

THE FIRST LESSON

Genesis 15:1-12, 17-18

Reader A reading from the Book of Genesis.

The word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, “Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great.” But Abram said, “O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?” And Abram said, “You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir.”

But the word of the Lord came to him, “This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir.” He brought him outside and said, “Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them.” Then he said to him, “So shall your descendants be.” And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness. Then he said to him, “I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess.” But he said, “O Lord God, how am I to know that I shall possess it?” He said to him, “Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtledove, and a young pigeon.” He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away. As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him. When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. On that day the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying, “To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates.”

For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; I have often told you of them, and now I tell you even with tears. Their end is destruction; their god is the belly; and their glory is in their shame; their minds are set on earthly things. But our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will transform the body of our humiliation that it may be conformed to the body of his glory, by the power that also enables him to make all things subject to himself. Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved.

After his baptism, Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone.'" Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, "To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him.'" Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written, 'He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you,' and 'On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone.'" 





Learn to Create Ukrainian Easter Eggs (Pysanky) -- For thousands of years the Slavic people of Eastern Europe have decorated eggs. In Ukraine this art is known as *Pysanky*. In pre-Christian Ukraine these eggs were decorated in an effort to gain the good will of the many nature gods worshiped by the people. Egg designs were used to call forth the springtime, assure fertility for newlywed couples as well as livestock, help with crops, protect homes, and much more. In 988 C.E. (Common Era) Christianity came to Ukraine. The ancient art of *Pysanky* became a symbol of the Christian faith. Many designs took on new meaning as faith in Christ spread throughout the land. The eight-point star used to worship the sun became a symbol for Christ. Grapes and wheat, once symbols of the harvest, became symbols for the Eucharist and the harvest of souls. Even the colors have special meanings. One legend tells of an evil beast chained at the center of the earth. As long as *pysanky* are made the chains remain tight and evil is held in check. More than ever, we need to be creating *pysanky*.

The Rev. Dr. Jim Melnyk (Rev. April's uncle by way of a couple of marriages) will be offering an online class on **Saturday, March 26 from 9:30am-12:30pm: on how to make *Pysanky*.**

In each class Jim will teach some of the basic techniques in egg decorating and share some of the ancient legends surrounding the art. Those who wish to attend either class and learn this sacred art form must purchase the necessary materials ahead of time and have them ready by class time for the class you intend to attend. Materials needed are listed below. **Please email Jim at jsmelnykny28@gmail.com if you would like to sign up (or have questions).** A Zoom link will be provided closer to the March 26 class.

PLEASE NOTE: If you wish to take this class you must order your own kit in prior to class so that it arrives in time to mix the dyes ahead of time (they need to cool to room temperature). Be sure to carefully follow the directions for mixing the dyes (no vinegar in the orange dye).

The easiest way to find your materials is to order a kit from The Ukrainian Gift Shop in Roseville, MN. This link will get you to the page to order kits: <https://www.ukrainiangiftshop.com/EGG-DECORATING-KITS/products/25/>. For the serious student I would recommend KITSD for \$32.98. For the less serious minded, KIT2D for \$14.98 will do the job (but if you find you really enjoy this art you'll want to expand your supplies).

Additional materials required:

- Candle and Candle holder (utility candles are great – not pillar candles)
- 2-4 Large, uncooked eggs (smooth, no cracks)
- One dozen pint-sized mason jars with lids: Narrow mouth – can be purchased in grocery stores, Walmart, Kmart, etc. Mix dyes according to packet directions (note: no vinegar in the orange dye) and allow to cool before putting lid on the jars.
DON'T FORGET TO LABEL THE COLORS ON THE JARS!
- Spoon (teaspoon is fine)

- Plain white paper towels
- Newspaper to cover work surface
- A spirit of adventure
