Norma Pollack—Librarian and Editor Beyond Compare

(Editor's Note: News & Views has introduced a new feature, highlighting a different synagogue member each month. Long-time member Norma Pollack is the subject of this month's profile.)

When I first approached Norma Pollack about featuring her in the June issue of **News & Views**, she responded that she was honored. But what struck me more was how humble she sounded. It was as if she couldn't understand why anyone would be interested in her life. Norma, we are!

Norma Pearl Feinblum was born in the Bronx on April 11. Her brother David was born a few years later. Norma's mother was also a native New Yorker; her father was born in Russia but grew up in Buenos Aires.

Norma received her Jewish education through Workman's Circle, which she attended from age 7 through high school. It was at Workman's Circle that Norma learned Yiddish. Norma's father spoke Yiddish and Spanish, and Norma needed to learn these languages to communicate with her grandparents.

Norma received her secular education at William Howard Taft High School in the Bronx. When she was 15, she attended a New Year's Eve party at the home of a friend. A handsome young man named Irving was one of a group of 6 young men who were invited to the party. Norma and Irving spent the evening talking, and the rest, as they say, is history. Norma and Irving got married 4½ years later when she was only 19 and he was 20. Both Norma and Irving were students at Hunter College when they got married, and the newlyweds moved into an apartment in the Bronx. Norma eventually earned a BA in Spanish with a minor in German from Hunter College, and after graduation worked as a bilingual secretary for a foreign securities firm in New York for many years, while Irving had a career in data processing for a French bank.

Norma and Irving moved from the Bronx to Fair Lawn in 1968, and became members of the Fair Lawn Jewish Center within a year. Their daughter Lisa was born in 1972, and Norma devoted herself to motherhood full time. Lisa had her Bat Mitzvah at the Fair Lawn Jewish Center, and was married in the sanctuary. Lisa and her husband Louis now live in West Roxbury, MA with their 11-year-old daughter Ida, who was named for Norma's mother.

Norma shared how much she has enjoyed being a member of the Fair Lawn Jewish Center for over 50 years. You name it, Norma has done it. She has served on the Board of Directors for about 30 years, and was the librarian at the Max E. and Anna Bornstein Library for 31 years before it was closed a few years ago. In addition, Norma was active on the Religious School Committee, serving as the school's secretary when Lisa was a student there, and has been a member of the Religious Affairs Committee since her earliest days as a synagogue member. Finally, Norma served as the editor of **News & Views** for over 20 years, finally "retiring" this past March.



Norma and Irving have been regular shul-goers, attending all Shabbas and Yuntif services until very recently. They still attend via Zoom and livestream every week—it's something Norma looks forward to. Over the years, the most noteworthy change Norma has observed at the synagogue is the inclusion of women—in her words, watching women become "real people" at the shul. She loves that women now have aliyot, read from the Torah, and can participate fully in all aspects of religious observance. Norma has taken full advantage of these opportunities, including serving as Gabbai for many years.

Norma, we are so glad that you are part of our Center Family, and truly appreciate all you have given to us over the years. Todah Rabah and Yasher Koach!

RABBINIC REFLECTIONS

Shalom! It's June and Sivan! That means that immediately after the holiday of Shavuot, the holiday of the giving of the Torah, known as our wedding ceremony to the Holy Blessing One, Jewish Wedding Season officially commences. As in our American culture, summertime is a very popular choice for wedding dates. Weddings take place on or after Lag ba'Omer and in particular after Shavuot, when the Omer concludes. Weddings may then continue for another month, until Shiva Asar b'Tamuz (17th of Tamuz), observed this year on Sunday, July 17. Then there is a pause in our rejoicing.

The 17th of Tamuz marks the anniversary of the breaching of the walls of Jerusalem by the Babylonians in 586 BCE. Three weeks later, on Tisha b'Av (9th of Av), that First Temple was destroyed. In the summer of 70 CE, our Rabbis teach, the Romans destroyed the Second Temple on the 9th of Av. Several calamities of Jewish memory have taken place on Tisha b'Av and it is thus our deepest day of mourning and fasting. During the 3 weeks leading up to Tisha b'Av, we abstain from public celebrations and on the 9 days immediately preceding the day, we mourn more intensely and do not drink wine or eat meat (except on Shabbat). And then, after the 10th of Av, we return to our lives and then 5 days later, on Tu b'Av (the 15th) we celebrate what could be called Jewish Love Day. The 15th of Av was the day when our young female ancestors would put on white dresses and dance in the fields as debutantes. It is an auspicious day to get married. Our Jewish calendar, particularly in the summer months, within days, vacillates from light mourning (the Omer period); to our greatest joy and closeness to God (Shavuot); to extreme mourning, sitting on the floor, fasting, and wailing; to rejoicing. It's really a model of life as a Jew, which is itself a model of life as a human being.

