Aliso Canyon Disaster Health Research Study \$25M



Multi-year health research study of impacts related to the release from Well SS 25 at the Aliso Canyon Natural Gas Storage Facility in Porter Ranch and the surrounding communities.

Department of Public Health will coordinate the Health Research Study, working with a Scientific Oversight Committee and a Community Advisory Group. The Scientific Oversight Committee will include representatives from local, state and federal agencies, as well as other health experts.

The Community Advisory Group will include residents of Porter Ranch and the Northwest San Fernando Valley. The application process will commence soon.

Lead Paint Hazard Clean-up Near Exide \$5.2M



Department of Public Health contractors will remove lead paint hazards from homes near the now closed Exide battery recycling facility. Interior and exterior lead paint hazard removal coordinated with the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC).

New County Breathmobiles \$2M



Three new electric breathmobiles for Department of Health Services.
