The ABC's of Kindergarten!

A Attendance: School begins at 8:00. Students can be dropped off beginning at 7:45. Please see the school handbook and Wolfhound Wednesday for current arrival procedures. Being frequently late or absent can cause children to miss important learning opportunities.

Please do keep your child home if he/she is sick or contagious. If your child will be absent or tardy, please call the office before 8:30 in the morning, or email the office at attendance@stbrigid-school.org. Please refer to the school handbook for information regarding when your child may return to school after absences due to illness.

Assessment is a natural, ongoing and important part of learning. By questioning and talking to children, listening to the language they use and observing their behavior, adults gain information about children's levels of skill and understanding.

We will be observing, keeping notes, and using checklists to record our observations about your child's learning. We are looking not only at the product but also at the skills and strategies your child uses. Your child will be demonstrating his/her learning in appropriate, practical, authentic ways in an encouraging and supportive environment. Through observation of your child in multiple learning situations, we can build a more complete assessment of his/her learning.

Your kindergarten child will also learn to self-assess. He/she will understand how to use a rubric or checklist to be sure he/she has completed his/her work to the best of his/her ability.

A report card will be sent electronically to parents quarterly. Our report card is based on the Diocesan kindergarten standards. A quarterly discipleship rubric will also be sent with the report card.

We also utilize formal assessments including STAR (Early Literacy) to monitor progress throughout the year.

Birthdays! We love birthdays! Your child can look forward to hearing birthday wishes during morning announcements and receiving his or her birthday pencil from Ms. O'Reilly. Your child will enjoy a special treat at lunch as he or she celebrates with friends. (Please do not send special birthday treats to school.). Your child may also dress down on his/her birthday to celebrate.

Backpacks: Your child should bring his/her backpack to school every day. Your child's backpack should be large enough to hold a 2-pocket folder easily. Please be sure to clearly label the backpack with your child's name and afternoon transportation information on the tag provided at WOW day.

It is much easier for your child if the backpack only contains things that are needed for school. Making a plan for backpack organization with your child is helpful and reassuring. For example, decide with your child where to keep the blue take-home folder, lunchbox, snack, chapstick, and extra clothes (sweater, underpants...) and hats/gloves.

Communication: We encourage you to call or email us with questions and/or concerns. We will be happy to talk with you at any time throughout the year. E-mail addresses are listed on the front of this handout.

A school handbook can be found on the school website. This handbook contains information (dress code, attendance policy, tardy...) that applies to all of the children in the school. Please take the time to familiarize yourself with the information in this handbook.

We encourage you to send most communication electronically through email in advance. Your child will bring home a blue take-home folder with kindergarten information and papers each day. Please empty this folder daily.

Use the blue take-home folder to send written messages and transportation changes to your child's teacher as needed. The transportation change form can be found on the school website. If there is a last minute change, please notify the office rather than sending the teacher an email. We may not see it during the school day (7:30-3:15).

It is important that all written communication is placed in the blue take-home folder as we cannot check the entire backpack daily.

Wolfhound Wednesday, a school newsletter, is sent via email each Wednesday. Please be sure to read this carefully each week. Please also see our Kindergarten Communication Plan attached to this packet.

Photo newsletters will also be posted monthly (beginning in September) on the school website. These photos will show what we have been doing in the classroom and around the school so you can see our learning in action!

D Dismissal: Our current dismissal policy has been described in detail in the Wolfhound Wednesday and can be found in the handbook. Please familiarize yourself with this plan as we strive to ensure safety during dismissal. If you have any changes to your child's dismissal plan, please notify the teacher with a written note in the blue folder, or email the attendance office.

Discipline: Our classrooms are communities in which the children learn to work together and practice Catholic values. To ensure each child has the maximum opportunity to learn, all children are expected to follow the classroom rules and put forth their best effort throughout the day. We emphasize The Golden Rule, problem solving, responsibility for actions, discipleship, and making good choices. Our goal is to provide a safe, positive classroom atmosphere.

If a child is having difficulty following the rules, we will help redirect his/her behavior through eye contact, quiet reminders, modeling, and visual prompts. If a child is having significant difficulties, additional plans may be appropriate. Parents would be contacted to discuss options to best help the child.

Email: Please be sure you are receiving emails from your kindergarten teacher and the Wolfhound Wednesday from the office. If there is a problem, please let us know immediately. These emails are important for successful communication.

Food: We will be eating our lunch in the cafeteria at 10:15. Your child can buy lunch or pack lunch. The menu can be found on the school website. Packed lunches to be eaten in the cafeteria may contain nuts. Please discuss this choice with your child to be sure he or she will eat the lunch provided. Children are happier and more successful when they are not hungry.

Your child should bring a water bottle each day and a healthy snack to eat in the afternoon. Please be sure your child can manage the snack and lunch items independently (peeling, opening containers...). Please pack your child's lunch and snack in separate containers. It is helpful to put your child's snack in a specific place in the backpack.

G Gym: Kindergarten specials schedules will be sent to you by your teacher each quarter. Please have your child wear gym shoes to school on scheduled gym days. Your child may wear his or her regular school uniform or the gym wind suit on gym days (Girls should wear shorts under the jumper.).

