Celebration kicks off 'Summer of Beauty' downtown

A July 8 ribbon-cutting ceremony in Centennial Park celebrated the completion of the year-long Downtown Venice Beautification Project. Around 200 people crowded under a tent near the Gazebo or stood on the sidelines as an intermittent rain fell.

The Downtown Project, which got underway in July 2018, reconstructed 14 blocks in downtown Venice. Improvements included constructing major underground stormwater and drainage improvements, replacing sidewalks, installing new streetscape elements such as benches and bike racks, and rebuilding the roadways.

New landscaping installed with the project provides a breathtaking view upon entering downtown Venice, with myriad new palms and other tropical, Florida-friendly plantings in the W. Venice Ave. median and bordering the sidewalks. New flower basket poles were installed that include automatic watering.

The City also added new, enhanced mid-block crossings with in-pavement lighting on W. Venice, Tampa, and Miami avenues to enhance safety for the numerous pedestrians in the downtown area. Additional safety improvements include new four-way stops and updated ADA features. The total cost was \$9.2 million with added stormwater improvements such as ramps on all crosswalks.

"The project started with the design by Engineer of Record, Richard Uptegraff from Atkins North America," said City Engineer and Project Manager Kathleen Weeden. "Hiring the right contractor is always a challenge, and we hit the jackpot with Quality Enterprises USA. President Lou Gaudio and Superintendent Mitch Tourino and their many highly qualified and dedicated workers went above and beyond to accommodate

all of our wine walks, holiday walk, Halloween children's parade and dozens of other events while producing a high-quality project. QE along with their main subcontractor Hazeltine Landscaping, Tincher Concrete and MSB Services made this project a huge success. CDM Smith provided construction engineering inspection services, with Tom Green overseeing the day-to-day operations with a multitude of inspectors, and Chris Pecor providing his guidance."

At times, Weeden added, it felt as if "the whole world" worked on the project, which replaced some infrastructure dating back to the 1920s. The original streets were poured concrete.

The downtown business community was also praised for its resilience and patience.

Said Mayor John Holic: "You guys put up with a lot, and we thank you an awful lot."

City Manager Ed Lavallee called Weeden "the leader of the pack" in making the Downtown Project a reality and also thanked the Mayor and Venice City Council Members, saying they have "never turned away from a capital challenge." Weeden said Council made the restoration of the downtown area a priority.

City of Venice residents voted to pass an \$18 million road bond in November 2016 and support 1-cent sales taxes that helped fund this project. The Florida Department of Transportation provided \$775,000 through the Sarasota/Manatee Metro-

politan Planning Organization. The City also received \$1.3 million in grant funds from the state.

Now-U.S. Rep. Greg Steube's support through the State Senate process was key to Venice receiving the funding, Weeden said. Former state Rep. Julio Gonzalez, state Senator Joe Gruters, state Rep. James Buchanan, and U.S. Rep. Tom Rooney and Rep. Vern Buchanan were also recognized for their assistance.

Those attending the ceremony enjoyed live music by the Venezio Trio and refreshments provided by Venice Island Publix, Upper Crust Café & Bakery, and Venice Island Coffee Café, and were encouraged to go downtown after the event and enjoy the "Summer of Beauty."



City receives \$188K Curbside Recycling Cart Grant

The City of Venice Public Works Department was notified on July 11 that it has been selected as a 2019 Residential Curbside Recycling Cart Grant recipient from The Recycling Partnership. As part of this grant, Venice will receive direct financial assistance from The Recycling Partnership in the projected amount of \$188,512. In addition to this grant funding, Venice will also receive a wide range of technical assistance and in-kind support from the Partnership as it works to support the City's implementation of cart-based curbside recycling.

"This grant will be very important in assisting financially as we switch to single-stream recycling operations next year," said Public Works Director James Clinch. "This group will also provide us with technical expertise and educational materials as we make the transition."