Every Jewish event, weddings in particular, take place as part of the collective memory of the Jewish people. We remember the destruction of Jerusalem at every wedding, breaking a glass at the end and often singing the 5th and 6th verses of Psalm 137, "If I forget you, O Jerusalem, let my right hand wither; let my tongue stick to my palate if I cease to think of you, if I do not keep Jerusalem in memory even at my happiest hour." And then immediately after the glass breaks, we shout "Mazel tov!", sing, and dance. Because Jews can never be perfectly happy. But a wedding is about as close as we can come because love is the opposite of destruction.

One of the cores of the Jewish wedding is the recitation of Sheva Brakhot (seven blessings). They are some of the most beautiful liturgy we have. Even reading the brakhot as I write this article, I feel chills and nearly tears in my eyes. Blessings 5-7 are as follows (with my mostly gender-neutral translation):

5. May the Barren One (Jerusalem) rejoice as her children are gathered together, returning to her in joy. Praised are you, Hashem, source of joy

for this couple.

6. Grant perfect joy to these beloved friends even as you brought joy to the first couple in the Garden of Eden. Praised are you, Hashem, source of joy for this couple.
7. Praised are you, Hashem, our God, Sovereign of the universe, who has created joy and happiness, companions, delight, song, gladness and laughter, love and harmony, peace and companionship. May it be soon, Hashem, our God, when the voices of joy and happiness, the voices of groom and bride, the jubilant voices of loving companions beneath the huppah, the voices of young people celebrating and singing, be heard in the towns of Judah and in the squares of Jerusalem. Praised are you, Hashem, who inspires this couple to rejoice together.

Every Jewish wedding is a step in the direction of our redemption. The Messianic Era, the Rebuilding of the Temple, World Peace, whatever the beautiful future we all pray for looks like. Every Jewish partnership is another celebration that makes the world perfect for a moment. We pray for their future family and the promise that brings. Two families are made one.

By the way, as an informational aside, the form of Jewish marriage that I practice is not acquisition but the formalization of a partnership. No bride is "given away" by her father in a Jewish wedding. Both partners are walked down the aisle linked arms with both their parents (or closest family members). All of this immediate wedding party stands under the huppah together. The couple are creating a new home (the huppah symbolizes the house they establish together) with the support and presence of their two (now one) families. This can also be summed up in the remarkable fact that Hebrew and Yiddish have titles for one's child's parents-in-law, mehutanim/mahatanim (the ones that we're related to "from the groom").

Jews are pretty well known for mourning; we're the people who cry for our Temple that was destroyed 2000 years ago. But we're also really good at rejoicing. Every partnership, every family, every new life has the ability to make the world a better place. More love in the world is the answer to hate and destruction. Celebrating love is an obligation. It is the incumbent on the guests of a wedding to gladden (I don't think I've ever used this verb form in any other context than as a translation of the Hebrew, me'sa'meah, actively bringing joy to another) the couple, who are the guests of honor, unlike how it can so often seem that the couple are the entertaining hosts. We do this because the source of our joy and indeed God's joy, must be overjoyed themselves. A wedding is a taste of a redeemed and rebuilt world. I look forward to celebrating with all of you.

PRESIDENTIAL PONDERINGS

We've reached the midpoint of my two-year term as FLJC President. This seems like a good time to look back over the year we just wrapped up and call out some of the high and low points.

Everything that we have done for the first 12 months of my term, and for the 14 months before that, has been overshadowed by one word: **COVID**. Last May, we thought that COVID was winding down and that life would be returning to normal. And it did, more or less, for a few months, until the end of the year, when we were hit by the worst COVID surge we've seen. By February, things were returning to normal, and in March we eased our restrictions. But even today, as I write this document, things are getting bad again. New York and other states are beginning to "strongly urge" people to wear masks when they are indoors. Clearly COVID is not going away any time soon, despite our hopes and efforts.

The Reopening Committee, chaired by Len Margolis and Bert Wertheim, have worked closely with me over the last year to come up with rules, guidelines, and policies for vaccination and masking in the building. We have worked hard to balance health needs with convenience and comfort. We want to maintain our history of being a warm and welcoming institution, but at the same time we want to keep our members safe.

I have always felt that in general, disputes and disagreements can be worked out through the art of compromise. However, with COVID I have learned that this is not always true. The single most challenging aspect of my year in office has been the very strong and difficult disagreements over how we deal with the pandemic.

