Meet the Board—Q&A with Karen Bridges

Each quarter we highlight one of our board members so you get to know them and have a better understanding about how the board operates.




Soo Y Lee

Rules Q&A by Karen Bridges

Question:

Is it legal to avoid losing a ball by bypassing the tee shot and taking a penalty by heading straight for the drop zone?

Answer:

Nope, not legal. Think of the drop zone as an exclusive night club (called “The Drop Zone”) in which you can’t just talk your way in. You have to be on the guest list. To get on the guest list, Rule 17.1b says access to the drop zone requires a ball to come to rest in an affiliated penalty area.

If the reason for bypassing your tee shot was fear of losing your last ball, no worries! It’s ok to borrow a ball from another player!!

Question:

Can I use debris on the green as a backstop while putting?

Javonda was playing a match play and had a slick downhill putt to win a hole. If the putt doesn’t hit the hole, it will roll off the green. Wind has deposited some debris – leaves and sticks – near the hole, which she decides to keep in place, since they might slow the ball down in the UNLIKELY event she should miss.

As her putt rolls toward the cup, it becomes apparent that the putt is actually going to miss. Stacey, her opponent, rushes in to clear the debris, and sure enough the ball rolls all the way into the fairway.

Javonda doesn’t believe she broke a rule, as she didn’t put those leaves and sticks there. Instead, she thinks Stacey broke a rule? Who is right?

Answer:

Michelle, the rules official, comes along to settle the issue. She says that Javonda is, indeed, in the clear, since a player is entitled to play the course as she finds it. Yes, EVEN if she’s leaving loose impediments in place to act as a potential backstop. Meanwhile, Stacey has breached Rule 11.3 – you can’t take action to

deliberately affect what’s happening with a ball once it’s in motion. The penalty? Loss of hole.

Question: With the new 2019 rules, you are now allowed to fix spike marks and other irregularities on the green that may affect your putting.

Sometimes, after so many people have removed their balls from the hole throughout the day, the rim around the cup gets a bit torn up.

Are you allowed to fix the hole before you putt?

Answer: Damage to the putting green is covered under Rule 13, and there is an interpretation that addresses damage to the hole:

13.1c(2)/2 – Damaged Hole Is Part of Damage on the Putting Green

Damage to the *hole* is covered by Rule 13.1c as part of damage on a *putting green*. The player may repair a damaged *hole* unless the damage is natural wear that Rule 13.1c does not allow to be repaired.

For example, if the *hole* is damaged in removing the *flagstick*, it may be repaired by the player under Rule 13.1c, even if the damage has changed the dimensions of the hole.

However, if a *hole* has been damaged and the player cannot repair the damage (such as the *hole* cannot be made round again) or where natural wear that the player may not repair results in the *hole* not being round, the player should request that the *Committee* repair it.

So damage to the hole is a little tricky... Natural wear comes from balls rolling into and falling into the hole and being removed by hand. Damage comes from people using their club to pull out the flagstick, ball marks when a flying ball hits the hole, and people being sloppy removing the flagstick. It's a judgement call as to what caused the damage.

BONUS QUESTIONS DURING THE 19th HOLE

After a round, a couple of questions came up and Mary Shepperd had some answers for us.

Question:

A ball is lying against a rake in the bunker, and you go to move the rake to take your shot, and hopefully, get out. What happens if the ball moves?



Answer:

What is a rake? It is a Moveable Obstruction, covered by Rule 15.2a

15.2 Movable Obstructions—Relief from Movable Obstruction

Removal of Movable Obstruction. You may remove a *movable obstruction* without penalty on or off the course and may do so in any way.

If your ball *moves* while you are removing a *movable obstruction*, there is no penalty and your ball must be *replaced* on its original spot (which if not known must be estimated).
