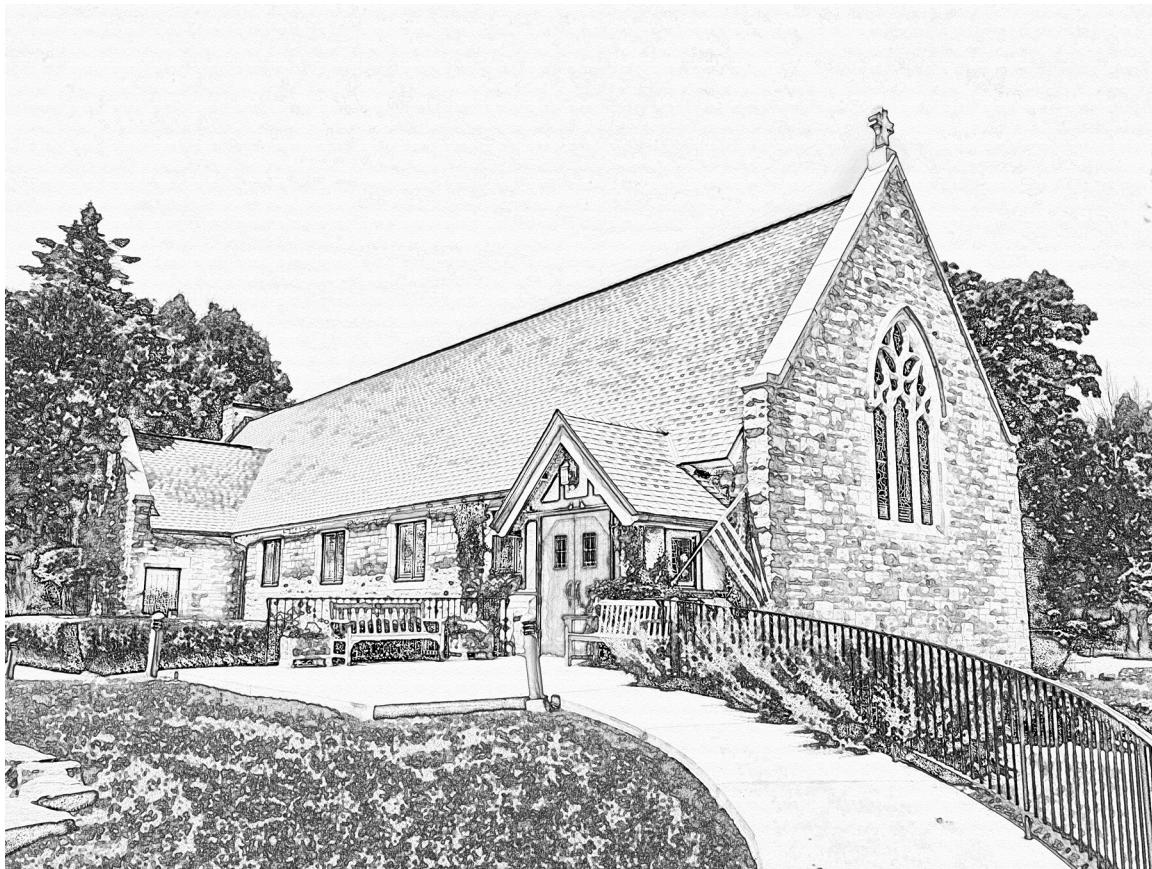

In the Church Year: Ordinary Time

At the beginning of this mundane season, the lectionary relates two stories of what it means to follow God. In Genesis, God asked Abram to leave his home and follow him to a new land. In the New Testament, Jesus asked Matthew, a tax collector, to follow him. In both readings, *following* God was an act of faith. But following also involved some pretty regular things – packing up, venturing out, pitching a tent, having a meal with new friends. Following God – responding to a call – meant leaving a known place for another place, a place that will become a new and different home.

Ordinary Time begins with two journeys, and it reminds us – despite all the supernatural hoopla in the weeks previous – that a spiritual journey isn't something odd or particularly heroic. Spiritual journeys might have surprising turns or courageous moments, but they mostly involve familiar things and commonplace activities.

The months after Pentecost invite both believers and seekers to follow God through the everyday landscapes of life. But it isn't a call to the spiritually humdrum. Instead, following in the midst of the ordinary awakens journeyers to the extraordinariness that surrounds us. Pilgrims are invited to find the unusual, the unbelievable, and the wonder in daily life. Pentecost charts a way through the prosaic to discover the poetry of faith. The mundane is transfigured and magical.