"By accepting this grant, Venice will join a select group of communities to be awarded funding from The Recycling Partnership that is intended to grow public recycling, reduce litter, and improve conditions in our country's waterways and coastal environments," Rob Taylor, Senior Technical Assistance Specialist with The Recycling Partnership, wrote in his award letter to Clinch. "At The Recycling Partnership, we work hand in hand with communities to transform recycling for good, and the close partnerships that we develop with our grantees are living examples of this collaborative approach. We couldn't be more excited to work with the City of Venice over the coming months as your community makes important investments in recycling and works to improve the quality of your coastal environment."

Venice Police Officer wins statewide award for photo

On July 12, Master Police Officer Paul Joyce of the VPD Marine Unit won a third-place statewide award from the Florida Press Association for Spot News Photo for his photograph, "Rescuing Manatee," pictured at right. The picture was entered on MPO Joyce's behalf by the Venice Gondolier newspaper.

On Sunday, Sept. 2, 2018, the Venice Police Marine Unit responded to a manatee in distress from red tide. The manatee was found in the area of the Intracoastal Waterway south near the Venice Ave. boat ramp. MPO Joyce found it with obvious signs of distress and having difficulty breathing. Once on scene, MPO Joyce recruited a few vacationers that were in the area to help. These Good Samaritans didn't hesitate to jump into the water to keep the manatee calm and its head above water to help it breathe. Once MPO Joyce had the situation under control he notified the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and Mote Marine Laboratory. When FWC and Mote arrived, the group was able to safely bring the manatee to the boat ramp for FWC Manatee Rescue truck to take it to Sea World in Orlando for rehab.

MPO Joyce's image helped draw attention to the plight of manatees, dolphins and other sea life affected by this red tide event. Congrats!




VENICE PIER REHABILITATION

Venice Municipal Fishing Pier rehabilitation got underway May 13. The pier is currently closed completely until reconstruction is complete. Work is being conducted Monday through Saturday from approximately 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. for an estimated 90 days, until approximately mid-August.

The rehabilitation includes removal and replacement of all the deck and railing material with longer-lasting IPE wood, replacement of pole lighting fixtures with sea turtle-friendly under handrail lights, and related improvements.

It's hurricane season — have you signed up for CodeRED?



Hurricane season is underway — have you signed up for CodeRED notifications yet?

City of Venice uses CodeRED to send emergency notifications by phone, email, text and social media to keep citizens informed of emergencies such as evacuation notices, utility outages, water main breaks, fire or floods, chemical spills, or other emergency situations. Many residents found the free service extremely useful before, during and after Hurricane Irma in September 2017, when multiple CodeREDs were sent out. Hurricane season runs from June 1-Nov. 30 in Florida.

The city also uses CodeRED Weather Warning, a unique service that automatically notifies citizens in the path of severe weather just moments after a warning has been issued by the National Weather Service. The CodeRED Weather Warning is also available to city residents at no cost.

The city may also activate CodeRED to send general notifications to registered subscribers to communicate non-life safety matters, such as planned road closures, water main repairs, and water and power service interruptions. By selecting the box for general alerts, you will also receive these types of notifications. Registering for CodeRED is quick and easy: Sign up online at www.venicegov.com. At the top of the homepage, click on "CodeRed" (above the Search bar). Click on the link to sign up and select the second option, "NO, I would like to review and submit my information," and fill in the fields. Then add the following numbers to your caller ID or contacts: 866-419-5000, Emergency Calls; 855-969-4636, General Calls; and 800-566-9780, Weather Warnings.

Things to know about CodeRED

CodeRED delivers notifications by phone calls to landlines and cell phones, emails, texts, social media, and/or mobile alerts. It is compatible with TDD/TTY devices for those with hearing impairments. Individuals and businesses may add as many phone numbers, emails and text numbers as desired.

Residents and visitors alike can receive enhanced public safety alerts no matter where you are located via the CodeRED Mobile Alert app, a free public safety app for both Android and iPhone users. The CodeRED Mobile Alert app delivers community and emergency alerts to individuals targeted within an impacted geographical area so that you may also receive timely notifications when you're on the road, or away from home.

