Another New Year has arrived. It will take me a couple of weeks to adjust to writing 2023 instead of 2022 for the year. The calendar is mostly a tool used to simply mark time. It helps us keep track and remember the important events in the world and in our own lives.

In my parent's generation, people wanted to know where you were on December 7, 1941, when Pearl Harbor was attacked? Some twenty-eight years later the defining question being asked was, where were you on July 20, 1969, when the astronauts landed on the moon? A date, a time, an event in history, all help us to keep track of our place in God's creation.

On February 1st of 2017, I became the new rector of All Saints' Episcopal Church in Morristown, Tennessee. Of course I will always remember when my bishop here in East Tennessee, told us to get ready for the COVID-19 pandemic back in March of 2020.

As I reflect on the years that have gone by, I realize that there has never been a year that was just plain ordinary or uneventful. There have always been wonderful times when I have stood in total awe of the power that humanity has to serve the greater good. There have also been those times when my heart has been broken because of humanity's indifference to the suffering of others.

The year 2023 is indeed a new year. It brings with it the potential for tremendous good and bad. So this new year I have only one resolution to make. I resolve to live into my Baptismal Covenant. This year I want to really seek out Christ in all persons and love my neighbor as myself. This year really I want to strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being.

While it is true that there is much more to the Baptismal Covenant, I've chosen to focus on the last two promises. As I see it, those two alone are more than enough to keep me busy for the whole of 2023.

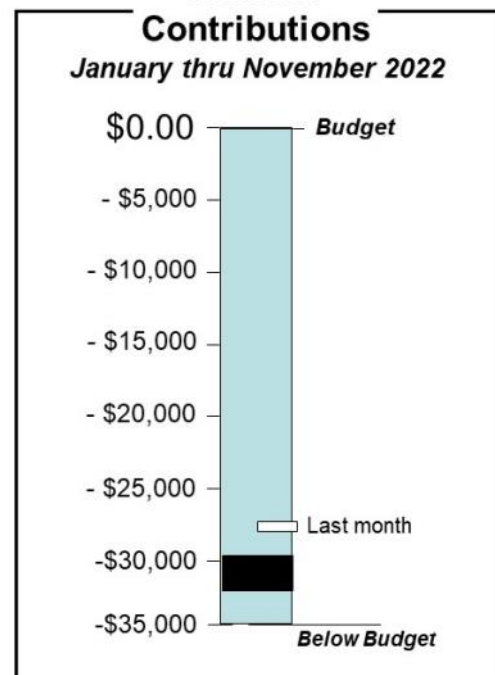

Hymns, liturgical music, chants, graduals, sequences, voluntaries, preludes, postludes . . . what's the point? Why do we do these things? Why do we even have a vested choir that processes and sings special music? Is any of this really necessary?

These questions could easily result in the production of an entire textbook on music in the church! There are deep and historical reasons behind our musical tradition, but quite simply we find that music enhances our worship in a way that nothing else can. The physical act of singing seems to affect our entire being in the well-known body-mind-spirit triad! Sacred music is particularly uplifting when we are gathered together as Christ's body. Yes, the choir helps to lead, the processional gets the altar party into position, and the chants were originally used (prior to amplifiers) to project the celebrant's or officiant's voice to the far reaches of the nave. Yet once again, let's make it simple: music enhances worship. What about a "said" or "spoken" service? They too are beautiful! You might find this hard to believe, but I am deeply appreciative of the quieter, non-musical gatherings in common prayer.

What about the organ or other musical instruments? The answer is about the same. The organ has "voices" (pipe registrations) that help to blend human singing. It also is the most dynamic of all instruments and is simply a grand and noble way for the musical prayer, teaching, and spiritual uplift that we experience. King David composed his psalms on a small stringed instrument, many churches use praise bands (which I snarkily refer to as "religiotaainment") or piano, and a few denominations say that the human voice is the ONLY musical sound that should occur in worship! It's a good thing we're all different . . . otherwise there would only need to be one of me!

As we enter 2023 let's rejoice in the great Epiphany (making known something previously obscured) and near the end of February start getting ready for the Queen of Feasts. Ash Wednesday is Feb. 22 and Easter is April 9. We have a rich musical tradition that our souls relish. Let's all sing together!

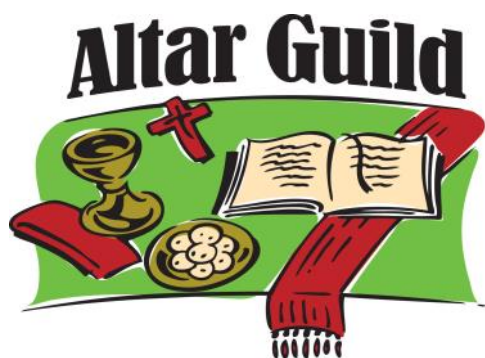
