On Saturday, October 21<sup>st</sup> over 200 community members, substance abuse professionals, elected officials, middle and high school students, and parents attended our first Save a Life Montgomery: Opioids and other Substance Abuse Community Forum at Covenant Life Church in Gaithersburg.

The agenda included time to visit resource tables with information on local resources, interactive youth activities and advocacy (youth earned 4 SSL hours for their participation), speakers, and a panel discussion. Dexter Manley was the keynote speaker sharing about his personal struggles with addiction.

Sponsoring partners for the event included the Montgomery County Collaboration Council's Many Voices for Smart Choices™ Collaborative, State's Attorney's office, Montgomery County Police Department, Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services, the Bar Association for Montgomery County Maryland and the Universities at Shady Grove.

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**Mary Ellen Icaza.** Mary Ellen Icaza has over 15 years of experience working in urban public libraries. Presently, she is the Public Services Administrator for Community Engagement, Programming and Learning for Montgomery County Public Libraries in MD, a system of 21 branches, where she oversees all programming, community outreach, and special events. She leads Early Literacy programs and services, the Workforce/Business Development program, the Summer Read and Learn program, and outreach services.