If you are currently a CodeRED subscriber who has already registered your cellphone to receive notifications from the City of Venice, you will continue to receive calls. However, if you download the CodeRED Mobile Alert app, you will also receive alerts via your smartphone anywhere in the country, including Hawaii, Puerto Rico and Alaska. Overnight water rescue saves man's life



At 1:07 a.m. Thursday, July 18, the Venice Fire Department's Rescue Boat 51 was dispatched to the waters off Longboat Key for a vessel in distress, according to VFD Battalion Chief Steve Worobel.

Along with Venice's boat, the U.S. Coast Guard and Longboat's Rescue Boat 9 searched the waters looking for the missing vessel. In the overnight hours, Venice's rescue team found the 16-foot Hobie Cat with boat owner Jay Connelly sitting on the capsized hull. The vessel was located 5.8 miles from shore, between Longboat Key and Siesta Key Beach.

Connelly was brought aboard Venice's boat and checked medically. He said the waters became extremely rough after the severe evening thunderstorms rolled in on him. The vessel was towed to shore to prevent further accidents from occurring.

Resident donates Little Free Library to City

A new Venice resident is already leaving her mark in the community: Keeley Rickles and her family recently moved to the City in November, and the mother of two has wasted no time in establishing a Little Free Library for the public to enjoy. The structure is just one of many in the country, and is linked to a worldwide network that encourages people to borrow and/or exchange books at their own pace. The idea is to “take a book,” but also “share a book.”

Located in the north Fishing Pier parking lot, this library is the sixth of its kind within Venice City limits and conveniently placed adjacent to the beach for those who enjoy reading by the Gulf. When asked why she chose the location, Keeley explained that she frequently visits that area, along with her husband and 2 daughters, and hoped to encourage other families to do the same, perhaps with a few books in tow.

The structure itself, which cost roughly \$450, was donated entirely by the Rickles family and installed by Public Works’ Ron Bednar (pictured below at far right) in early July. With the help of her husband, Anthony, and their two daughters, Imara, 5, and Scarlett, 2, on July 15, Keeley stocked the library with numerous classics, as well as her own family’s favorites, including “The Invention of Wings,” “The Chronicles of Narnia” and “The Giving Tree.”

Reclaimed water information for citizens

The City of Venice Utilities Department reported a 1,500 gallon spill of highly disinfected reclaimed water in the Bird Bay area on Thursday, July 18. The spill was caused by an air release valve (ARV) on the reclaimed main that broke due to old age. The spill was approximately 1,500 gallons. A City Utilities crew responded quickly and was able to recover 500 gallons from the storm drain and road with a vac truck. Most of the reclaimed water absorbed into the ground. The break was plugged and service restored.

The report of this spill apparently was misunderstood by some, so for purposes of clarifying the circumstances, the following is a summary of relevant terms explaining what was essentially a spill of irrigation water – that is, water you might use to irrigate your lawn.

1. Advanced Wastewater Treatment (AWT) – Advanced treatment technology (wastewater) refers to processes capable of reducing specific constituents in wastewater not normally achieved by other traditional treatment options. Advanced wastewater treatment is used for organic, suspended solids, nitrogen and phosphorous removal. Additionally, wastewater treatment at the City's AWT facility includes a high-level disinfection process. The disinfection of wastewater provides a degree of protection from contact with pathogenic organisms. After treatment at a wastewater treatment plant, the cleansed water can be safely discharged into a nearby stream, wetland or ocean, or this water source may be distributed to our communities for reuse.
2. The City's reclaimed water actually meets most drinking water standards as established by state and federal regulatory agencies.
3. Reclaimed water is used for irrigation purposes at golf courses, parks, residential properties, medians, industrial purposes (i.e. cooling towers), and aesthetic purposes (i.e. decorative lakes, ponds and fountains).
4. The term ARV, air release valve or air relief valve, is a device used in the utilities industry designed to release air pockets that collect at each high point of a full-pressured pipeline such as the City's reclaimed water distribution system.