For all the drama of Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost Day, the truth of the matter is that God is the God of Ordinary Time. The Presence is with us in all our ordinary, regular, familiar years. The whole of life is a journey. Sometimes we forget to notice. . . . Oh! Ordinary holds such promise! There's really nothing banal in any life. It is all quite extraordinary. – Diana Butler Bass, *A Beautiful Year*

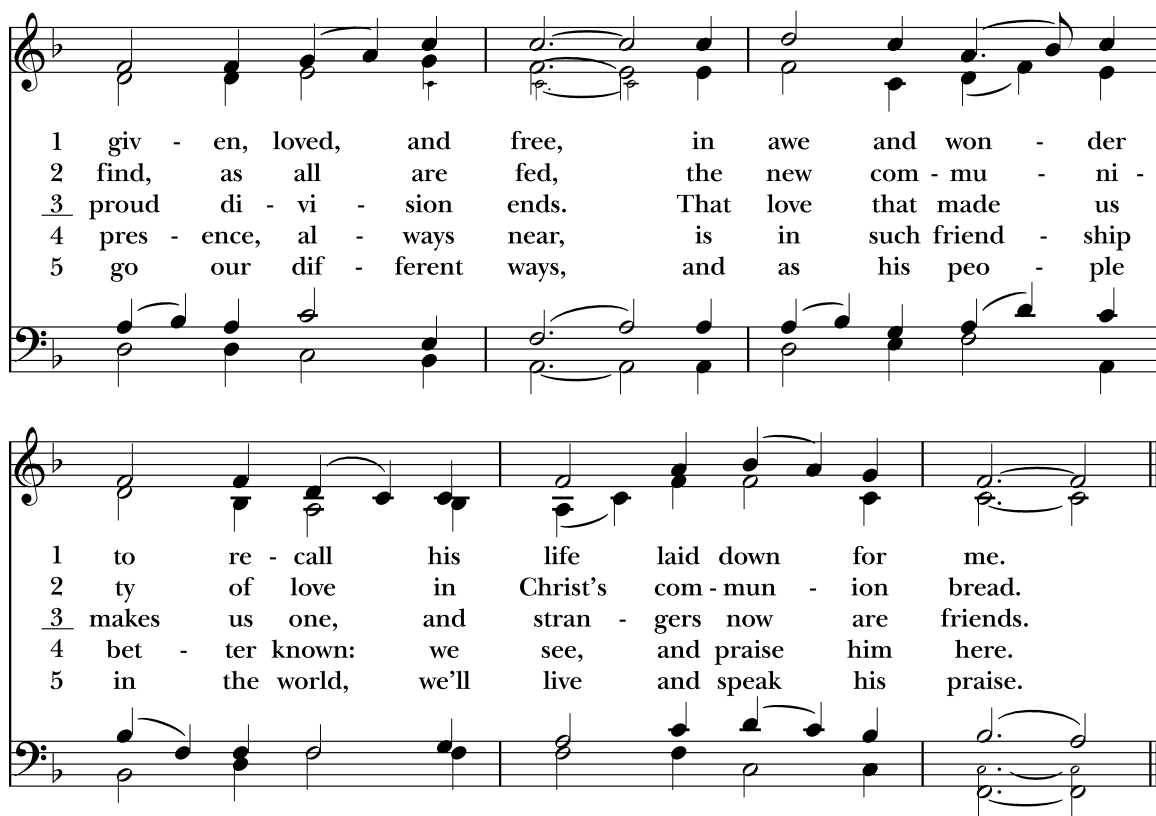

The Reading

Exodus 1:8-2:10

A Reading from the Book of Exodus.

Now a new king arose over Egypt, who did not know Joseph. He said to his people, “Look, the Israelite people are more numerous and more powerful than we. Come, let us deal shrewdly with them, or they will increase and, in the event of war, join our enemies and fight against us and escape from the land.” Therefore they set taskmasters over them to oppress them with forced labor. They built supply cities, Pithom and Rameses, for Pharaoh. But the more they were oppressed, the more they multiplied and spread, so that the Egyptians came to dread the Israelites. The Egyptians became ruthless in imposing tasks on the Israelites, and made their lives bitter with hard service in mortar and brick and in every kind of field labor. They were ruthless in all the tasks that they imposed on them.

The king of Egypt said to the Hebrew midwives, one of whom was named Shiphrah and the other Puah, “When you act as midwives to the Hebrew women, and see them on the birthstool, if it is a boy, kill him; but if it is a girl, she shall live.” But the midwives feared God; they did not do as the king of Egypt commanded them, but they let the boys live. So the king of Egypt summoned the midwives and said to them, “Why have you done this, and allowed the boys to live?” The midwives said to Pharaoh, “Because the Hebrew women are not like the Egyptian women; for they are vigorous and give birth before the midwife comes to them.” So God dealt well with the midwives; and the people multiplied and became very strong. And because the midwives feared God, he gave them families. Then Pharaoh commanded all his people, “Every boy that is born to the Hebrews you shall throw into the Nile, but you shall let every girl live.”

Now a man from the house of Levi went and married a Levite woman. The woman conceived and bore a son; and when she saw that he was a fine baby, she hid him three months. When she could hide him no longer she got a papyrus basket for him, and plastered it with bitumen and pitch; she put the

child in it and placed it among the reeds on the bank of the river. His sister stood at a distance, to see what would happen to him.

