Many of you will recognize the about prayer better known as the Serenity Prayer. The American theologian, Reinhold Niebuhr, is credited for having written it. It is also one of the cornerstone prayers for those in 12-step recovery programs. Over these past couple of months nearly everyday I find myself praying it myself.

We feel helpless being held captive by a microscopic virus we cannot see. Our fears have been steadily increasing as the death toll continues to climb. While the initial wave of infections were located in major cities on the east and west coasts, the Covid-19 virus has found its way into less populated areas including Hamblen County in east Tennessee.

I cannot change those who refuse to wear a mask in public. I cannot change those who choose to gather in large groups at bars and parties. I cannot change the minds of those who refuse to consider real science as a guiding force in making decisions about how to react to Covid-19.

However, I can choose to support those businesses that protect their employees with PPE. I can choose to patronize those places of business that require everyone inside their establishment to use hand sanitizer and wear a protective mask. I can choose to be patient and supportive of those working to find a vaccine to rid this virus from our midst.

Stay away from risky social situations. Encourage each other instead of passing judgment on those who disagree with you. "The Lord will give strength to His people; the Lord will bless His people with peace."


- Psalm 29:11

I was very content in my bedroom listening to David Cassidy and Bobby Sherman for hours on my turntable. And one of my very favorite television shows at that time (with the exception of The Partridge Family) ~ was the long-forgotten classic ~ Here Come the Brides. Running from 1968 - 1970. Remember: "*The bluest skies you've ever seen, in Seattle! And the hills the greenest green, in Seattle! Like a beautiful child growing up free and wild. Full of hopes and full of fears. Full of laughter. Full of tears. Full of dreams to last the years. In Seattle!*"



For the next few months we will only present the "Member Contributions" part of our graph since that data is not skewed by the shutdown of our programs.

The Finance Committee will be working during the summer to evaluate and update the Budget to reflect the impact of the Pandemic and we hope to resume our usual graph by Sept.

People of All Saints'

The world in which we are living is evolving rapidly. This of course causes us to respond accordingly. The Covid -19 virus has found its way to East Tennessee. We are now considered a national hot spot due to the recent rise of infections in our area.

You might be wondering how this will affect us here at All Saints'. For starters, we will be going back to online worship only for the foreseeable future. Hamblen County schools are delaying their start of the new year until after Labor Day. All Saints' School was originally set to start on July 31st. That has been pushed back until August 10th. More and more national chains and local stores are now requiring that all people wear proper face masks before entering the premises. Without a viable vaccine being available, the wearing of masks, washing our hands with sanitizer and social distancing are our best options to quell the spread of this virus.

Looking down the road to our annual Fall BBQ the vestry has decided to cancel it for this year. This was not an easy decision for us to make. August would be the time when orders for meat, produce, bread, and other materials would need to be made. An outlay of about \$12,500 would need to be spent upfront without knowing if we could find the volunteers to make it all happen. It was decided not to go forward with plans for a Fall BBQ this year.

I know this is disappointing information for you to receive. We all would love to be able to gather in person and worship together once again. We also want people to be safe and not expose themselves to a potentially lethal virus.

As our situation changes so will our response to the pandemic. When the infection rate in our area drops back down to a safe level then we will open the church back up for public worship.