Finally, the City of Venice Utilities Department would like to invite residents to tour the City's state-of-the-art treatment plant to learn step-by-step what happens at each stage of the treatment process and how pollutants are removed to produce the highest quality reclaimed water. Residential property tree protection

Through an interlocal agreement between the City of Venice and Sarasota County, all tree regulations are currently under the jurisdiction of the

Sarasota County Environmental Department. City Planning staff, along with the City's consultant, is drafting a Tree Ordinance in preparation of the City assuming responsibility for tree protection later this year. Until then, all tree-related permits are being issued by Sarasota County Environmental Protection.

Generally trees proposed for regulation in Venice fall into 3 categories: **Protected, Heritage and Venetian trees**. Some important regulations being proposed that will affect trees on residential prop-

erty are:

Protected trees are any native species of tree that have a trunk diameter of 4 inches or greater measured 4 ½ feet above ground (DBH). Unless exempt (see **Exemptions** below), a permit will be required to remove a protected tree.

Heritage trees (Sarasota County's Grand tree equivalent) are large native species of tree that have a trunk diameter of 30 inches or greater measured 4 ½ feet above ground for a single trunk tree or 45 inches cumulative diameter for a multi-trunk tree. The City Arborist will evaluate the condition and risk potential to determine if a tree is suitable for Heritage tree protection. Unless exempt, a permit will be required to remove a Heritage tree and for certain pruning practices. (see **Pruning** below)

Venetian trees are nominated by the property owner where the tree is located as having a historic or cultural significance to the community. The application is directed to the City Arborist with documentation that the tree has a historic or cultural significance to the community. Written consent to the nomination by all property owners underneath the canopy of the tree must also be provided. The City Arborist will evaluate the condition and risk potential of the nominated tree and prepare a report for City Council to consider the tree.

Council will then determine if a designation of Venetian tree is appropriate. Once designated by Council as a Venetian tree, the tree will be afforded special protection by the City and a permit will be required for removal and certain pruning practices.

Pruning: For Heritage and Venetian trees, a permit will be required to remove a branch 10 inches in diameter or larger measured 12 inches from the point of branch attachment. Topping, flush cut branch removal, lions tailing and other harmful pruning practices not consistent with accepted pruning standards (ANSI A300 Standards for Tree Care) will also be made illegal for **all** trees in the City. The City Arborist will impose fines for any pruning determined to be harmful that could compromise the long-term safety of a tree.

Exemptions: Florida Statutes 163.045 states that residential property owners are exempt from these permit requirements if the property owner first obtains documentation from an arborist certified by the International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) or a Florida licensed landscape architect that the tree or branch presents a danger to persons or property.

Fire Department hires EMS Division Chief



The Venice Fire Department has hired Nathan McManus as its first Division Chief of Emergency Medical Services (EMS.) McManus started with the City on July 8.

McManus will have total oversight of the EMS program as the City transitions into taking over EMS from Sarasota County. Venice City Council voted April 23, 2019, to give notice to Sarasota County that the City intends to terminate the interlocal agreement with the County for the provision of EMS. The interlocal agreement specifies that termination may occur one year from the date of notification.

Said Fire Chief Shawn Carvey, "(McManus) will handle training firefighters and paramedics on protocol and operations, and work with the County medical director to establish criteria for response."

McManus' most recent post was Training Captain for Charlotte County Fire/EMS, which he held since March 2014. His duties included the coordination, development and conducting of continuing education training for 240 members. He conducted both Fire and EMS training with a specialty of EMS. He also developed multiple programs and trained both Charlotte County and surrounding agencies. Those programs included the SAVE program in response to an active shooter event, Pit Crew CPR to increase overall outcomes in cardiac arrest victims, and the CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) Firefighter Program, which won the 2019 National Association of Counties recognition award. In 2015, he received the Charlotte County Public Safety Chief's Award, the highest honor given at Charlotte County Fire/EMS. From November 2009 to March 2014 he was Special Operations Firemedic with Charlotte County, where he developed and instructed specialized medical training for the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office.

