Megan Piper, PhD, is an Associate Professor in the University of Wisconsin Department of Medicine and the Associate Director of Research at the University of Wisconsin Center for Tobacco Research and Intervention. Dr. Piper’s research focuses on understanding and treating tobacco dependence, with an additional interest in different populations of smokers who have more difficulty quitting, such as women and smokers with mental illness and in electronic cigarettes.



Jon Temte, MD, PhD is associate dean for public health and community engagement at the UW School of Medicine and Public Health. He will also oversee the Office of Rural Health and the Area Health Education Center, as well as the Center for Urban Population Health. He is an expert in vaccines and immunization policy, and he has served on the US Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices, (ACIP), and he was the first family physician to chair ACIP from 2012 – 2015. Dr. Temte has a long history of building bridges between public health and clinical medicine.
