




The Cherokee Strip Celebration was back as if it never missed a beat. Beautiful sunny weather and plenty of space for the large crowds lining downtown Enid welcomed parade participants back after taking a break last year due to restrictions on large gatherings.

Alan Clepper and Connie Cruise of 103.1 KOFM entertained the crowd while serving as emcees. Parade judges Dan Scheidel of United Way of Enid and Northwest Oklahoma along with April Danahy of Security National Bank and Dwight Hughes of Autry Technology Center were chauffeured to the judges platform in style by Mark of Excellence Limo Service.

The Slash-O-Ranch Longhorns kicked off the parade through the generous support of signature sponsor, Bank of Kremlin. Tinker Federal Credit Union's platinum sponsorship of the Grand Marshall's for this years parade featured the 2021 Connie Mack World Series Champion Enid Majors.



The impressive parade entries were comprised of a wide range of businesses and organizations including Vance Air Force Base and the United States Marshall's Posse based out of Oklahoma City who participated in the parade for the first time.