Since January of this year, he served as an instructor for the Englewood Fire Training Center, assessing, developing and updating curriculum as it relates to minimum fire standards and adult students, and evaluating the accomplishments of students. Since 2009, McManus has been an adjunct instructor for the EMS Program at South Florida State College. He's also worked previously as a firefighter and/or paramedic for DeSoto County, Sarasota County, Lehigh Acres and Highlands County.

"From his energy, to the programs he's established in Charlotte County, to working with outside agencies — what he has accomplished speaks for itself," Carvey said. "We heard from all sorts of people, 'Man, you've got a great guy.' You can tell he's dedicated to the EMS portion of fire service."

"I hope to bring a highly professional and cutting-edge advanced life support program to Venice," McManus said. "Our goal will be to set the standard to follow for other EMS systems in Florida."

McManus and his wife Jennifer have been married for 13 years and live in Punta Gorda. He has 4 children and 1 grandchild.

"One of my most favorite things in Venice is the beach," he said. "Our family enjoys beautiful views as our children look for shells and sharks' teeth."

Two large utility improvement projects in bidding phase

Venetian Parkway Water and Sanitary Sewer Relocation

The majority of residents within the Venetian Parkway project limits have water and sanitary sewer mains located in the rear of their lots, away from the road right of way. Many of the water and sewer mains are beyond their useful life, resulting in decreased water pressure and constricted sewer flow.

Maintaining the mains, appurtenances and meters requires City staff to enter and potentially disturb residents' side and back yards. Properties within the project limits are located along Venetian Parkway, Barbara Drive, Roberta Street, Hope Street, Lillian Street, Elaine Street and Karen Drive. Approximately 156 properties have been identified for replacement of water or sanitary sewer, with many requiring both. Pictured to the right is a photo of the proposed area.

Project schedule: This project is currently out to bid, submittals are due August 27, 2019.

Boil water notices: Some water shutdowns will be necessary to perform the work. As a precautionary measure, boil water advisories are required when an interruption in service causes customers to have low or no water pressure. Advisories are provided via a door hanger to affected properties. Notices are posted on the City's website and entered into the CodeRed emergency notification system; additional information about CodeRed can be found on page 9 of this newsletter.

Many of the water mains are beyond their useful life, resulting in decreased water pressure. Maintaining the water mains, appurtenances and meters, requires City Utilities staff to enter and potentially disturb residents' side and backyards.

Phase 6 includes the installation of approximately 7,500 linear feet (lf) of new water main, 2 fire hydrants, 28 valves, various appurtenances, property service connections, and the abandonment of rear lot water mains. The Phase 6 area is roughly bounded by Narvaezi Street to the north, Park Boulevard (North and South) to the west, Armada Road to the south, and Nassau Street to the east. Additionally, it includes a section south of the main area from Shore Road to Ringling Drive S., between Base and Airport avenues (west and east). Approximately 189 properties have been identified for relocation of the rear or side water service line to a new or existing water main located in the right of way.

Pictured to the right is a photo that shows the old, smaller existing water mains and meters in rear and side easements. The new water main will be installed along Barcelona Avenue within the right of way.

Project schedule: This project is currently out to bid. Submittals are due Aug. 21, 2019.


Boil water notices: Some water shutdowns will be necessary to perform the work. As a precautionary measure, boil water advisories are required when an interruption in service causes customers to have low or no water pressure. Advisories are provided via a door hanger to affected properties. Notices are posted on the City's website and entered into the CodeRed emergency notification system; additional information about the CodeRed system can be found on page 9 of this newsletter.

Speed limit lowered to 20 mph on Miami, Tampa avenues



In order to increase pedestrian safety and improve the walkability of the Venice Downtown district, the vehicular speed limit has been lowered to 20 mph on Tampa and Miami avenues between Harbor Drive and U.S. 41 Business. The speed limit was previously 25 mph on these roadways.

This will provide a consistent 20 mph speed limit for the entire Downtown Venice district. Motorists are advised to be aware of this speed limit change when traveling through and visiting the Historic Downtown Venice area.

Underground utilities improvements at Park Blvd., Cadiz/Parkdale

Beginning Monday, Aug. 5, rehabilitation and replacement work by DeJonge Excavating Contractors will occur in the area of the intersection of Park Boulevard North and Cadiz Road/Parkdale Drive in the City of Venice.

