Please read Matthew 9:9-13 as you prepare to respond

After Jesus had called Matthew -a tax collector- to follow him, he entered his house, where he sat at table with other “tax collectors and sinners.” And when he was criticized, Jesus felt the need to explain his calling to those who wanted to put him and his ministry in a box with predefined dimensions. He did not come to call those who consider themselves healthy, he says, but rather the “sick,” who admit their need for wholeness and healing. Jesus does not abide by the rules of the religious institutions of the time, neither does he model his ministry after the existing structures. But rather, he taps into his own sense of calling, and follows the Spirit’s direction to define the identity of his ministry, and to reach those he is called to gather, teach and heal. It is with this awareness that Jesus lives out his calling, and to this wakefulness that he calls those who come to be his disciples.

I. We are called to self-awareness too. Our ministry to others follows our self- knowledge and is fueled by our connection to the source of our calling.

As we live our post-pandemic reality, so many of our compasses were lost and we have needed to redefine ourselves, faithfully discerning the areas that we need to let go of, and those we need to put more energy into.
