

RECTOR'S REPORT FOR ANNUAL MEETING 2020

In two weeks I will mark my third anniversary as your rector here at All Saints' and we will be entering our fourth year together in ministry. People still occasionally ask me if we miss Louisiana. The answer, other than Cajun cuisine, no we don't. This is home. We will live here long after I retire from active parish ministry and for the record that is several years off from now.

This past year was a particularly good one for All Saints. Naturally, the big event we celebrated was our Golden 50th anniversary as a parish church in the Diocese of East Tennessee. Our bishop, Brian Cole, was here to preach and celebrate. We had a large confirmation class of 22 adults and youth as well as three baptisms that day. The time capsule we set out near the front door will be opened in 50 years to bear witness to the members of this parish in 2019.

Other highlights from 2019 include a second summer youth mission trip to southern Kentucky. I can't say enough good about this summer adventure. Teaching our young people how to step out in faith to overcome various obstacles with home repair empowers them to make a real difference in someone else's life. We bought a new copier for the office and donated the old one to Serenity House. Our wooden sign out front was refurbished and still proudly proclaims that all are welcome. The old ice machine finally died and we replaced it with a larger one with greater capacity to produce more ice.

Our relationship with All Saints Episcopal School continues to grow and draw us both nearer to each other. Our day school is back on track once again providing an outstanding education to the children of the Lakeway Area. Mtr. Gigi is a most welcome presence at our parish on Sunday mornings. I am looking forward to continued growth at ASES.

Feeding ministries have long been part of the mission of the Christian Church. Here at All Saints' feeding the hungry resonates with our core mission. Our monthly Bingo has grown to the point where we are having to implement certain limits so we can still serve our guests with the same level of hospitality and love. We still support the feeding ministries of Food on Foot each month and regular donation are made to Central Services. Why? Because Jesus says, "If you love me, feed my sheep."

Financially we are continuing to grow into a role where we are learning to thrive instead of just getting by and struggling to survive. We began the year with a projected deficit of nearly \$20K. We finished the year with only a \$2.7 deficit. Had we not had the one-time expenses of the copier and the ice machine we would have been comfortably in the black.

Next year is upon us and we have our challenges before us. I am confident that the vestry and the people of All Saints will find a way to move forward and meet those challenges.

There are so many people who give generously of their time, talent, and treasure at All Saints. I need to offer my thanks for the leadership of Bob Harmon as our Sr. Warden in 2019 and our Jr. Warden in 2018. His calm steady presence was a comforting anchor no matter what storms might surround us. Susan Fuhr took on the role of Jr. Warden and she was as tenacious as a Pit Bull Terrier. The words "no" or "we can't" are not in her vocabulary. Susan along with the Jr. Warden, Jim, made life easier for all of us.

When it comes to church organist/choir directors, Dr. Ryan Garber is truly a unicorn. There just aren't many like him. Many Sundays I come away from worship after listening to Ryan play and the choir sing, and I am in total awe. We are blessed to have such a gifted composer and musician among us. He can even make a common cowbell sound holy.

Lynne Ann Anderson has worked at All Saints' more than 30 years. Think about that. Do the math in your head. Imagine the stories she could tell if she were so inclined. I continue to depend on her passion for details and organization. I'm blessed to have such a capable Parish Administrator. Actually, we all are blessed to have Lynne Ann do all that she does on a daily basis for All Saints'.

Next year we will be focusing our attention on two major areas of Christian formation. One will be a deeper understanding true Stewardship. One that connects our thankfulness for our blessings with our support for the mission and many ministries of All Saints. The second will focus on how we go about welcoming the strangers among us and how we go about incorporating them into the daily life of All Saints'.

As for me, I am still very grateful that you called me to be your rector. I am looking forward to see where God continues to lead us into 2020 and even beyond. I hope All Saints' will have the courage to let the Holy Spirit challenge us with new ways of sharing the Good News to God's people. And as long as we continue to be a light in the world that witnesses to the love of our Lord Jesus Christ; all will be well, all will truly be well.

2019 was as amazing year at All Saints'.

We held our Vestry Retreat Saturday February 16th and welcomed our new members to the Vestry. New members were assigned the following liaison positions. Bill Connellee, liaison with All Saints Episcopal School. Diane Baker will be liaison to Administration. Carolyn Dean will work with Worship and Martie Anderson with Outreach. Everyone was energized and ready to continue our "Money follows Mission" approach that has seen great success over the past year.

