


Lansing Public Schools Zero Mill Increase Bond Proposal May 2022

How familiar are you with the Lansing School District's \$129.7 million bond proposal?




Very Familiar (20.5%)

How important to you is investing in our school facilities in the Lansing School District?




Very Important (73%)


Important (23%)

As a business owner and leader in Lansing, do you support the Zero Mill Increase Bond proposal?




If you are a City of Lansing resident, do you plan to vote in support of the Zero Mill Increase Bond proposal?
