begin repairs. Subsequent inspections showed that in addition to years of dust buildup there was damage from some mishandling and a need to completely replace all the gold threads that were rhythmically distributed throughout the piece. During the months of June and July this year, 20 hours of cleaning, thread replacement, and tension adjustments returned the tapestry to its wonderful self. In addition, with an eye to keeping costs at a minimum, this project relied heavily on the enthusiasm and generosity of a crew of volunteers: Kirk and Shawn Gordon, my husband J R. Campbell, John Hetrick, Pat Ray, and Kim Sebaly. As a crew they climbed ladders, slung ropes, and crewed fantastically to safely remove and then re-install Irene's beautiful work.

Time Capsule Project Begins - Jaime Baughman, Bicentennial Chairperson

We are living in challenging, changing and interesting times, and it comes on the heels of our 200th birthday celebration. Thus, as a final "bicentennial" project, we will be creating a time capsule of this year's events for our future congregation. Everyone is invited to participate.

When we come back together, we will collect these mementos and bury a time capsule.

I'm extremely excited about this project and I hope you will be too. This is certainly a project for the ages!

Faith Formation News - Kim Nagy

On Saturday, August 23 I attended the "Can Money Be Sacred" Stewardship Festival, hosted virtually by the Living Water Association. This four-hour session flew by with incredibly engaging conversations with Rev. Michael Piazza. He encouraged all participants to consider stewardship as something that happens year-round, and it covers a broad range of topics, not just money.

It got me thinking about the broad terms of stewardship in our lives. We tend to prioritize and take great care of those things which are of utmost importance to us. What are those things for you? During the COVID-19 pandemic I have been increasingly aware of the construct of time-how days might crawl by, but somehow we are already into the month of September. Many of us have shifted from overcrowding our schedules with extra-curricular activities, in-person meetings, and gatherings with family and friends to trying to figure out how to work full-time and school kids and youth at home. What we do with our time these days is of utmost importance, and we must be good stewards of that resource.

As we enter the fall season, I encourage you to prioritize faith formation into your time, whether that's joining one of our fall adult education classes, committing to attending weekly youth group meetings, memorizing verses from the Psalms or some of your other favorite books, or simply reading your Bible every morning before the day begins. Our relationship with God is of utmost

importance during this time--it sustains us, it refreshes us, it calls us to action, and it comforts us. May we be good stewards of the time we have been given.

Racial Injustice Calendar

We recently learned that the Equal Justice Initiative publishes an annual calendar featuring "A History of Racial Injustice." It's a great learning tool, and we plan to feature content in future *Messenger* issues. For example, on September 2, 1885, white miners upset about competition for jobs killed 28 Chinese workers in Rock Spring, Wyoming, causing hundreds to flee and sparking anti-Chinese violence across the west. On September 3, 1901, Alabama adopted a racist new state constitution that sought to legalize white supremacy, prohibited interracial marriage, and mandated separate schools for black and white children. The calendar highlights a history that most of us never learned in school.
