School Grant Opportunities

Looking for a grant opportunity to bring new resources into your classroom or school community? Here are several upcoming application opportunities.

Clear the List Foundation Grants

Leslie Garrison at Kate Bond Elementary encourages all teachers to apply for this first-come first-serve opportunity. Teachers will have the opportunity to receive rewards of up to \$500 for their classrooms. Teachers will also be able to enter the Clorox sweepstakes to win up to \$25,000 for themselves and their school. Selected teachers will be asked to have their employment verified by the school principal. **First-come first-serve.**

Believe in Reading

School districts are eligible applicants for this grant program. Funded applications will feature successful literacy programs which serve populations that show out of the ordinary needs, such as geographic areas with low reading scores and high poverty levels. All awards are at least \$1,000 (and up to \$10,000) and are renewable for up to three years. **Rolling.**

SFE applicants may request \$150 to \$500 to purchase native plants and seed for the grant year. Deadline: **October 15, 2020.**

TVA STEM Grants

Teachers can apply for up to \$5,000 for classroom projects focused on Environment, Energy, Economic and Career Development, or Community Problem Solving. Travel costs are not allowable. Student technology costs are allowable but should not be emphasized since SCS has recently purchased student laptops. The grant web site offers examples of allowable social distancing materials that can be purchased. In addition, it provides examples of funded projects. Cordova Elementary was a 2020 recipient. Deadline: **October 16, 2020.**

Budding Botanist Grant Program

Kids Gardening and the Klorane Botanical Foundation are accepting applications to the Budding Botanist Grant Program. Any Title I public K-12 school is eligible to apply. Applicants must be planning a new or expanding an existing school garden program designed to teach students about environmental sustainability and the importance of biodiversity. Fifteen schools will receive an award package valued at \$1,200 (a check for \$1000 to spend on materials to help bring garden-based learning opportunities to students and a package of tools and educational materials valued at \$200). Deadline: **October 30, 2020.**

Annie's Homegrown School Garden Grants

Annie's Homegrown, Inc. offers grants to schools and educational programs to build school gardens. Since 2008, Annie's has helped fund more than 400 school gardens. Eligible programs must be associated with kindergarten through grade 12 schools within the United States and must focus on connecting children to real food. Funds may be used to buy gardening tools, seeds, or other needed supplies. The online grant application form is available on the website. Applicants have two different garden types to choose from: (1) the getting started garden, which provides funding for a brand-new school garden program (\$3,000); or (2) the digging deeper garden, which provides funding to deepen an existing school garden program (\$5,000). Deadline: **November 2, 2020.**

Maureen Hayes Author/Illustrator Award

The Maureen Hayes Award supports a visit by a nationally recognized children's book author or illustrator to a community, with emphasis on providing opportunities for children and youth for whom a visit with an author/illustrator is a first-time experience. Previous winners of the Hayes Award include public libraries, elementary school libraries, and partnerships between public libraries and public or charter schools. The \$4,000 cash award may be used only to cover the author/illustrator's honorarium and travel expenses to and from the host community. The host institution makes the travel arrangements and pays the travel costs, which are reimbursed by the award. The host institution and any partners

in the visit are responsible for expenses such as lodging for the author/illustrator, publicity for the visit, and any reception or other hospitality honoring the guest. To be eligible to apply for the award, applicants must be personal members of the ALSC as well as the ALA. Deadline: **November 15, 2020.**

Junior League of Memphis Innovative Teaching Grants

This program awards grants to PK-12 teachers in need (at least 80% will go to teachers in Title I schools) in the Memphis metro area. Past recipients are eligible. The focus of the 2020-2021 Innovative Teaching Grants will be providing excellent academic and social/emotional instruction while students are either learning at home or learning in socially-distanced classrooms, given the COVID-19 pandemic. In general, funds **MAY** be used for artist visits to classroom, computer software, tickets to performing or visual arts events (not to exceed more than 50 percent of grant monies), consumable materials and supplies. Funds **MAY NOT** be used for major equipment, computers, tablets, computer hardware, capital improvements, teacher/staff compensation, food, transportation or digital cameras. Grants will be awarded up to \$2,500. Deadline: **November 23, 2020.**

ALDI's Smart Kids Grants

ALDI Smart Kids is dedicated to supporting the health and wellness of the children in communities served by ALDI. Support ranges from monetary donations to ALDI gift cards. Requests (for \$100 to \$5000) should be submitted at least six weeks prior to the date the requested donation is needed to allow time for application review and payment processing. Deadline: **Rolling, through December 15.**

Youth Garden Grants

30 awards will be made to nonprofit organizations, public or private schools, or youth programs planning a new garden program or expanding an established one. Your program must at least 15 youth between the ages of 3 and 18. Five award packages valued at \$1,700 will be given, and 25 award packages valued at \$700 will be given. Deadline: **December 18, 2020.**

VFW Teacher of the Year

The VFW Teacher of the Year award contest recognizes three exceptional teachers for their outstanding commitment to teaching Americanism and patriotism to their students. Each year, a certified/licensed elementary, junior high and high school teacher whose curriculum focuses on citizenship education topics can be nominated for the Smart/Maher VFW National Citizenship Education Teacher Award. Winners receive a \$1,000 award for professional development expenses; \$1,000 award for his/her school; plaques; and an all-expenses-paid trip to attend a VFW conference to receive their award. Deadline: **January 1, 2021.**

American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics

The AIAA Foundation believes that one of the most significant means to inspire and advance the future of Aerospace is to fund grants to meet the unmet and unfunded educational need of students. Each school year, AIAA awards grants of up to \$500 to worthy projects that significantly influence student learning. Allowable expenses focus on materials and supplies for classroom projects. Teachers must be AIAA members. Deadline: **January 15, 2021.**

Knowles Science Teaching Foundation Fellowships

Valued up to \$175,000 and renewable for up to five years, the highly competitive Fellowships are awarded to new teachers committed to teaching STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) in high schools nationwide. KSTF offers its Fellows professional workshops, materials grants and access to a teacher-to-teacher mentoring network. Deadline: **January 18, 2021.**

Bostitch Creativity in the Classroom Grants

Teaching Tolerance Educator Grants, ranging from \$500-\$10,000, support school-level, classroom-level, and district-level projects that promote affirming school climates and educate youth to thrive in a diverse democracy. At the school and district levels, leadership teams use the grants to improve school climate, reduce hate, support culturally responsive practices and implement anti-bias curricula. At the classroom level, teachers use the grants to fund programming that promotes empathy and kindness, positive identity development, perspective taking, critical thinking about injustice and collective action. Deadline: **Rolling**.