H Homework:

Reading daily with your child is very important to build word recognition, comprehension, and vocabulary. We encourage you to read the attached handout demonstrating the impact of reading consistently with your child.

Practicing skills individually at home can also be very beneficial. We encourage parents to practice red words and math facts consistently at home.

Independence: Your child can learn to do many tasks independently with your guidance and support. Please help your child with skills needed to open lunch containers, clean up spills, button, zip, tie shoes, manage bathroom needs, and put on coats independently.

Jesus: Your child will be developing a relationship with Jesus during our time together in kindergarten. Please talk about Jesus with your child and support this at home. Many students enjoy creating a special place or prayer table in their room as they learn about our Catholic faith.

Kindness! Spread it everywhere. Do it. Be it. Set an example. We are a school family. Everyone at St. Brigid wants the best for your child, and we are all here to support not only your child but your family as well. Please reach out if you need anything!

Learning: Kindergarten students learn by doing. We get messy. We make mistakes. We will try again. Encourage a growth mindset! Maybe your child can't do something YET, but as we always say in kindergarten ... "The more we practice the better we get!"

Mass: School Masses are usually Thursday mornings at 9:00. You are welcome to attend, watch, and pray with our school. We also plan to attend Mass as a class. Your teacher will let you know when the kindergarten classes will be attending Mass.

Noteworthy Dates!

The **Barn Bash** is planned for Friday, October 21st from 6:00-8:15 at Leed's Farm. This is a great opportunity to meet other St. Brigid families, meet your child's new kindergarten friends, and have a wonderful time with your family.

O Oops: Please do not allow your child to bring toys/objects from home. The toys will likely get lost or broken. Toys in backpacks are also very distracting. At times, there may be special days to bring items to school. You will be notified of these days through an email.

Play: Kindergarten children learn through play. We will play a lot! We will learn a lot! We encourage you to examine how much time your child spends on electronics. Increasing traditional play time and reducing tech time will greatly benefit your child.

Q Questions: In addition to academics, all students are learning to make friends and be friends. At times, there may be arguments, tattles, or hurt feelings. We step in when needed, and encourage students to solve these issues with as much independence as possible. Learning problem solving skills is an important part of kindergarten. If you have any questions about academic or social issues, please ask us.

Recess: We will go outside for recess two times a day for about 20 minutes at a time (weather permitting). Please make sure your child is properly dressed for the weather. Keeping a sweater, gloves, and a hat in your child's backpack is very helpful especially as the seasons are changing. Please be sure to label all of your child's belongings with his/her name.

S Specials: During the school year, your child will participate in art, music, physical education, and Spanish class. Your child will have several, but not all, of these special classes each quarter. The schedule for specials classes will be shared with you by your child's teacher each quarter.

Technology: We use iPads and Chromebooks in our classrooms.

Uniforms: Please look in the handbook on the St. Brigid website for a complete dress code and dress down day guidelines. (Boys do not need a belt in kindergarten.) Please label everything!

Volunteers: We love volunteers. Watch for volunteer opportunities throughout the year at St. Brigid! You must complete Protecting God's Children and be fingerprinted before volunteering or chaperoning. Please look on www.virtus.org for class times and sites. Information about Protecting God's Children is attached to this packet. Be sure to watch the Wolfhound Wednesday for opportunities to be involved in our school. We look forward to seeing parent volunteers in the school.

W water: We have a sink for refilling water bottles. Students should bring a child-sized water bottle to keep in the classroom. The bottle must seal completely and may only hold water.

X eXtra TLC: Events that happen at home can impact your child's day. Knowing what is happening in your child's family life will allow us to understand and support your child more effectively in the classroom. Please let us know if something happens at home that may affect your child. We are a team!

You! We both have the same interest – your child. Thank you in advance for all of your help and support this year!

Zzzzz: Kindergarten children need about 9 to 11 hours of sleep a night. Not getting enough sleep can impact your child's day. Your child will be tired after school, especially for the first few weeks, while he/she gets used to the school day. You are encouraged to plan a schedule that works best for your child and your family.



Promoting Pencil Grasp at Home

Parents,

Establishing an appropriate pencil grasp for students in kindergarten, 1st and 2nd grade is imperative for their growth as an individual and as a student. Appropriate fine-motor integration skills improve automaticity and fluency of handwriting and self-help skills. Improvement of writing skills reduces stress in the classroom and improves a child's ability to focus on learning! Listed below are ways you can help your child increase fine motor coordination at home.

Ways to Improve Fine Motor Control at home:

- Table games (tic-tac-toe, dominoes, and card games)
- Bake together (measuring, stirring, and spooning cookie dough promotes good hand-eye coordination)
- Building with Legos
- -Jigsaw Puzzles
- Play-doh or clay
- Dressing themselves (buttoning, zipping, shoe tying)
- Opening containers and packages
- Packing up bags and lunch boxes
- Decrease electronic usage
- Shredding/Tearing paper- have kids tear up bills or personal documents
- Unloading dish washers
- Filling up pet's food and water bowls
- Carryover dishes and setting the table (bilateral hand use)
- Monkey bars- increase hand strenath









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


Lowercase Formation Chart
