




HISTORY OF ST. FRANCIS CHURCH

October 1954 - October 2024 - Celebrating 70 Years

St. Francis Church was organized in October 1954 as a mission of Holy Trinity Parish. The first service was held in Irving Park Elementary School in November 1954, with 104 people attending. A Charter Scroll was signed in the Octave of Epiphany 1955, at which time 180 baptized people formally transferred their membership to the new mission. Construction of the church building began in July 1955, the cornerstone was laid in October, and the first service was held on Christmas Day in 1955. St. Francis became an independent parish in union with the Diocese of North Carolina in 1956. The assistant rector of Holy Trinity, the Rev. Peter Robinson, became the first rector and served for 20 years.



The St. Francis Day School was founded in 1964. The Day School provides a preschool experience in a faith-centered environment that nurtures children spiritually, intellectually, socially, and physically as it prepares them to be engaged students and good citizens.



The St. Francis Book Sale was started in 1958 and is one of St. Francis' prominent community programs. The proceeds go to local outreach programs.



Each year St. Francis Church invites the Greensboro community to celebrate the Blessing of the Animals honoring the Feast of St. Francis on the first Sunday of October.

We embrace the values of our namesake, St. Francis, and take them to heart: Simplicity. Compassion. Hope.

We practice these values internally, as we support and minister to the families of our congregation, Youth Ministry and Day School.

Equally important, these values are evidenced in our Outreach Ministries and activities. We care about the community in which we live and work to make it a better place for all.

ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

Saint Francis of Assisi was born Giovanni di Pietro di Bernardone, but nicknamed Francesco; was an Italian Catholic friar and preacher. On July 16, 1228, he was proclaimed a saint by Pope Gregory IX. He is known as the patron saint of animals and the environment, and is one of the two patron saints of Italy. It is customary for Catholic and Anglican churches to hold ceremonies blessing animals on his feast day of October 4th.

Francis preached to man and beast the universal ability and duty of all creatures to praise God and the duty of men to protect and enjoy nature as both the stewards of God's creation and as creatures ourselves.

Perhaps the most famous incident that illustrates the Saint's humility towards nature is recounted in the "Fioretti" ("Little Flowers"), a collection of legends and folklore that sprang up after the Saint's death. It is said that, one day, while Francis was travelling with some companions, they happened upon a place in the road where birds filled the trees on either side. Francis told his companions to "wait for me while I go to preach to my sisters the birds." The birds surrounded him, intrigued by the power of his voice, and not one of them flew away. He is often portrayed with a bird, typically in his hand.

Another legend from the Fioretti tells that in the city of Gubbio, where Francis lived for some time, was a wolf "terrifying and ferocious, who devoured men as well as animals." Francis had compassion upon the townsfolk, and so he went up into the hills to find the wolf. Soon, fear of the animal had caused all his companions to flee, though the saint pressed on. When he found the wolf, he made the sign of the cross and commanded the wolf to come to him and hurt no one. Miraculously the wolf closed his jaws and lay down at the feet of St. Francis.

The most faithful follower of St. Francis was Clare Offreduccio. (1193-1253) Together they are credited with founding the Franciscan movement. It is said that the greatest gifts Francis and Clare leave for us are a deeply rooted desire for God, a fervent commitment to prayer, and a life that generates action.

Francis is also credited with the idea of presenting the first live nativity scene using live animals and people. It was held in a cave in Assisi during Francis' lifetime using local villagers and their animals.



THE NICENE CREED




