

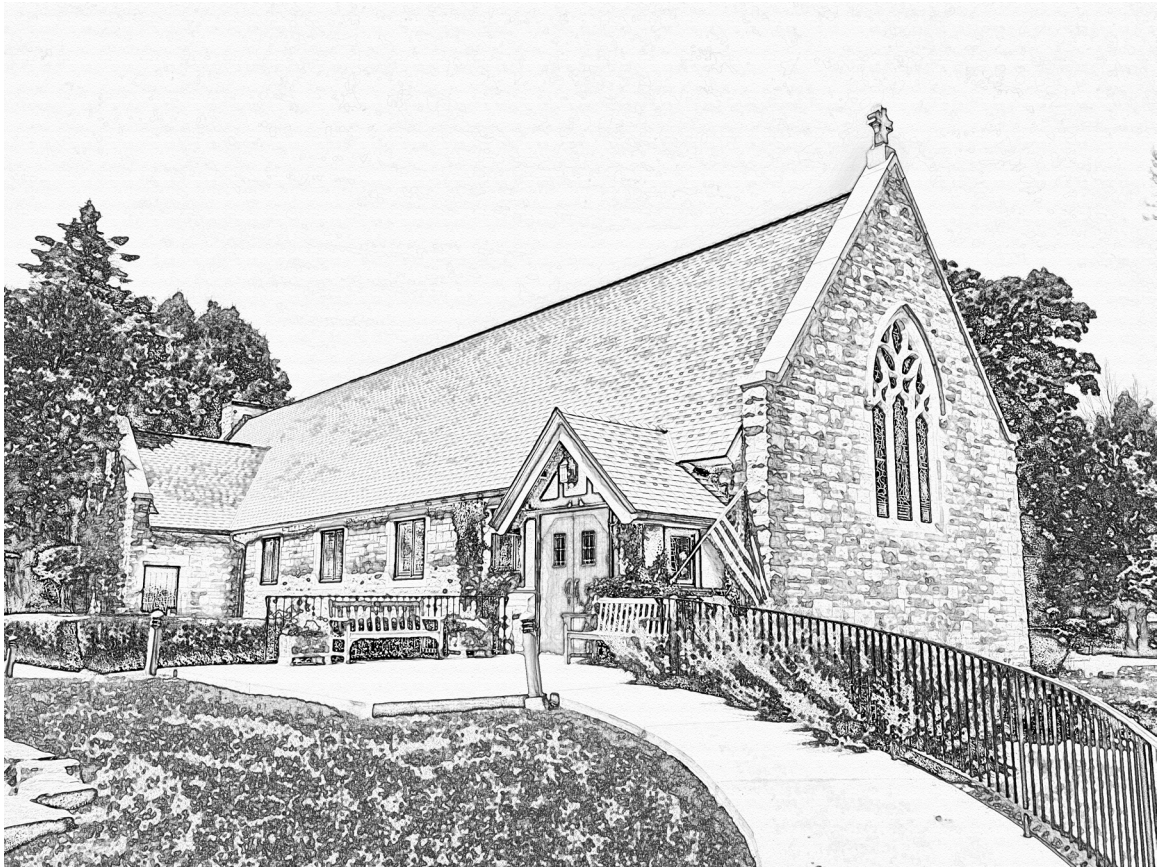

Welcome to Saint Elisabeth's. We are delighted to have you with us today.

We seek to establish meaningful connections with one another through work and play and worship as we strive to understand God's purpose for us in the church and in the world.

In the Church Year: Epiphany

Epiphany is a Greek word meaning “manifestation, showing forth, revelation.” This feast proclaims our faith that in Jesus, God is revealed to all people — not just to an inner circle or a chosen few, but to all people, in all places, and throughout all time. Christians believe that in the person of Jesus we see who God is, and in the words and actions of Jesus we see God at work in the world. Epiphany marks a series of occasions at which Jesus was revealed to be God’s Son.

The feast of Epiphany and the weeks that follow are a time when we reflect on several “manifestations” of Jesus, as he was recognized as the Messiah (or Christ) by many different people. We hear about Jesus’ baptism in the river Jordan by John the Baptist and the visit of the magi, or wise men, who followed the star to Bethlehem at Jesus’ birth. We share the amazement of the guests at the wedding party at Cana as Jesus performs his first miracle by turning water into fine wine. And at the end of the season we see Jesus’ glory shown to three of his disciples on the mountain as he is transfigured before them in a blaze of light. — *Daily Prayer for All Seasons*





The Gospel

Matthew 2:1-12

Gospeler The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.
Assembly **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

‘And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,
 are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;
 for from you shall come a ruler
 who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.



Coming Up at St. Elisabeth's

What Constitutes the Good?

St'E's Book Group will wrestle with Simone Weil's understanding of the Sacred, and the Good, in her essay "*Human Personality*" at 1:00 pm on **Tuesday, January 13**, in the parish meeting room at the top of the stairs. Often defined as a religious and social philosopher, Weil continually asks the question, "Why am I being hurt?" and considers the importance of truth, justice, and love when seeking an answer. Sunday Forum: The Gospel of Matthew

We've spent 2025 reading the Gospel of Luke who spreads the good news of Jesus to the whole world and now turn to Matthew who looks like circling the wagons of Jews for Jesus.

Beginning the First Sunday of Advent – November 30 – we began a year of readings from the Gospel of St. Matthew. Matthew's church is under pressure to solidify their identity as Jewish followers of Jesus. It is a seeming losing battle against many Jewish sects – Pharisees, Sadducees, Essenes and the like.

The Jesus that Matthew tells us about is a new Moses. He is a prophet and teacher. His most notable teachings occur is what we call the Sermon on the Mount. Matthew alone tells this story. The Jesus that Matthew portrays is the real Jewish Messiah, the heir to the throne of David. He comes not to replace the Law, but to fulfill it – to take it another step forward for

the sake of God's reign – the Kingdom of Heaven. He says we are to love our neighbor and our enemy!

I'm excited to share with you a project that a close colleague of mine and I have been working on this past year! We had the idea to create a local early music ensemble, that focuses on promoting high-quality chamber music written in the Medieval, Renaissance, and Baroque Musical eras, and aims to present this music in an environment closer to how it would have been envisioned in the time it was written; not as a formal concert, but as a celebratory and informal gathering in community. Our long-term goal is to develop a local early music festival that each summer would bring artists from all over to share in passing on this incredible musical tradition, and to that end we've started a close-knit, 5-voice chamber ensemble to begin presenting events around the Chicago area — to build interest and audience, and to raise funds for future projects.

The group is made primarily of singers from The Crossing, the chamber ensemble from Philadelphia with whom I recently won a Grammy, and we are very excited to share what we've been working on. We'll be presenting one of our first concerts on **Sunday, January 25**, at 5:30pm, right here in the St. Elisabeth's building – it'll be around an hour of music, spanning from Medieval to Baroque, secular and sacred, presented casually and informally with drinks and refreshments for the audience.

Even though this is not specifically a St. Elisabeth's sponsored "church event," I wanted to share it with all of you in case you might be interested in attending! We'd love your support in the audience, and if you have any friends who love early music we hope you'll invite them.