The daughter of Pharaoh came down to bathe at the river, while her attendants walked beside the river. She saw the basket among the reeds and sent her maid to bring it. When she opened it, she saw the child. He was crying, and she took pity on him, “This must be one of the Hebrews’ children,” she said. Then his sister said to Pharaoh’s daughter, “Shall I go and get you a nurse from the Hebrew women to nurse the child for you?” Pharaoh’s daughter said to her, “Yes.” So the girl went and called the child’s mother. Pharaoh’s daughter said to her, “Take this child and nurse it for me, and I will give you your wages.” So the woman took the child and nursed it. When the child grew up, she brought him to Pharaoh’s daughter, and she took him as her son. She named him Moses, “because,” she said, “I drew him out of the water.”

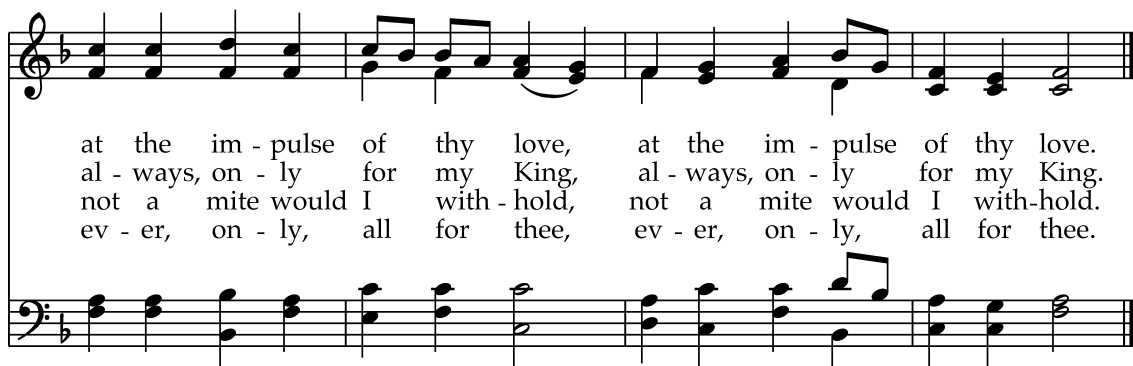

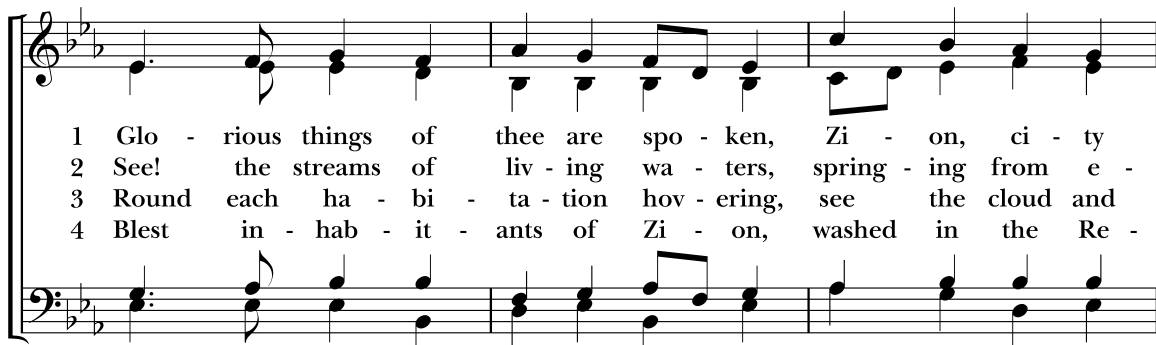

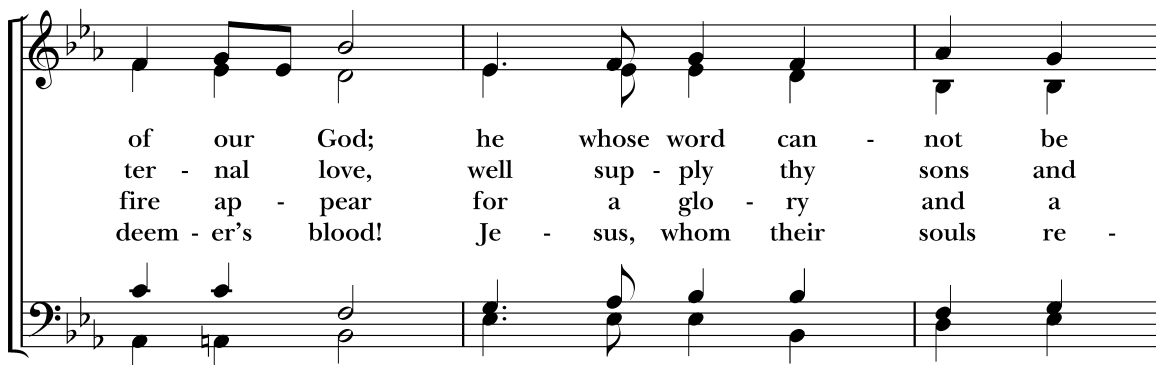
