Rabbi Dr. Vicki L. Axe, Senior Rabbi and Cantor of Temple Emanu-El

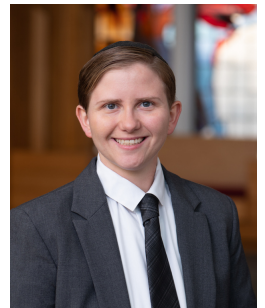
Rabbi Dr. Vicki L. Axe serves Temple Emanu-El as both rabbi and cantor. She holds a Bachelor of Music Education from Temple University, an MA in Music Education from The Ohio State University, and Cantorial Ordination from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. In 2008 she was awarded Doctor of Music, honoris causa from HUC-JIR, and Rabbinic Ordination from the Rabbinical Academy of America. In 2016 she earned her Doctor of Ministry in Pastoral Counseling from HUC-JIR.



With teaching at the very core of everything she does, her stated goal is to bring the world of Jewish culture, history, language, and practice to learners of all ages, to open the hearts of our people to Jewish life and experience so that they can make informed choices about their Jewish identity.

Rabbi Stefanie Gedan, Rabbi of Neve Shalom

Rabbi Stefanie Gedan was ordained in 2023 from the Jewish Theological Seminary, where she also earned an MA in Hebrew Letters and a Certificate in Pastoral Care. She holds a BA in Jewish Studies from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and completed advanced training in pastoral care through a residency program at NewYork-Presbyterian-Brooklyn Methodist Hospital.



Rabbi Gedan's philosophy of teaching embraces the dynamic relationship between tradition and modernity. She views the authors, readers, and texts as three integral voices in an ongoing spiritual conversation. Her favorite questions to ask are, "So what?" and "Why does this matter?" She believes that to make meaning in the present, we must first understand the past and how it has developed into the now.

Sunday Classes

Forgiving and Forgiven: The Pathway to True Forgiveness, *Rabbi Gedan*

- **Sundays: September 7, 14, 21 at 10 am in person**
- **Thursdays: September 4, 11, 18 at 10 am virtual**

As we approach the Days of Awe, themes of repentance and forgiveness rise to the forefront of our liturgy—and are called forth in our daily actions. Yet the pathway to being forgiven and to granting forgiveness is often fraught with tension: between justice and mercy, between what is deserved and what is possible.

This three-part course explores the complex and layered concept of forgiveness through the lens of Jewish tradition, philosophy, and lived experience. Drawing on classical texts, contemporary commentary, and real-world application, participants will engage deeply with the theological, ethical, and emotional dimensions of teshuvah (repentance) and mechilah (forgiveness).

Together, we will examine how Jewish wisdom can guide us through the challenges of apology, accountability, healing, and reconciliation—in preparation for a more honest and meaningful High Holiday season.

Hebrew Reading , *Michele Rosenfield*

Sundays at 11:15 am virtual

Beginners and not-so-beginners welcome. Practice reading prayers and texts. Learn how to recognize some vocabulary and basic grammatical structures to ease understanding of the Hebrew you do read. Each verse, or line of a prayer, is read in English first so that if it is not your turn to read out loud you can try to identify words or roots to make a stab at translating the Hebrew. Before you know it, you will be experiencing the joy of text study as well as building confidence in your reading skills. Individual online study materials with personal support are available for those who want to learn or brush up on the Hebrew letters and vowels.

Practical Halacha: A Text-Based Study of Jewish Daily Living, *Rabbi Gedan*

The weeknight section primarily meets on Tuesdays but has an occasional Wednesday class due to the needs of the calendar.

In this course, we'll explore how Jewish practice developed across time into our lived tradition. Over the course of the year, we will study a new aspect of practical halacha in the following four topics: kashrut, obligation, prayer, and Passover. By exploring texts that show the halachic process in action, we will gain new insights and wrestle with the old age question, what does it mean to live a meaningful Jewish life.

Open to all levels and knowledge backgrounds, sources will be provided in both Hebrew and English, with guided support to ensure everyone can engage meaningfully. Whether you're new to texts or more experienced, this course is for you.

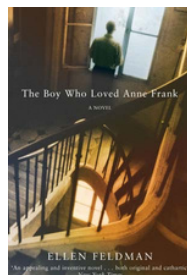
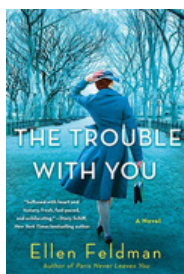

Hard Conversations About Israel

From Zionism's early days to its contemporary manifestations, Jews fundamentally do not and have not agreed about what Zionism is. With a better understanding of the multiple *Zionisms* in circulation, then, we can ask what support for Israel looks like at this moment, and whether this is how support must look or should look. Drawing on religious, political, and philosophical thinkers of the last two centuries. "Hard Conversations About Israel" seeks to face hard questions and explore new ways of approaching the Jewish homeland in a time of fear and uncertainty.



Rachel Slutsky, Ph.D., is the Monsignor John Oesterreicher Assistant Professor of Jewish Studies and Jewish-Christian Relations in Antiquity at Seton Hall University. She completed her doctorate in ancient Judaism at Harvard University in May 2022, where she held the Isadore Twersky Fellowship (2021-2022) and served as the assistant director of undergraduate studies in the Committee on the Study of Religion (2020-2021). Dr. Slutsky's work explores the ways in which ancient and modern discourses employ Jewish law to cultivate communal self-understanding in juxtaposition to other Jews and the non-Jewish world more broadly. She is currently working on her first monograph, tentatively titled *The Gentile Enigma: Divine Law and Identity in Early Judaism*, based on her dissertation.

Dr. Slutsky has held numerous fellowships, including a Summer Fellowship at the University of Pennsylvania's Katz Center, a FLAS Fellowship in Yiddish at the University of Chicago, a Pedagogy Fellowship from the US Holocaust Memorial Museum, and numerous Center for Jewish Studies fellowships from Harvard University.

Rabbi Josh Weinberg, is the Vice President of the URJ for Israel and Reform Zionism and is the Executive Director of ARZA, the Association of Reform Zionists of America. He was ordained from the HUC-JIR Israeli Rabbinic Program in Jerusalem and is currently living in New York. Rabbi Weinberg holds a B.A. from University of Wisconsin in Hebrew Literature, Political Science and International Relations, and an M.A. from the Hebrew University in Jewish Education. Passionate about anything connected to Israel, Rabbi Weinberg is a reserve officer in the IDF Spokesperson's Unit, has hiked the Israel-trail, and made

Aliyah to Israel in 2003. He previously served as the Director of the Israel program for the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College and as a faculty member of NFTY-EIE High School in Israel teaching Jewish History. He has taught and lectured widely throughout Israel, the U.S. and Europe, led numerous tours, and trained tour educators for Israel experiences. In his dual role at the URJ, Rabbi Weinberg is devoted to strengthening the connection between American Judaism and the Jewish State.