The Aloha Stewardship Conference held April 6th at the Church of the Ascension turned out to be a great conference with over 80 persons in attendance. All Saints' was representative by Marylou Mauney, Susan Fuhr, Ginger Goolsby, Mark Joyce, Bill Mitrik, and Bob Harmon. A big thanks to Skeet Jernigan for his work with the Diocesan Stewardship Committee for making this conference a big success. Also, a big thanks to Larry McGowan for his help with meals and refreshments.

May brought us another successful BBQ.

It was my pleasure to attend the Invite-Welcome-Connect Summit June 12 thru the 14th on the campus of The University of the South at Sewanee. Attending with me were Cindy Selby and LA Orio. Founded and directed by Mary Parmer, Invite-Welcome-Connect is a ministry of transformation that equips and empowers congregations and individuals to cultivate intentional practices of evangelism, hospitality, and belonging. Rooted in the Gospel directive to "Go and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19) the vision of Invite-Welcome-Connect is to change the culture of The Episcopal Church to move from maintenance to mission. Our plans are to implement Invite-Welcome-Connect into our Adult Forum on Sunday mornings for the 2nd and 4th Sundays of each month. We hope to send 2 Lay persons and 1 Clergy to each summit for several years.

October BBQ as expected, had a few glitches. We knew this could happen. We missed Dan's leadership. Regardless of that, we did complete another BBQ with no injuries to anyone that I am aware of, we did not set the pit on fire, and from comments I heard, the meat and other side dishes were very good.

In November we held our Golden Anniversary Celebration. Bishop Cole officiated. With the Baptisms, Confirmations, receptions, and internment of our Time Capsule, it was as great day that I am sure everyone enjoyed immensely.

I would like to thank the Rev. Mark Holland for his guidance of the Vestry, the church family, and his excellent relationship with the Episcopal Diocese of East Tennessee. Our current vestry for the excellent work that they have done this year. It has been an honor and a pleasure to be your Sr. warden.

ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2019

Plans for EFM (Education for Ministry) and various book studies continue. Likewise, an initiative to offer Cursillo (a “short course” in deepening faith) is now in active discussion. Father Mark’s weekly Bible Study has received accolades! Related adult and intergenerational events were offered throughout the past year, although it was perhaps “The Complete History of the Old Testament in Twenty Minutes” (a play that we did in a readers theatre setting) at the Adult Forum that received the strongest positive reviews.

Efforts to make our Wednesday night Agape meals an opportunity for Christian discipleship eventually petered out. Interest in a Wednesday night dinner and educational offering was minimal. We ended the program last May.

The Adult Education committee spent a great deal of time considering the implications of Christian discipleship with an eye to what kind of programs would be supported by the parish. This parish is extremely active in doing good deeds. We are equally active and excited in planning and executing events. Interest runs high in these areas (such as monthly bingo, Food on Foot, the barbecue, and so on). The committee has found much less interest in areas involving traditional religious edification such as Sunday school (Adult Forum) or “lecture style” classroom teaching on religious topics. The Committee recognizes that the world is now in a strengthening tide of monumental change regarding the delivery of theological education, but continues to believe that learning and studying are important for one to grow as a follower of Christ.

This past year saw a great deal of collaboration between the Evangelism Committee and the Adult Education Committee. This bond, in retrospect, looks at once natural and necessary! It is our hope that this synergy will continue.

Outreach Committee Annual Report 2019

Outreach Committee is constantly seeking to find ways our church can support our own parish needs, the needs of our local community and our larger Episcopal World Communion. This report highlights our efforts this year.

Once again, we supported ALPS fundraiser by walking as a parish in the WALK TO REMEMBER. ALPS is our local day care for adults with dementia.

Every month we fill about 100 bags of food for distribution to individuals by FOOD on FOOT, a local organization whose goal is to keep food available to families and children and prevent hunger, especially on weekends when school is out. We also gathered backpacks for the kids in the fall and 72 pairs of pajamas for distribution to kids at Christmas.

Fourteen children were sent to Camp Grace Point in conjunction with ECW and The Diocese of East Tennessee. Plans are underway to send more again this Summer.

The loose offerings we collect once a month went to support the following organizations this year: Noah's Arc Animal Shelter, Parish Boy Scout Troop, The School Building Fund for the Diocese of Kondo, Tanzania Africa, The Oasis, Woolsey Family and their Veterinary Mission to Mongolia, All Saints School, Parish Bingo project, Central Services Holiday Hope Fund, Helping Hands Clinic.

A special gift to the MATS shelter of \$600 was given to buy mats for the homeless warming shelter.

The Advent Food Collection in honor of Paul Rohe collected a large amount of canned goods, especially canned meats, fish, vegetables and peanut butter. This was given to the Central Service Food Pantry.

