About Adam Taliaferro and the Taliaferro Foundation

Adam Taliaferro was a football player at Eastern Regional High School in Voorhees, NJ who continued on to play at Penn State. In 2000, while playing for Penn State in a game against Ohio State, he suffered a spinal injury while making a tackle and was paralyzed. After spinal fusion surgery, doctors told his parents that he would probably never walk again. Three months later, Adam miraculously "walked" out of Magee Rehabilitation Hospital in Philadelphia, PA.

Adam went on to graduate Penn State and Rutgers Law School and served as a practicing attorney in both Philadelphia and South Jersey for several years. He currently works for Bristol Myers Squibb and serves as a New Jersey Assemblyman.

The Adam Taliaferro Foundation supports athletes who suffer head and spinal injuries in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Delaware, and also provides educational and financial support related to the research, prevention, and care of these injuries.
