Profession of Faith: p. 108

**I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, (bow as we say) and by the Holy Spirit he was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.**

18:15-20

*Matthew*

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

**Glory to you, Lord**

Jesus said to his disciples: "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have won over your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, so that 'every fact may be established on the testimony of two or three witnesses.' If he refuses to listen to them, tell the church. If he refuses to listen even to the church, then treat him as you would a Gentile or a tax collector. Amen, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. Again, amen, I say to you, if two of you agree on earth about anything for which they are to pray, it shall be granted to them by my heavenly Father. For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

**Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.**

Reflection on the Word:

Last week we heard Jesus tell his disciples that those who wish to follow him must first take up their cross. One of these crosses is to take the responsibility to hold others accountable. Whether it is individually, like Ezekiel, or with a community, like the early church in Matthew, we are obligated to call others to account when they act unjustly or unmercifully. It can be difficult to correct a subordinate, awkward to correct a peer, and scary to correct a leader. But we are called to do so, out of love for our neighbor, so that a conversion of heart may take place.

If you love your neighbor as yourself, as Saint Paul reminds the Romans that as Christians they are called to do, at the very least you will treat your neighbor the way you would want to be treated yourself. Therefore, he can say that

Christians fulfill all the commandments, the entire law, by following this one principal command. Neither religious nor political authorities could find fault in that.

It is alarming to hear Jesus tell the disciples that if a sinner “refuses to listen even to the church, then treat him as you would a Gentile or a tax collector” (Matthew 18:17). Is Jesus telling his disciples to exclude sinners, just as society treats outsiders and collaborators? No, quite the opposite! Jesus has already extended his mission into Gentile territory and welcomed tax collectors into his fold. Jesus does not tell them to treat sinners as the Pharisees treat Gentiles and tax collectors, but as *you* would treat Gentiles and tax collectors. Jesus trusted that his disciples realized the goal is always reconciliation, not exclusion.

**Question of the Week:** What can I do to reconcile with someone whom I or others have excluded?

*Prayer of the Faithful:*

Trusting in God’s care, we bring our needs and the needs of our neighbor before the Lord.

- For the Church, that we may reach out and assist our neighbors in reconciling with God and each other, let us pray to the Lord. **Lord, hear our pray.**

- For all the prayers that we hold in the silence of our hearts; for all our intentions spoken and unspoken, let us pray to the Lord.

Loving God, grant us the will to listen for your voice and the grace to recognize it as we strive to follow you. Hear the prayers we offer and grant them according to your will, through Christ our Lord.
