Re: Councilman Harris-Dawson's Motion re: Padlocking of Unlicensed Cannabis Retailers CF 14-0366-S31

Dear Honorable Members of the Rules Committee and Honorable Members of the Los Angeles City Council:

The Southern California Coalition stands in strong support of Councilman Harris-Dawson's motion to padlock unlicensed cannabis retailers¹ and urges both the Rules Committee and the Council to expedite passage of this motion.

Our organization suggested this alternative in our white paper "Permanent Closure" and we are pleased that this suggestion has been brought forward by Councilman Harris-Dawson. We urge that this motion be passed as quickly as possible for the following reasons:

The Council has previously passed a motion mandating that power be shut off at illegal sites³. Unfortunately, unlicensed operators simply purchased generators and resumed operations⁴. Padlocking properties which are operating illegally now appears to be the only alternative if the City wishes to permanently close these sites.

There is increasing evidence that illegal operators are selling contaminated products to patients and consumers⁵. This is a statewide problem. Most recently, contaminated products sold illegally sent seven people to the hospital⁶.

The City Attorney has been actively prosecuting one entity which engaged in this practice.⁷ We are deeply hopeful that the City will begin routinely testing products sold by illicit operators and prioritize the closure of those poisoning the public.

By padlocking unlicensed cannabis retailers, the City instantly stops all sales making it impossible for contaminated products to flow into the marketplace from the padlocked location.

Padlocking a property provides a powerful incentive for the property owner to cooperate with the City Attorney and expedite the eviction process.

For the reasons stated above, we urge both the Rules Committee and the Council to pass this motion as quickly as possible.
