### NCC SUBMITS REPLY COMMENTS ON LIFELINE AND POLE ATTACHMENT POLICIES.

NCC followed up on [comments](#) filed on April 20, 2020, which explained the impact that the FCC's reclassification of broadband services under Title I could have on the stability of the Lifeline program. [The May 18th reply comments](#) reiterated why the Lifeline program is a tool for local officials seeking ways to connect low-income residents. NCC stressed why de facto pole attachment policies could interfere with broadband deployment.

### NCC HOSTS DISCUSSION URGING LOCAL LEADERS TO PARTICIPATE IN STATE AND FEDERAL POLICYMAKING.

On May 27, 2020, Next Century Cities hosted a webinar led by policy experts and researchers from Pew Charitable Trusts and Benton Institute for Broadband & Society. Kathryn de Wit and Jon Sallet [identified ways for local officials to engage in state and federal policy-making](#). **NCC Has Asked the FCC to Strengthen the Lifeline Program. Its Plan to Streamline the Application Process for Rural Tribal Consumers Is A Step in the Right Direction.** As part of ongoing COVID-19 relief efforts, on June 1, 2020, the FCC [announced](#) plans to ease application and enrollment process rules for Lifeline consumers living on rural Tribal lands. For local officials working desperately to connect low-income residents with broadband services, it means that more of those in need will be able to use Lifeline as a tool to get and stay connected. The new eligibility updates will be in effect until August 31, 2020. Read more [here](#).

**NCC Participates in Aspen Digital Roundtable on COVID-19 and high-speed Connectivity.** Telecommunications and technology policy experts [convened for a roundtable discussion](#) on ways to expand broadband access in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. During the May 27th meeting, NCC's Francella Ochillo shared insights on unique connectivity challenges that local officials and communities continue to face in the wake of COVID-19.

### How the Consumer Technology Association is Supporting Efforts to Connect Houston Residents

The [Consumer Technology Association \(CTA\)](#) is a member-based standards and trade organization representing 2,200 companies nationwide. It advocates and provides space for the technology industry to share and advance innovative practices. CTA also hosts the annual Consumer Electronics Show, a platform for tech influencers to display emerging technologies and share ideas.

In addition to hosting convenings for tech industry experts, CTA has a commitment to giving back through the service arm of the organization, The Consumer Technology Association Foundation. The CTA Foundation centers service through technology. In fact, one of the organization's focuses is helping individuals gain broadband access, master technology, and navigate online. [CTA has provided \\$700,000 in grant funding](#) toward this cause, partnering with several organizations nationwide.

One of the organizations directly benefiting from the CTA Foundation is the [Houston chapter of Easter Seals](#). The chapter's [BridgingApps](#) program teaches differently-abled and senior residents how to use mobile devices to enhance their daily lives. Both populations are among those most likely to struggle with broadband adoption. With the help of funding from the CTA Foundation, Easter Seals of Greater Houston will be able expand the BridgingApps resources and its website.

Next Century Cities works to amplify initiatives that help improve broadband adoption. The initiatives supported by CTA are an example of efforts needed to close the digital divide.

**Zanesville, OH:** The results of an Ohio University survey led by Dr. Laeq Khan are detailed in a study titled “Digital inequality in the Appalachian Ohio: Understanding how demographics, internet access, and skills can shape vital information use”. The study reveals that [overwhelmingly unreliable Internet access in the Appalachian region of Ohio has contributed to developmental gaps among residents](#). Zanesville, OH, an NCC member city, is among the Appalachian Ohio cities.

**Wilson, NC:** A recent episode of NPR’s Planet Money podcast sat down with Grant Goings, Wilson’s city manager, to discuss what happened when Wilson residents decided to [build their own fiber optic network](#).

**Cedar Falls and Ottumwa, IA:** Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds [announced \\$26.2 million in federal relief funding](#) to expand broadband access for unserved and underserved students in communities across the state. The grant is part of the Governor’s Emergency Education Relief Fund authorized by the CARES Act. The state is currently conducting surveys among families with primary, secondary, and postsecondary students to determine which areas have the greatest need.

**New Hampshire Electric Cooperative (NHEC) Wants to Expand to Include Broadband.** The NHEC has more than 80,000 customers in 115 communities across the state of New Hampshire. The cooperative argues that expanding their offerings to include broadband, would help connect areas with little or unreliable access. [If successful, NHEC would be the first cooperative in the northeastern part of the United States to offer broadband service.](#) **New Hampshire** is home to three NCC municipalities, **Bedford, Hanover, and Keene.**



## BROADBAND NEWS

House Majority Whip James E. Clyburn (SC-06) and U.S. Representative Fred Upton (MI-06) introduced the [Rural Broadband Acceleration Act](#) on May 28th. The bill directs the Federal Communications Commission to immediately fund high-speed internet projects, providing reliable broadband access to residents within a year's time. ([The Wall Street Journal](#))

Neil D'Souza and Lawrence Kosick founded GetSetup to acclimate older adults to digital technology. The site houses Zoom courses that teach seniors how to order groceries online, navigate healthcare websites, and add rideshare applications like Uber to their smartphones. ([Forbes](#))
