

We continue to provide food assistance five days a week at our two pantry locations, as well as 24/7 through our deep partnership with Portland Police Bureau who store food boxes at each police precinct that can be dispatched to people in need at any time. We continue the vital service of offering home-deliveries to help meet the growing need of thousands of local families who are experiencing hunger who for various reasons are unable to travel to access food from one of our pantries. With the help of the Portland Police Bureau, over 2,000 volunteers and numerous local supporters, we provided more than 7 million meals to over 300,000 households through our programs.

Our Programs



Food Pantries Open 5 Days A Week

We have two food pantries located in North & Southeast Portland. They are open 5 days a week and are open to the public.

Home-Delivery Service

We launched our emergency home-delivery program at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic and have kept it going to continue offering our services to our most vulnerable neighbors — many of whom have mobility issues or inadequate transportation.





Partnering with First Responders

Our unique partnership with the Portland Police Bureau allows Sunshine Division the ability to identify and respond to hunger issues 24/7. A Sunshine Division food box can be in the hands of a family in crisis within an hour. Roughly 1,000 food boxes are delivered by Portland police officers every year.

Holiday Food Boxes

During the fall and winter holidays, Sunshine Division volunteers and members of the Portland Police Bureau will distribute roughly 500 Thanksgiving boxes and deliver 2,500 December holiday boxes to Portlanders in need. The boxes contain everything needed to make a holiday meal.





Izzy's Kids "Shop with a Cop"

Through our Izzy's Kids fund, Sunshine Division teams up with the Portland Police Bureau to provide nearly 500 low-income children with new school clothing at a local Fred Meyer store.
