The Season of Lent

Liturgical changes for Lent

The season of lent brings a variety of liturgical changes to underscore the more somber character of the season of penitence before the great feast of Easter. You will notice some of these changes on the first Sunday in lent which is March 6th this year. Others will not be evident until later in the season of the great 40 days. All are traditions that have been incorporated over hundreds of years of the church's heritage. They help us to move deeper into our spiritual lives by offering tools for worship that impact all of our senses.

The liturgical changes made both in the decorations of the church as well as in the regular liturgy during Lent include:

Liturgical Colors -The altar hangings are purple, a color of Jesus' royal kingship and of his royal priesthood, as he embraces suffering and finally death on the cross for his people. At Saint Phillips we use unbleached vestments during lent.

Sundays in Lent -On the first Sunday in Lent we will begin with the Great Litany (found on page 148 of the Book of Common Prayer). It replaces both the Prayers of the People and the General Confession on this day only.

Penitential Order - There are changes in the liturgy during Lent as well. The service starts with the Penitential Order (found on page 319 of the Book of Common Prayer) beginning on the second Sunday in Lent, which focuses on confessing our sins and receiving forgiveness from the very beginning of our worship. We will use Rite I, the older form of the Eucharist during Lent.

The Procession- On Sundays in Lent the procession will enter in silence.

Processional Cross -The regular shiny brass processional cross is replaced by a plain, wooden processional cross, or covered with black or purple cloth reminding us of the sacrifice of our Lord Jesus Christ on a tree. His sacrifice defeats death and makes us whole.

Flowers – There are no flowers on the altar during Lent, reflecting the focus on repentance over celebration.

Music – The music used for the regular parts of the Eucharist changes; it is more in a minor key and in a more transcendent style. There will be no musical prelude or postlude during Lent. The Gloria in Excelsis is replaced in Lent by the Trisagion. The Fractional Anthem will be “Lamb of God.”

Eucharistic Prayers – During Lent we will use Eucharistic Prayer C which is more penitential and requires greater participation from the congregation.

Post Communion Prayer – At the end, the post-communion prayer is different, demanding our attention to the actual words of what we are praying.

Alleluia – All Alleluias are put away (the ancient term is “buried”) during Lent, reflecting that Lent is again about penitence over celebration. They are resurrected at the joyous celebration of Easter.

Hymns – The hymns during Lent are different in character, with words that draw us to the holiness of God and our need for God’s forgiveness and grace.

All of these changes to the liturgy during Lent are designed to get our attention and force us to engage the experience in a more present way. Hopefully our Lenten Services will help to take each of us out of our comfort zone and truly reflect on our lives and relationship with Christ.

Let us humbly confess our sins unto Almighty God.

Most merciful God, confess that we have sinned against thee thought, word, and deed, what we have done, by what we have left undone. We have not loved thee with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of thy Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in thy will, and walk in thy ways, to the glory of thy Name. Amen.

THE SECOND LESSON

Romans 4:1-5, 13-17

What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. For what does the scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness." Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness.

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") —in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

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Lenten and Holy Week Service Schedule



Holy Week is the week preceding Easter and the final week of Lent. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday and ends with Holy Saturday, the day before Easter Sunday. Holy Week includes Holy Thursday (also known as Maundy Thursday) and Good Friday, which, together with Holy Saturday, are known as the Triduum. Before the revision of the liturgical calendar in 1969, Holy Week was the second week of Passiontide; in the current calendar, Passiontide is synonymous with Holy Week.

During Holy Week, Christians commemorate the Passion of Christ, who died on Good Friday in reparation for the sins of mankind and rose on Easter Sunday to give new life to all who believe. Thus, while Holy Week is solemn and sorrowful, it also anticipates the joy of Easter through the recognition of God's goodness in sending His Son to die for our salvation.

Palm Sunday (April 2nd, 2023): At the 8:00 AM and 10:30 AM service, Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem is commemorated by everyone joining in a procession of singing and the waving of palm leaves, followed by the Holy Eucharist.

Maundy Thursday with Agape Meal (April 6th, 2023): 7 PM. The Last Supper is remembered with a service that includes Foot Washing, Holy Eucharist and Stripping of the Altar.

Good Friday (April 7th, 2023): Noon and 7 PM. This solemn service commemorates Christ's suffering and death on the cross by offering special prayers and Holy Communion.

Great Easter Vigil (April 8th, 2023): 7PM. The liturgy intended as the first (and arguably, the primary) celebration of Easter. The service begins in darkness, sometime between sunset on Holy Saturday and sunrise on Easter and consists of four parts: The Service of Light (kindling of new fire, lighting the Paschal candle, the Exsultet); The Service of Lessons (readings from the Hebrew Scriptures interspersed with psalms, canticles, and prayers); Christian Initiation (Holy Baptism) or the Renewal of Baptismal Vows; and the Eucharist.

Easter Sunday (April 9th, 2023): During the service, participants affirm that “the Lord is risen indeed.” Easter Egg Hunt to follow the 10:30am service.
