

A CHANGE OF SEASONS

The month of February is interesting on several levels. First, at 28 days, it is the shortest month of the year. Second, it is the month where we begin to feel the end of winter's grip is at hand and that warmth of spring is just around the corner. Finally, for those of us who are Christians, the Season of Epiphany guides us to make way for the Season of Lent.

There is something comforting about the predictable seasonal cycles in life that we experience. Winter will give way to spring. Spring will give way to summer. Summer will give way to the fall. And finally, fall will usher in winter to complete the cycle. The same is true with our faith. Advent leads to Christmas. The 12 Days of Christmas lead to Epiphany. Epiphany brings us to Lent. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and thus we engage with the traditional Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and giving alms.

In South Louisiana, the time after January 6th through Ash Wednesday (this year it is February 22nd) is marked by King Cakes, colorful beads, parades in the streets, and pure unbridled revelry. It culminates with Mardi Gras, which means Fat Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday and the somber start of 40 days (not counting Sundays) of Lent.

Lent is a time of penitence. It is meant to be a time of deep reflection. It is an opportunity to get our lives back on track once again and press forward. Lent is also a season to remove the bad habits that have crept into our lives this past year. It's like hitting the spiritual reset button so to speak.

People are prone to take on all types of traditional Lenten disciplines in hopes of ending a few bad habits and creating some new good habits. Some will give up alcohol, sweets, or red meat. Some will take on reading the Bible. Others begin modest exercise regimens to develop better health. I personally believe that small incremental changes verses large dramatic changes have the best chance for bringing about lasting change.

Here is what I'm going to suggest for Lent, 2023. The worst of the pandemic is now behind us. Come back to church. Get out of bed on Sunday morning for the six Sundays in Lent and go to church. For a faith community to thrive we need to be intentional about being present with each other. It's time to come back to church.

Two years of dealing with the COVID virus caused new habits to replace familiar habits. Let's use the Season of Lent to create something new together. It's not possible to go back in time and relive the past. It is possible to take the lessons in life that we've learned and strive for something better. This year, make a commitment of creating a new habit of being present on Sunday mornings here at All Saints'. For just six Sundays, come back to church.

As my time as Senior Warden comes to a close, I would like to thank Father Mark, Lynne Ann, Colleen Andrews, all Vestry members and all former senior wardens for giving me guidance during my tenure.

2022 was the year we reopened the church after Covid. Most of our activities have started up again, while a few activities are still waiting. And monthly breakfasts -with bacon- are back!! Attendance at mass is picking up while a great many people are still viewing mass on line.



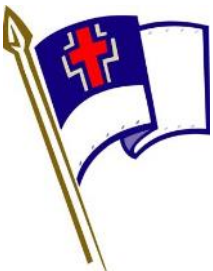

The Junior Warden's 2022 Report

2022 was quite a year as we started to bring our facility up to “full-speed-ahead” as Covid restrictions eased. After a trial run at a one-day BBQ in the Spring (where we sold, well—everything but the kitchen sink-), we pulled out an unbelievably successful two-night cook in October. All told, based on our year-end-financials, we sold around \$60,000 of BBQ and fixings’ in 2022. Wow!!! Special thanks to the people who lead and make our BBQs happen. You are amazing and a testament to the power of “individual doing” to serve the greater need of being “one in community.”

Sherri Chiappetta, our Sexton, made sure that our Church shone bright as we reintroduced unrestricted services. The “every other pew” signs disappeared as we welcomed both our returning parishioners and many new Parish Members. Thank you, Sherri! Welcome to those of you who found your way to our All Saints’ home.

Several long-deferred projects took on new life this last year. The “child-size” bathrooms in the Administrative Hall were updated to better serve our “all-grown-up-now” peoples. We continued to improve lighting with LED upgrades throughout the facility – this year we focused on the back stairwell, upstairs bathrooms, and the Parish Hall, in addition to improving and repairing lighting in the Sanctuary.

