- Legal clinics are starting to educate self-representing litigants to effectively use AI while ensuring accuracy in their filings.
- Zoe Dolan's program in Los Angeles teaches litigants how to leverage AI responsibly in court settings.

Legal Professionals' Perspectives

- Some lawyers view AI as a beneficial tool for research and drafting but caution against reliance without human oversight.
- Andrew Montez emphasized that lawyers must continue to verify AI outputs to uphold their professional responsibilities.

Future of AI in Legal Practice

- The integration of AI in legal processes is seen as a necessary evolution; pro se litigants may increasingly rely on AI for representing themselves in small claims cases.
