

16th Sunday in Ordinary Time



There's an ordinary pine grove located on a tree farm not too far from town where life's stresses and demands seem to melt away. It is here that all that seemed so important out there no longer is and one can get lost in the rows of trees and majestic beauty. God is here and all is good. We need to connect with the Divine Source of all that is in order to understand what it is we are doing and why we are doing it. Otherwise, things stop making sense and bitterness can overcome one's spirit. It's okay to play once in a while and to discover that place of profound life and peace. People always have needs and there is constantly something to do. And while all of that is necessary and we are needed, there is also that inner solitude within that needs to be celebrated and released.

We all need a pine grove. It's that little place we can go and leave all that consumes us behind. It's a place where technology can be set aside and wonder, and awe given some time. We don't have to text, calculate, or orchestrate anything in the pine grove. It is a somewhat deserted place where all of that can be set aside and we can just be. The anger, frustration, exhaustion, discouragement, helplessness, and occasional apathy, all can fall to the ground like all of those pine needles that once held their place on the branch of a Frasier Fir. The needles can let go. We can let go. We are beings connected with Being and we all need to remember what really matters, who really matters and what life is truly all about. We need to find that place where we can rest and let go of all of the barnacles we accumulate. Rest, breathe, seek, and love.

The world will need us again when we leave the pine grove. It will all be waiting for us, beckoning for our attention. But we will have prayed and will have marveled at the silence and the beauty of goodness. We can go back, ready, and eager to listen, to help, to heal, to cry, to embrace, and attend to all that is asked of us. But, having let go of the distractions in that deserted place we will have a renewed sense of purpose. We will know better Who it is we serve and what we are meant to do. It will all be clearer now that we have been Divinely touched and refreshed.

In his papal writings, he encourages us to remind ourselves that Jesus is the one who fills us with His grace as only He can. He liberates us, transforms us, heals us, consoles us. He is the Christ, risen from the dead, filled with supernatural life and energy robed in boundless light.

"Besides restful waters, He leads me." The waters are Jesus himself; His care, His love for us surrounding us through the sunshine and summer thunderstorms in our lives.

Please remember that all are welcome to pray in person with the diocese at Planned Parenthood 317 Salem Place, Fairview Heights at the front entrance from 3-4pm every Tuesday. If you are praying virtually, we begin with the Divine Mercy Chaplet, then pray the Holy Rosary (sorrowful mysteries for Tuesday.) Please continue to pray that women in hardship situations find loving, life-giving care for themselves and their families.

Respect Life Corner- "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want." Psalm 23, "Prayer to the Good Shepherd," is a profession of the joyful trust in the Lord as the Good Shepherd/King that has become one of the world's greatest prayers. In praying this psalm we can ponder the fact that Our Heavenly Father's love embraces us from eternity, preparing for us, through Christ, many spiritual blessings. He watches over us as the Good Shepherd and seeks out the stray sheep. "Green pastures" symbolize all that makes life flourish. The "restful waters" are Christ himself beckoning us to live in the tranquility of His peace, to dwell in security.

Learn, Act, Connect, Pray-How can we share our trust in God with others? How can we share His message in friendship with others? In a compassionate, calming manner try sharing your faith with those around you to lift them up. Share your faith with those around you who need encouragement. Share your faith with those who are looking for answers to their problems, such as a crisis pregnancy. Local statistics show that 83% of women who chose abortion said they would have carried their child to term if they had at least one person offering loving guidance. Chemical abortions (the abortion pill) are now being prescribed via telehealth appointments. The need is now. By dwelling in Christ's love, we can offer that compassion to others. The Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen was known for saying, if you believe the impossible, you can do the incredible.

Keeping a piece of “lockdown”

Dare we believe that COVID-19 is behind us?

The vaccines seem to be doing their job. Infections, hospitalizations and (most blessedly) deaths are down. Our world and lives are re-opening.

We're starting to feel “normal” again.

But for some of us, that's not an entirely happy prospect.

Make no mistake: No one wants to go back to being shuttered in our homes, to be terrified of physical contact with loved ones, to spending our days in front of computers and Zoom cameras, to juggling face masks and hand sanitizer.

But . . .

Stephanie Paulsell of the Harvard Divinity School writes in an essay in **The Christian Century** [May 19, 2021] that while her university looks forward to fully opening up next month, “I've heard from a few students that they're dreading a little the return to the intensity of busyness, the social pressures, the competing events. They . . . have found things to like in their online classes. They've had more face time (Zoom is nothing if not face time) with their professors, more control over their own participation. They're nervous about what a return to ‘normal’ will mean . . .

“There's so much to look forward to in a post-pandemic world: hugs, unmasked faces, gathering in churches and classrooms again. But our worries about how to reenter the world of classrooms and offices are reminders that the post-pandemic world also looms up as a challenge. As the world reopens, how will we find our way in it? We have an opportunity to do more than go back to the way things were — a chance, even a responsibility, to do better. How can we rise to it . . . ?

“The pandemic has made it impossible not to know what needs to be done; the injustices fracturing our world have been laid bare for all to see. As I heard a student ask in a presentation on the structural inequalities revealed by COVID: Will we still care when the pandemic is over? Will we stay dissatisfied enough to keep looking for new ways of living that cherish every life?”

The challenge of the past year and a half required us to live our lives in new ways: a new emphasis on family, less obsessiveness about our jobs and careers, rediscovered gratitude for the simple, ordinary things of life that we had taken for granted. In some ways, this time has been a “deserted place” to recalibrate our lives; it's been a time to rediscover love and friendship, empathy and joy in the things of God. So, while we're happy to move beyond this horrible pandemic, may we continue to preserve the “deserted” places and times it afforded us to escape the demands of our calendars and things-to-do lists in order to re-center our lives in the compassion and grace of God, to hear again the voice of Christ the Shepherd calling us to lives of joyful gratitude and fulfilling service.