There’s now a “BBQ Cave” on the ground floor where we have centralized the supplies and equipment for our bi-annual pork extravaganza.

We also spent time on the grounds of our campus. We engaged our lawn services to provide more help with routine cleanup and “seasonal refreshing”. We also began some selective tree removal and began to plan for longer-term tree maintenance, removal, and replacement.

Christmas week capped off the year with a burst pipe in one of the under-croft bathrooms. We were blessed with swift notification by one of our support groups, rapid response by MUS to shut off water, a good mop, quick repairs, and blessedly – no damage or disruption to services.

I would be remiss if I did not mention the contribution Lynne Ann Anderson, our Administrator, has made to ensure the smooth operations of our church. There are a multiple ‘small’ things (the dishwasher doesn’t work, the stove is out, I need to be let in, my key doesn’t work, how do I get in the directory, what the heck is going on??), that really, when you get down to it, affect everything that happens in our church. Lynne Ann, for many years, has taken care of these so-called “small (but let’s be honest vital and world changing)” things and made it all happen.

Lynne Ann, there aren’t enough thanks for everything you have done for All Saints’. Wishing you all happiness and grace in your next chapter!

ALL SAINTS EPISCOPAL SCHOOL ANNUAL REPORT

Annual Fund Growth

Like every other independent school in the country, All Saints' Episcopal School funds basic operations with tuition dollars. But it's never enough. And like every other private school, we depend on the generosity of others via our annual Saints' Fund to help fill the gap that allows us to enroll mission appropriate students whose family finances would not otherwise support an ASES education.

Last year, parent participation in the Saints' Fund climbed to 27%, a modern high. With renewed emphasis this year on education and promotion, so far (our fiscal year runs July to June) we're at 50% participation. Faculty/staff and Board of Trustees are at 100%. Like our student enrollment numbers, it keeps getting better and better!

Mid-year Adjustments

While it is certainly fair to describe All Saints' Episcopal School as having dearly held traditions and patterns, it would be a mistake to suggest we are not open to positive change, especially when it comes to educating children. (Think continuous improvement!) Two recent adjustments we've made that are bearing sweet fruit are about math and writing.

After the dust settled from our standardized testing in October, we dissected the data and made some adjustments in our instructional practices PreK to 8th. More amendments to our Middle School program began with our return to classes in early January.

In Math, we had learned that while our students problem solve and think well mathematically, their automaticity in basic math functions is weak. Not knowing your math facts (multiplication tables, negative versus positive numbers, place values, fractions converted to decimals, etc.) without "thinking" about them greatly impedes finding a solution to word problems, the most common form of math challenges. Consequently, Mrs. Misty Cameron, our Academic Dean, has begun meeting with 5th and 6th graders once a week to press the importance of these fundamentals.

In Language Arts we had learned that our writing mechanics (capitalization, punctuation, run-on sentences, etc.) are not what they should be. To help with this, I'm leading a writing workshop with our 5th and 6th graders. My hope is that with a concentrated effort at formal writing our students will quickly learn that texting and essay/paragraph writing are distant cousins.

The second adjustment we've made is to hire another math teacher, Mrs. Angela Minnick, to teach regular 6th grade math. The class had been sharing Mrs. Kim Torres with other levels of math in a "one room schoolhouse," meaning their teacher contact time was limited. Not anymore. Already in the couple of weeks we've segregated 6th grade for a daily full period of instruction, they have responded quite well. We've even been able to subdivide them into ability groups to accelerate their learning.

Science catalyst

Another curricular enhancement we've instituted since Christmas Break is the introduction of a Science Catalyst in our K-4 grades. Each week these students engage in 25 minutes of science experiments and hands on science learning under the guidance of Mrs. Elyse Wolfe, an environmental science teacher relocated to Morristown from California. The excitement of students as they enter and exit our gym's "science area" is not just visible; it's electrifying!

