

CBHA Works with Partners to Advocate for Behavioral Health Workforce and Youth Mental Health

Greetings Colleagues!

CBHA has been busy collaborating with several organizations on legislative proposals. We are thrilled to have received support from several of our member agencies and allied behavioral health organizations. Whether you wrote a letter, testified at a hearing, or provided technical assistance, we are grateful. Below, please review the status of our proposals, and please contact us if you would like to register your support.

Sponsored proposals:

Youth Mental Health First Aid: Our Youth Mental Health First Aid proposals continue to gain momentum. We have a strong coalition of co-sponsors including CBHDA, Children Now, and Lady Gaga's *Born This Way Foundation* (BTWF) who are advocating for funding for a school-based pilot program to train school personnel in Youth Mental Health First Aid. The proposal has been heard by the Budget Subcommittee on Health and Human Services in the Senate and is scheduled to be heard in the Assembly on May 6.

The coalition is also sponsoring [SB 428](#), which was heard before the Senate Education Committee on April 10, 2019 **and passed out of the Education Committee with a 7 to 0 vote!** This bill is authored by Senator Dr. Richard Pan and Senator Anthony Portantino and Assemblymember Dr. Joaquin Arambula and Senator Scott Weiner are co-authors. The bill was [recently amended](#) to require Local Education Agencies to pay for Youth Mental Health First Aid training, and to provide it to at least 10 percent of classified and 10 percent of the non-classified staff. **We thank the following organizations for writing letters of support:**

Workforce, Education and Training Trust Fund: We also have proposals that address the behavioral health workforce shortage. CBHA is collaborating with the California Behavioral Health Planning Council (CBHPC) and the California Association of Marriage Family Therapists (CAMFT) to sponsor a budget proposal, and Senator Anna Caballero is championing the proposal. Our request is for \$70 million dollars to create a funding source for the efforts that are detailed in OSHPD's statutorily mandated [Five-Year Plan](#). The co-sponsors presented this proposal to the Senate Budget Committee's Sub Committee on Health and Human Services, and we will keep you posted as the proposal heads to the Assembly.

[SB 539](#) (Caballero) will identify additional funding sources for the Five-Year Plan including a percentage of the growth funds of MHSA dollars and an option for counties to direct funds to a statewide Workforce, Education and Training Trust Fund. This bill will be heard in the Senate Health Committee today. **We thank the following organizations for writing letters of support:**

[AB 763](#) (Gray) was recently introduced. CBHA is working with the California Alliance for Children and Family Services and the California Children's Hospital Association to provide technical assistance on this bill. This legislation will require the DHCS to convene a stakeholder group of behavioral health advocates. This group will be tasked with determining the mandatory forms to be utilized Medi-Cal managed care contractors, including mental health plan contractors and contractor provider networks, for performing the intake of, the assessment of, and the treatment planning for, Medi-Cal beneficiaries who are eligible for specialty mental health services under the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment Program. **The bill was heard in the Assembly Health Committee on April 23, 2019 and passed out of committee with a 15-0 vote.
