As much as I wish the universe would stop and time would stand still, just for a moment, I know that that

cannot be. I can however, choose to enter into a different time, a holy time, and a God time. When we choose to enter into God's time, and when we choose to accept the invitation of this Advent season to enter into a realm of joyful anticipation and active waiting, then, I believe we will be in time to witness the miracle of Christmas.

Please mark your check in the amount you choose to give, with "Flower Fund," and place it in the offertory plate or bring it to the church office. **The deadline is Sunday, Dec. 15, so don't delay!**

2020 ALTAR FLOWER CHART IS UP!

The 2020 Flower Chart is posted in the hallway beside the Sacristy. Altar flowers, given to the glory of God, are provided each Sunday through your generous gifts made in memory of, in celebration or honor of the important people or events in our lives, and we are grateful for this beautiful support of St. Francis worship.

Guidelines:

- The donation is \$65.00. Specific flower requests may be honored for an additional fee. Local and seasonal flowers will be the preferred choice. More than one family may sign up for each Sunday. (Please no more than two families.) The donation is \$35.00 each when sharing.
- Please use your first and last name when signing up.
- Please note that as the flowers are a gift given to the glory of God, arrangements will be broken down at the end of the service and distributed to those in need in the parish family by loving volunteers, and therefore will not be available to be taken home by the donor.

The wording of the flower dedications are requested from the donor the Monday before the Sunday which you are giving flowers. Editing may occur with the wording. Final flower arrangement decisions will be made to be consistent with Church tradition. Special Flower Days: Palm Sunday - Palms; Easter Sunday - many dedications; Pentecost - Red Flowers - people can dedicate; Sunday before School Starts - Day School and Church; and Christmas Flowers - many dedications.

Over time, those young people grew up, graduated and moved on leaving primarily adults behind to continue.

Some people, youth specifically, may not know they can volunteer for Heaven Help Us, so let me formally invite you! If you play an instrument, or if your voice is your instrument, you are invited to join us. You may feel called to a certain time of year for one service, or you may want to be a regular.
