


Fourth Sunday after Epiphany

January 29, 2023

Welcome to all who are gathered for worship! If you are a visitor, we are glad to have you with us and we hope you will come again.

Living in Times of Liminality. Liminal spaces are in-between places such as doorways, thresholds, elevators and waiting rooms. As a congregation, we are experiencing *a liminal time* as we transition from one pastor to another. While living through a liminal time is challenging because of the unknown, it is also a time of possibility. It can be a time of creativity and innovation. It gives us space for self-examination and can be a moment in our lives when authentic transformation can happen.

Today's sermon on Miriam is the first in a series focusing on biblical people who experienced liminality. The sister of Moses and Aaron, Miriam is the first woman in scripture to be named a prophet. Most often we remember her as the girl who watched out for her little brother after his mother floated him on the Nile to safety. But Miriam's life was far more challenging as she served God's people in the Wilderness.

First Reading: Numbers 12:1-16

¹While they were at Hazereth, Miriam and Aaron spoke against Moses because of the Cushite woman whom he had married (for he had indeed married a Cushite woman); ²and they said, "Has the LORD spoken only through Moses? Has he not spoken through us also?" And the LORD heard it. ³Now the man Moses was very humble, more so than anyone else on the face of the earth. ⁴Suddenly the LORD said to Moses, Aaron, and Miriam, "Come out, you three, to the tent of meeting." So the three of them came out. ⁵Then the LORD came down in a pillar of cloud, and stood at the entrance of the tent, and called Aaron and Miriam; and they both came forward. ⁶And he said, "Hear my words:

When there are prophets among you,