Over \$600 was used to help our own parishioners with urgent personal needs.

Monthly Bingo Luncheon has been providing a hot lunch for residents from the housing authority for 4 years. We continue to play Bingo and have a good deal of fun with our guests. Our guests now include some from the homeless community and the Five Rivers home for the disabled. We have grown from an average of 20 people to an average of 70+. Each month at least 20 parishioners show up to help. This is in addition to all of those that donate food and prizes each month. This group sets up, prepares and serves the food, manages to clean up. Our parishioners sit and have lunch with our guests, so fellowship is present in many ways.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2018

PURPOSE AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

Recruit members in good standing to serve as delegates and alternates to the Diocesan Convention for Vestry approval.

ACTIVITIES OF THE COMMITTEE FOR 2018:

The Vestry Organization Chart was updated to reflect numerous changes and additions with Vestry input. In addition, the chart was reformatted for a more usable format. The Vestry approved the updated chart.

The Committee completed the task of ensuring the By-laws, policies and procedures are on the ASEC website for ease of review by the Vestry, the Administrative Committee and the Parish.

The ASEC FACEBOOK GROUP PROCEDURES was updated to reflect the present Administrators and received Vestry approval.

As requested By Father Mark, the Committee developed a new Facility Utilization Policy and Procedures which involved extensive review of existing Facility Use forms and developing new and stream-lined, Building Use Request Form, Building Use Guideline Form and Voluntary Release Form. This policy/procedure reflects that Church members and non-profit organizations and groups may request use of the building and additional available facilities. ASEC does not permit for-profit organizations and/or individuals use of its building/facilities. This policy/procedure was approved by Father Mark and the Vestry.

The Vestry Person Responsible Instruction was updated with Vestry input to reflect several changes.

Responsibilities of the Vestry Procedure was updated consolidating several existing forms and reflecting appropriate changes.

We have encouraged all interested parishioners to sign up at the "Rally Day" event in August, to take an active role in some ministry/ministries which is/are near and dear to them. This year's theme "Picture yourself in a new ministry at All Saints" featured a Photo Booth for some fun and involvement.

There has been renewed interest about sending candidates from All Saints to experience A Short Course in Christianity - "Cursillo" weekend for this coming spring. Father Mark was on staff this past spring to experience his Cursillo – If interested contact him to register for a future date.

Action at All Saints 2019

The families we served during the 2019 mission trip were overjoyed with our youth's dedication and hard work in helping them repair their homes and strengthening everyone's sense of community and humanity. I can say that the experience we all shared with these families in Whitley City Kentucky was an uplifting and joyous one for all. The families we served were so grateful and expressed how blessed they were with the youth's participation and hard work last year. Again, this year we impacted the lives of two families that proved to be a Joyous exchange of Christian Love. This mission of service truly came to be one that inspired our youth and adult participants to find Joy in all manners of daily living.

AventureServe Ministries, based in Louisville Kentucky hosted our youth mission trip again this year and were provided two camp coordinators, Sidney and Jon, each inspiring young people in their own right. They led our service and recreational activities as well as leading us in daily reflective, worship and fellowship time. The theme this year was centered around "Joy" and how the presence of the Lord is reflected in the service and love we share with others in our community, especially those in need. The families we served this year were Georgetta Alsip and Brenda Murphy. Ms. Alsip was a very friendly and outgoing lady. She lives alone with her two cats. Her mother lives next door and Georgetta spends most of her time caring for her. Her roof was leaking in several places and our youth worked to repair the roof and ceilings in her home.

Ms. Murphy lives alone in a mobile home next door to her son. She was an LPN for 21 years and now works part time as a laundress at a nursing home nearby. Ms. Murphy takes great pride in serving others and is not the type to ask for help. Our youth worked to build a new deck at the entrance of the home which is the only way in and out of the home and was in desperate need of being replaced. Our mission trip participants also enjoyed a day on the Big South Fork River, White Water Rafting for the day. I am told the best whitewater trip ever. I would like to thank our youth that served and also a special thanks for our chaplains, Amy Neill, Dustin Chandler, Larry McGowan and Father Mark. Everyone came home exhausted but joyful in the service of others. It was an amazing time to bond and our youth grew in faith every day.

In addition to our amazing youth mission trip 2019, our youth participated in several community outreach and fellowship opportunities. From the annual flamingo flocking fundraising event, to working with the biannual BBQ, our youth were serving God in Action. Our youth have also had fun this year with the annual gingerbread house event and an Amazing All Saint's Eve Lock In, that included some 6 Adults and 18 youth, with participation by members from one of our sister parishes, St. John's Episcopal Church, Johnson City.
