NGA CHAU, Bethany PC

In 1975 when South Vietnam fell to the Communists, many people tried to escape from Vietnam. I was living with family in a small town. My father committed suicide six months after the fall of South Vietnam because he was working as a doctor for the French when France colonized South Vietnam, and he felt his family was in danger from the Communists even though he was already retired.

My two brothers and my brother-in-law were sent to the re-education camp, a jail. I was not allowed to go to college because my family was connected to the former government. Instead I was sent to the fields for hard labor.

Eventually I was allowed in college for the government needed teachers. I still was being sent to the fields to dig trenches on the campus.

I met a friend, Kim Chi, who gave me the idea to escape from Vietnam. I came back home from school to visit and met a teacher from the high school who was rebuilding an old fishing boat to escape from Vietnam.

So I left Vietnam with my brother and my friend Kim Chi on October 22, 1980 in the old fishing boat with the teacher and a total of 47 people. Most of us were hidden under a canvas so it appeared a small group of people were going fishing in the ocean.

October was the storm season in Vietnam. In the ocean we experienced several storms and lost direction. We were just floating on the ocean. We saw many ships passing by. They took our picture but passed us by without stopping.

We were on the ocean three days and the third night there was a big storm coming. We were bailing water out of the boat. With the big storm coming we knew we would not survive the storm. We knew we would either drown or be killed by pirates that were around in the ocean. Pirates were robbing escapees, killing the men and raping the women.

The teacher who was in charge told everyone to pray to whatever God they believed in. My father had been Catholic and my mother Buddhist. I was on the boat praying in Buddhist prayers. I was looking at the dark water and wondering if I was going to die in this water.

Then after my prayer I looked up, and I saw a small white triangle in the midst of the dark. That triangle kept coming closer and then there was an American ship with the American flag. That big commercial ship turned to protect us from the waves. They lowered a rope ladder, and we climbed up and were rescued. After we were on the ship, we could see all the small lights out in the ocean. The ship's captain told us those were the pirate boats. He said either we would have died that night from the storm or from being killed by the pirates.

The ship had seen us from far away, and the second in charge told the captain that if they turned around and stopped to rescue us, they would miss their deadline in Thailand. But the Captain told him that he was a Christian and he could not let those people die that night. He called back to his company and the commercial ship turned around and rescued us all.

We were taken to Thailand, and we were put in a refugee camp there. Every night the men in our group would surround the women's section to protect us and keep us safe from the pirates who might come to rape the women refugees. My brother and I were baptized by the American missionary at the refugee camp. We were baptized in the ocean.

Four months later, my brother and I and my friend Kim Chi, were sponsored by a Vietnamese Catholic Church in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. We were there for a month and then came to Sacramento because Kim Chi had a brother who had come a year earlier to Sacramento from Vietnam.

We were living near Sacramento City College and attending an Episcopal Church nearby. The minister there told us that Rev. Ninh Van Nguyen had a Bible Study Group at Bethany Presbyterian Church. So we came to Bethany.

I went to college for ten years to get my Masters Degree in Social Work. During that time I worked at the South East Asian Assistance Center at Bethany Presbyterian Church which was directed by Rev. Nguyen and later Jan Hunt. I have just retired after 34 years as a social worker in the Child Protective Services Program for Sacramento County Department of Health and Human Services.

My husband Manh Ong and I have two married children and two grandchildren. We have been members of Bethany since 1983.
