Presenter Biographies

AMANDA ADAMS is a South-Central Region Family Engagement Transition Coach for the Mississippi Department of Education's Office of Early Childhood. She received her Bachelor's Degree in Child Life and her Master's Degree in Early Intervention from the University of Southern Mississippi. After spending 10 years as the early interventionist at Children's of Mississippi, Ms. Adams went on to be an early childhood classroom coach and evaluator. She lives in Jackson with her husband and two sons and serve on the Board of Directors for Children's Advocacy Centers of Mississippi.

JAECELYN ARMSTRONG currently serves as the Division Director of the Educational Scholarship Account (ESA) for the Office of Special Education at the Mississippi Department of Education (MDE). Her responsibilities include administering the operations of the ESA. She has a Master's Degree in Secondary Education from Belhaven University and obtained a Bachelor's Degree in Special Education from Jackson State University. Her background includes years of experience teaching special needs students grades K-12. In addition to teaching, Ms. Armstrong served as a Special Education Coordinator, a Registered Behavior Technician and a Behavior Specialist. Ms. Armstrong has led multiple professional development sessions regarding instruction to special needs students in the general education classroom.

KEVIN BISHOP began his state service with the Mississippi Department of Rehabilitation Services in 1990 as an Evaluator at Allied Enterprises of Monroe County. The following year, he transferred to the Evaluator position at Allied Enterprises of Laurel. In 1993, Mr. Bishop was promoted to Facility Manager at Allied Enterprises of Harrison County. During his time, he oversaw the development of multiple contracts including federal contracts through SourceAmerica, the construction of a new facility, and Hurricane Katrina. In 2006, Mr. Bishop was promoted to Regional Manager in South Mississippi overseeing the operations of all AbilityWorks Community Rehabilitation Programs (formally known as Allied Enterprises) and Vocational Rehabilitation activities. In 2018, Mr. Bishop was promoted to Director of Client Services, which he held until this year when he was promoted to Deputy Administrator of Workforce for MDRS. Mr. Bishop did his studies at the University of Southern Mississippi. He currently lives in Long Beach, MS with his wife Marsha and their three children.

PAM DOLLAR has advocated on a State and national level for improved services and programs for people with disabilities for nearly two decades. Ms. Dollar has served as Family Coordinator for Mississippi's State Professional Development Grant (REACH MS), Chairperson of the Mississippi Special Education Advisory Panel and was a member of the Mississippi Extended School Year Handbook Committee. Pam has served on numerous other boards,

committees, and task forces, in an effort to ensure that all individuals with disabilities succeed. She travels throughout the State speaking to various groups about Autism, special education and parental issues and concerns. Through her extensive involvement, she has helped improve services for individuals with disabilities and received numerous awards for her work. Most importantly, she is mom to Watson, an incredible young man who has Autism.

JENNIFER FULCHER is the Director of the Division of ID/DD Waiver with the Department of Mental Health. Ms. Fulcher has more than 18 years of experience including eight years in the ID/DD Waiver program. Ms. Fulcher served in several different roles during her seven years with the Division of Medicaid including providing oversight of the Bridge to Independence Program, which helped transition people from institutional programs to the community. She partnered with state agencies to develop state and federal policies in her role as Director of the Office of Community Based Services.

DENISE HARRISON is a Professional Development Coordinator with the University of Mississippi and the Mississippi Department of Education-Office of Special Education. She has seventeen years of experience teaching general education and special education preschool and elementary students. Thirteen of those years, Ms. Harrison taught students with significant cognitive deficits. Ms. Harrison earned her Master

of Education degree in Special Education from Arkansas State University. She received her National Board Certification in 2011.

CHRIS HOWARD serves the great State of Mississippi as Executive Director of the Mississippi Department of Rehabilitation Services, a position he has held since 2015. Mr. Howard has been with the agency since 2000, also serving in the capacities of Director of Internal Audit, Director of Financial Management and Deputy Executive Director. She has been a Parent Liaison with Early Intervention for 14 years. Ms. Junkin has served as a member of the MS Dept. of Education's Special Education Advisory Panel, Institute for Disability Studies Family to Family Advisory Committee, Ameri Corp member with LIFE and the Arc of MS; board member with the NE MS Down Syndrome Society and The Arc of Lowndes County. Ms. Junkin's most important job is being mom to, Isabella, her 20-year-old daughter that has Down syndrome and Type 1 diabetes.

HEATHER MARTIN has a degree in Psychology from Mississippi State University and a degree in Elementary Education from Blue Mountain College. Ms. Martin has 16 years of teaching experience with the Houston School District, where she was named Teacher of the Year multiple times.