I'd like to take a moment and drill into one specific aspect of the COVID conversation. There are many FLJC/CBI members who feel that they simply cannot come in person to the building for Shabbat services, for totally valid health reasons. They find the livestream inadequate to meet their needs. (We are working to improve it.) They want to be able to access services remotely with Zoom, as they did during the worst of COVID. But re-enabling Zoom requires reinstalling a camera and TV monitor in the sanctuary and running wires between them. The presence of electronics in the sanctuary upsets many people who attend services in person. They argue that the presence and operation of the gear violates the sanctity of Shabbat and intrudes on their spiritual expression. The livestream is an attempt at a compromise; it is less intrusive and does not violate the restrictions of Shabbat, but many people find it to be inadequate. (To be sure, the argument is more complex than that, but this is just a brief summary.)

This is an extremely difficult dilemma where, when we try to please one group, we anger the other. It is my

sincere hope that we can find some sort of middle ground.

One thing that we are going to start to do is acknowledge some of the happy things that some of our members (who cannot attend services and socialize with their fellow congregants) would like to share. We are going to try to aim this initiative at congregants who attend services via the Livestream. If you are a regular Livestream attendee and you have something to share, please email it to me at evan.marcus@gmail.com, and I will work some of them into my closing announcements at the end of services. This will begin on June 4.

COVID aside, I am very proud of many of the things we have accomplished this year. We have merged our religious school with the school at the Jewish Community Center of Paramus/Congregation Beth Tikvah (JCCP), and the combined schools are operating very well as the Community Hebrew School of Bergen County (CHSBC). As an offshoot of that success, we have formed an alliance with the four other Conservative synagogues in our immediate area: the FLJC/CBI, JCCP, Temple Beth Sholom, Temple Israel in Ridgewood, and the Glen Rock Jewish Center, forming a group we are calling the Bergen County Synagogue Alliance (BCSA). The BCSA's goals are to promote goodwill and cooperation between the member synagogues, and to put together some joint events, like the June 21st golf outing. We're also working to organize a summer barbecue in July. Details to come. We all know people in at least one of the other shuls, so there's no reason for relations between us to be anything but friendly, and we are trying to build on that.

Also:

- We welcomed Cantor Yoni Stokar to our community and to our services. He and his family have been a wonderful addition to our community!
- We are once again offering the large ballroom as a catering facility, and people who wish to hold an event here can work with a variety of Glatt kosher caterers, through our Catering Committee, chaired by Scott Pass.
- We are continuing to rent out much of the building during the week to our friends at Naaleh, the Orthodox girls' school, generating significant revenue.
- Rabbi Salston's Tot Shabbat program is growing by leaps and bounds. We are drawing a nice little crowd every other Shabbat before services. It's a delight to see.
- We have transitioned the editorship of **News & Views** from Norma Pollack, after at least 30 years of service (Thank you, Norma!) to Carol Marcus.
- Our Social Action Committee is as active as it's ever been and they continue to do great work, thanks to Mark Meisel and his team.
- We have formed a Chesed Committee, led by Mi-

chael Baer, focused on making sure that congregants who are ill and need help and support from the FLJC receive it.

- Arline Herman is overseeing an initiative to co-sponsor and share programming specifically targeted at our senior population.
- We introduced the livestream to our Shabbat services, managed by Seth Seigel-Laddy, enabling homebound members to watch our services.
- We patched up a bunch of issues in the parking lot and touched up many of the lines.

I'm sure I've left out some other important things, but space is limited. My apologies if your project was excluded.

I want to wrap up by thanking Abe Adler, who ended his three-year run as our full-time Executive Director in March, but has hung on in a part-time role, as he and his wife prepare to relocate to Chicago. We have a committee hard at work looking for a full-time replacement for him, but in the meantime, Abe has agreed to give us as much time as he can. So, thanks to Abe, and special thanks to Rosemary Cerracchio, our exceptional Office Manager, for all they do every day. Thanks, too, to Gilda Winters and Marge Zarcone. This superlative group of people keep the place running day after day after day.

On June 12, we will gather to celebrate and honor Rabbi Salston's Installation as our Rabbi at FLJC/CBI.

Rabbi Rachel Iris Salston earned her rabbinic ordination and Master of Arts in Rabbinic Studies from the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies, earning the USCJ Award for Congregational Leadership. She is a proud alumna of Brandeis University. Rabbi Salston has learned Torah full-time at Yeshivat Hadar and the Conservative Yeshiva. She continues her personal Torah study through regular courses offered by her alma maters and other institutions. Last year, Rabbi Salston became a certified Mikveh Guide.