Sanitary sewer improvements include removing and replacing a section of 4-inch PVC force main and a manhole. Stormwater improvements include the installation of two stormwater catch basins, elliptical reinforced concrete pipe (RCP), and connection to an existing stormwater catch basin. The work also includes pavement restoration for the full intersection and the installation of a concrete valve collar for an existing potable water valve.

Motorists should expect temporary closure of the Park Blvd. N./Cadiz Road-Parkdale Drive intersection with detours and access to local traffic only during this work. Project completion is estimated to be within 90 days. Your patience is appreciated as this work is completed.

Report city issues with just a few clicks

The City of Venice uses SeeClickFix platform, Venice Connect, which allows citizens to quickly report various issues to City officials like potholes, roadside junk, code violations, and traffic signal/sign problems, to name a few.



SeeClickFix will assign your issue to the appropriate department. Registered SeeClickFix users will receive an email when there is an update and can also come back to check the status of a submitted ticket at any time. *It's as easy as that!* With the free SeeClickFix mobile app and web tools, citizens are able to provide City staff with a picture of the area and enter specific descriptions about the issue which is valuable in getting the job done efficiently. In addition, the SeeClickFix platform provides City officials with a centralized issue management system to monitor progress of submitted issues from creation to resolution and also allows us to engage citizens throughout the process.

The City has been using SeeClickFix since 2016 and has processed over 1,955 issues. During the past few years, issues submitted on SeeClickFix have helped the City handle exposed wires that needed immediate attention, roadside junk needing to be picked up, code violations, awareness of speeders in residential areas, and having street lights fixed and/or replaced. You are our eyes and ears and we value your assistance with maintaining the safety and beauty of Venice.

Did you know?

When a ticket is submitted to SeeClickFix, it captures the location you are in at the time of submission. As a result, please make sure that you are providing the specific location of the issue being reported by either submitting the issue at that exact location OR by entering the location address in the description of issue.

You can attach a photo when submitting your issue. Photos are incredibly helpful to us here at the City. It allows us to quickly identify the problem area being reported and ensure that work crews are safely being sent to the right location.

The City works closely with the Sarasota County Contact Center, Florida Power & Light (FPL) and the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).

Many times the City receives issues that fall under the jurisdiction of one of these agencies. We can forward the issue submitted to us directly to Sarasota County using the SeeClickFix app OR we personally reach out to FDOT and/or FPL with matters that fall under their jurisdiction. Having effective communication with these agencies is key in making sure we continue to maintain the safety of our citizens and guests in the City of Venice. In addition, we continue to monitor and do follow ups with our counterparts to ensure these issues are handled in a timely manner.

Important side note information

We do our best here at the City to ensure we handle all tickets promptly; however, there are times that we may need sufficient time to complete certain requests. In addition, we do receive tickets that are "recommendations" rather than something that needs to be fixed. Although we do value your recommendations, we are unable to keep the ticket open but have noted them and have forwarded them to the appropriate department for their review. City Hall is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, and we can be reached at 941-486-2626.

Over 600 sea turtle nests reported on Venice beaches

Mote Marine Laboratory has recorded 639 nests on Venice beaches since the start of nesting season on May 1.

A total of 4,974 nests have been reported as of July 27 on Sarasota County beaches from Longboat Key to Venice, an increase of more than 1,800 nests over 2018.

Along with loggerhead nests, green and extremely rare leatherback sea turtle nests have also been discovered in the County, Mote officials say. Sea turtles laid 184 nests the week of July 21-27, according to the most recent Mote data, with 23 in Venice.

Sea turtles appear well on their way to a record-breaking year for nests. A total of 3,151 nests — 3,142 from loggerhead sea turtles and 9 from green sea turtles — were documented in 2018 by Mote's Sea Turtle Conservation & Research Program, which patrols the 35-mile stretch of beaches each day of nesting season, May 1-Oct. 31 on the Gulf Coast of Florida. Mote scientists have monitored this stretch of nesting beaches for 37 years. Sea turtles laid a total of 480 nests on Venice beaches in 2018, a number they've already well surpassed this year.