Admission/Reenrollment

Last August we opened with 139 students. This month we enrolled our 148th. We're still not to waiting lists, though space is very limited in four of our programs. This sort of enrollment growth is what happens when you have a top-notch faculty delivering a top-draw educational program! If you know of a student who is not enjoying a breakout year in school, please do send them my way.

Reenrollment for the 2023-24 academic year begins this month. Current families will have a few weeks to reclaim their student's seat (and loyalty discount) as they matriculate along their educational continuum. New admits begin after that. Again, if you know a student who would benefit from a change of setting or who wants to experience a best in class education, please send them our way. ASES is truly a better place to grow!

He is an Episcopalian and a veteran independent school administrator. I believe he is a good fit.

Several of you have asked about my plans going forward. (I'm flattered by the interest.) First, we need to see what decision the candidate makes. Second, my hope is to try to once more to be retired. (Please don't tell the traffic police that I have a red Harley!) Third, we'll all have to see what the Lord has in mind as no one makes these decisions all by themselves.

A decision by him to say "Yes" to the call would certainly make things less complicated.

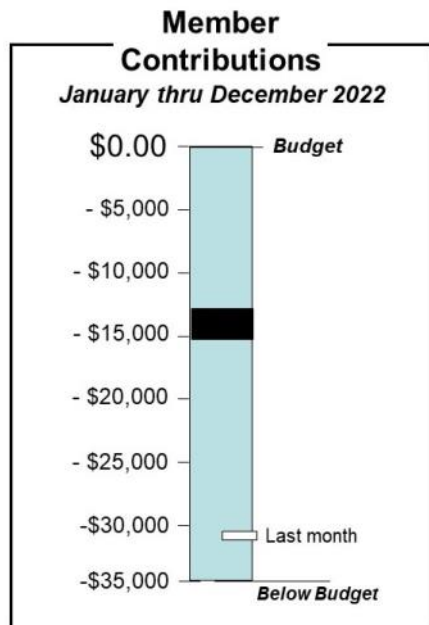

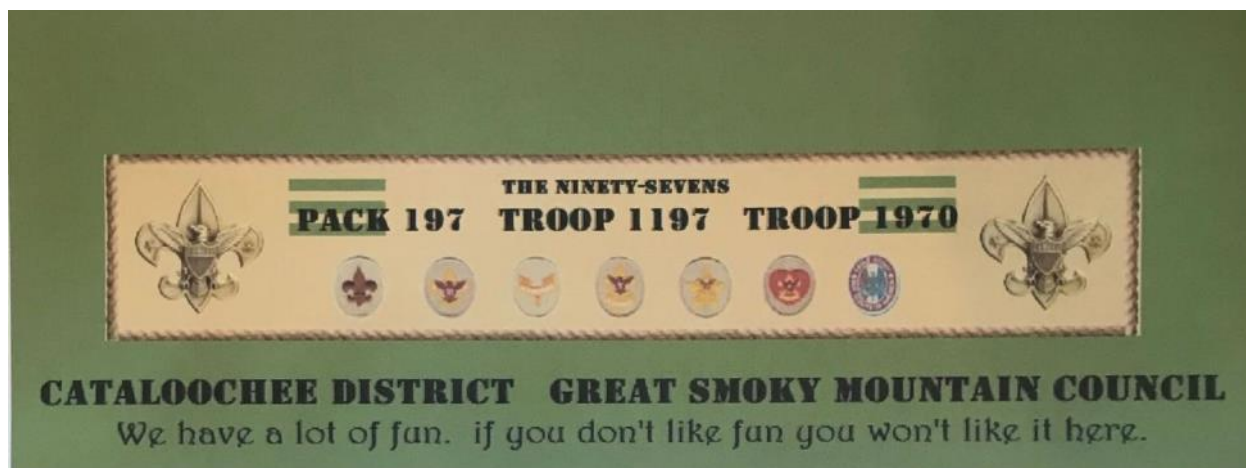
