### School Grant Opportunities

Looking for a grant opportunity to bring new resources into your classroom or school community? Here are several upcoming application opportunities.

#### **Clear the List Foundation Grants**

Leslie Garrison at Kate Bond Elementary encourages all teachers to apply for this first-come first-serve opportunity. Teachers will have the opportunity to receive rewards of up to \$500 for their classrooms. Teachers will also be able to enter the Clorox sweepstakes to win up to \$25,000 for themselves and their school. Selected teachers will be asked to have their employment verified by the school principal. **First-come first-serve**.

#### **Believe in Reading**

School districts are eligible applicants for this grant program. Funded applications will feature successful literacy programs which serve populations that show out of the ordinary needs, such as geographic areas with low reading scores and high poverty levels. All awards are at least \$1,000 (and up to \$10,000) and are renewable for up to three years. **Rolling**.

### **CHS Foundation Classroom Grant (new)**

CHS Foundation provides \$500 grants each year to Pre-K-12 teachers who have classroom projects that use agricultural concepts to teach reading, writing, math, science, social studies and more. Eligible projects include classroom and schoolyard gardens, embryology projects, aquaculture projects and agricultural literacy reading programs to name a few. Teachers have until June 1 the following year to complete the project and submit a final report. Only state-certified classroom teachers who are employed by a school district or private school are eligible to apply. Because of school closures related to COVID-19, virtual, online projects will be considered. Deadline: **September 15, 2020**.

### **Green Thumb Challenge**

Green Education Foundation and Gardener's Supply Company are calling on schools and youth groups to submit chronicles of their garden projects in a race to win a \$500 prize. Existing garden programs involving children currently in grades K-12 are eligible. Deadline: **September 20, 2020**.

### **P. Buckley Moss Teacher Grant**

The P. Buckley Moss Foundation for Children's Education has grants available up to \$1,000 to be awarded in 2020 to educators who need assistance to further their 2021-2022 program goals. The purpose for this grant is to aid and support teachers who wish to establish or maintain an effective learning tool for all children (including children who learn differently) using the visual arts within the school day. The grant money awarded is specifically for acquisition of visual art supplies. Deadline: **September 30, 2020**.

### **Clif Bar Family Foundation Small Grants**

The Clif Bar Family Foundation's Small Grants (averaging \$8,000) are awarded for general organizational support or to fund specific projects in the foundation's priority areas: (1) protecting Earth's beauty and bounty; (2) creating a robust, healthy food system; (3) increasing opportunities for outdoor activity; (4) reducing environmental health hazards; and (5) building stronger communities. In previous years, the foundation has awarded grants to nonprofit organizations that support innovative education programs at multiple levels. Examples include a garden-as-classroom work-study program to empower low-income kindergarten through grade 12 students; a climate change education program for high school students; a biking program for children and adults with physical disabilities; wilderness field trips for urban youth; confidence-building adventures for children with special needs; a summer camp for children and families living with diabetes; and STEM education programs. Your best chance at funding a program at your school would be to partner with a local non-profit to design a program to serve your students. Deadline: **October 1, 2020**.

### **Toshiba American Foundation Grants for K-5**

K-5 grade teachers are invited to apply on-line for a Toshiba America Foundation grant of not more than \$1,000 to help bring an innovative project into their own classroom. Summer projects or after school programs cannot be considered. Salaries, facility maintenance, textbooks, video production, audio-visual equipment (e.g. electronic white boards, Smartboards, document projectors, student response systems) and education research will not be funded. No grants are available for computer hardware. No single school may receive more than one grant at a time. Deadline: **October 1, 2020**.

At the school and district levels, leadership teams use the grants to improve school climate, reduce hate, support culturally responsive practices and implement anti-bias curricula. At the classroom level, teachers use the grants to fund programming that promotes empathy and kindness, positive identity development, perspective taking, critical thinking about injustice and collective action. Deadline: **Rolling.**