Sea turtles emerge at night and follow dim, natural light to return to the Gulf waters. Artificial lights that shine onto a nesting beach can draw turtle hatchlings away from the water and off the beach, where they have a slim chance of survival, according to information provided by the Sea Turtle Conservancy. These lights can lead them into roads, swimming pools and other danger zones, while causing them to exhaust their energy stores. Beach lights can also scare away females crawling ashore to nest, known as a "false crawl." So far this season, there have been 6,853 false crawls countywide.

Like many of Florida's coastal communities, the City of Venice has a lighting ordinance requiring residents to turn off beachfront lights during sea turtle nesting season. You should also avoid using flashlights, lanterns or flash photography while on the beach at night. Residents should go out to the beach at night and identify what lights on their property are visible from the beach. If the lights are not needed for safety, simply turn them off. If the lights cannot be turned off, shield, redirect or lower the height of the lights so they are no longer visible from the beach. Replace problematic lights with turtle-friendly fixtures designed to direct light where you need it and away from the beach, with red or amber LED bulbs.

City of Venice Code Enforcement Officer George Nixon is on the lookout for any potential lighting violators. Nixon also reminds residents and visitors to our beaches to make sure to remove all items such as beach chairs and trash — in which sea turtles can become entangled — from the beach at night. People should also fill in holes and knock down sand castles to make the beach safer for sea turtles.

If you encounter a nesting turtle or hatchlings on the beach, remain quiet and observe from a distance. Never encourage a turtle to move while nesting or pick up hatchlings that have emerged and are heading for the water. If you see lights shining on Venice beaches during nesting season, contact George Nixon in Code Enforcement at 941-882-7436. If you see a sea turtle or hatchling in danger, call the Mote Marine Sea Turtle Program at 941-388-4331 or the Venice Police Department at 941-486-2444.

Stormwater work to close San Marco/Rialto intersection


On Monday, Aug. 5, the City of Venice will begin excavating the intersection of San Marco Boulevard at The Rialto to replace a failing stormwater system. The San Marco/Rialto intersection will be closed for an estimated 2 weeks. All traffic will be required to detour with the exception of limited local traffic. The primary detour will be Palermo Place located north of the intersection.

The Venice Regional Bayfront Health Emergency Room and parking garage will be available from U.S. 41 Business just north of the San Marco intersection. Ambulances and other emergency vehicles will access the Nokomis Avenue S. entry via Palermo Place by turning west from U.S. 41 Business. The Venice Car Wash will be accessible from the south.

This schedule is subject to change due to weather and unforeseen underground conditions.

PUBLIC SAFETY FACILITY



All building foundations have been completed for the 31,421-square-foot Venice Public Safety Facility project on East Venice Avenue with Ajax Building Corporation, Tandem Construction and Dewberry Architects. The project, currently budgeted at \$17.6 million, is mostly funded through a \$16 million public safety bond approved by City voters in November 2016. The facility will be hardened to withstand a Category 5 hurricane with winds in excess of 157 mph. In the event of a hurricane, it will turn into an Emergency Operations Center for City staff. Expected completion is August 2020.


AROUND TOWN





WATERING RULES

City of Venice residents are permitted to irrigate lawns **one day per week:**

Even addresses on Tuesdays

Odd addresses on Thursdays

Before 8 a.m. and after 6 p.m. for properties under 2 acres. For properties 2 acres or greater, watering is allowed before 10 a.m. and after 4 p.m.

Hand watering hot spots and micro-irrigation of other plants is allowed on any day, at any time.

New and replaced lawns get a 60-day exemption. Irrigation can occur any time of day on the day of installation, and during the restricted hours on any day thereafter for up to 60 days.

There are no restrictions on car washing, pressure washing, use of fountains or use of reuse or reclaimed water. A shut-off nozzle on hoses should be used for car washing and hand watering of garden plants. Conservation is encouraged.