She has brought to our community her extensive experience teaching adult education and youth programs. She has a passion for social justice and human rights, and has put this passion to work on travels with American Jewish World Service and Jewish Joint Distribution Committee. Continuing this work, Rabbi Salston was appointed to the Rabbinical Assembly's Social Justice Commission Human Rights Subcommittee.

A Soferet STaM (ritual scribe), Rabbi Salston brings extensive knowledge and hands-on experience of the creation and repair of Torah Scrolls, tefillin, Mezuzot, and Megillot. She has taught our Hebrew School and Men's Progress Club about the construction of tefillin. She has been inspecting and repairing the synagogue's collection of tefillin so that they may be used by attendees of our weekday minyan.

Immediately before arriving in our community, Rabbi Salston served as Chaplain at the Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital. Throughout these past two years, many of us have benefited from her compassion, humanism and kindness. Rabbi Salston has provided comfort and support through her sermons, through thought-provoking Coffee and Commentary Parshat Hashavuah class, and through her guidance for all the joys and grief of the life-cycles events we have experienced. She has guided the synagogue through our journey from virtual to hybrid to in-person services while regularly leading us in prayer herself.

She has taught and inspired our Hebrew School as prayer instructor, guided our students in preparation for Bnei Mitzvah, and has created fun-filled Tot Shabbat and Holiday programming.

In her two years as our religious and spiritual leader, Rabbi Salston has truly established herself as a leader of FLJC/CBI and the broader Fair Lawn Jewish community. Let us come together to celebrate and honor Rabbi Salston at her Installation Luncheon and Ceremony on Sunday, June 12.

Brian Toron Receives Thirty Under 30 Award

Penn State assistant coach [Brian Toron](#) (son of Shari and Kenneth z"l Toron) was named an American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) Thirty Under 30 award recipient in May 2022.

The Thirty Under 30 award, created in 2009, honors up-and-coming coaches at all levels of volleyball—college, high school, and club—and the recipients serve in a range of roles, from head coach to volunteer assistant to club director. Nominees had to be younger than 30 years old in 2021 to qualify for the award.

Toron is set to begin his third season at Penn State. He was recently elevated to an assistant coach role after two years of successful work as the team's director of operations, helping the Lions advance to the NCAA Tournament and finish in the AVCA Coaches Poll both seasons.

Prior to his time at Penn State, Brian spent two seasons at Hofstra, where the Pride went 42-20 overall and 23-9 in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA). In his first season as an assistant coach, the Pride went 25-8 overall and earned a berth in the NCAA Tournament after winning the CAA regular season and Tournament titles. It was the team's first CAA title since 2014.

He began his coaching career as a member of Delaware's volleyball staff, where he served in a variety of roles from 2014 until 2016. WHAT IS SHAVUOT?

Shavuot, "the Feast of Weeks," is observed on the 6th and 7th days of Sivan. The holiday commemorates receiving the Torah at Mt. Sinai. That said, there is no reference in the Torah to a link between this pivotal event and the holiday. Rather, biblical references recognize the holiday only as a harvest festival.

Shavuot is one of the three pilgrimage festivals (the other two are Pesach and Sukkot), when the Israelites would travel to Jerusalem to offer sacrifices at the Temple. During the Shavuot pilgrimage, loaves of bread were often brought to the Temple, marking the end of the grain harvest, as well as the first fruits of the new agricultural season.

The focus of Shavuot shifted after the destruction of the Second Temple, when agricultural offerings could no longer be brought to the Temple. At some point it became more closely associated with the receiving of the Torah.

Shavuot does not have rituals the way holidays like Pesach and Sukkot do. Yet a number of customs have arisen to observe the holiday. The most well-known is the eating of dairy foods such as cheesecake and cheese

blintzes. Another custom is to decorate homes and synagogues with flowers, branches, and green plants.

The Book of Ruth is read during morning services on Shavuot, because of the story's connection to the harvest.

Another tradition on Shavuot is late night Torah study. Did you know that Judaism has its very own "all-nighter?" This custom, known as *Tikkun Leil Shavuot*, encourages study from the Torah, rabbinic literature, and mystical literature such as the *Zohar*. This custom began in Safed in the 16th century and continues to this day.

During Shavuot Services, Hallel is recited, as is Yizkor. The Torah portion that is read includes the reciting of the Ten Commandments. A special trope is used, and the congregation customarily stands as it is chanted.

This year, Shavuot begins on Saturday evening, June 4, and concludes on Monday evening, June 6. Please watch **The Insider** for information about *Tikkun Leil Shavuot* and services.
