

Programs Summer 2023

This spring and summer were very busy as the JHS offered talks, outings, exhibits, events, and gatherings. Some events were only for members, some for the wider community.

JHS Talks

In May, John Robertson, PhD, Colonel (Ret) Army Corps of Engineers, historian, and author, took a group on a tour of Revolutionary War military sites and gave a talk about his book, *Revolutionary War Defenses in Rhode Island*. In addition to the Conanicut Battery and the emplacement above Fort Wetherill, Dr. Robertson took the group to the site of a battery near the intersection of Longfellow and Plymouth roads in Shoreby Hill! With the land cleared of trees for farming, this high spot would have allowed open views of the bay. Thanks to the The Battle of Rhode Island Association for co-sponsoring Dr. Robertson's visit.

At our annual meeting in August, members were treated to a wonderful talk and slides by Archie Clarke on the history of Jamestown ferries. What a treat to hear him share stories and details about life in Jamestown when the ferries were so essential to the island.

On October 24, Christian McBurney, the publisher and editor-in-chief of the online magazine *Small State/Big History*, talked about his new book, *Machine Guns in Narragansett Bay: The Coast Guard's War on Rum-runners*. Between 1920 to 1933, during Prohibition, Coast Guard vessels in Narragansett Bay and nearby waters fired thousands of machine gun rounds at boats, many manned by local mariners, bringing alcoholic beverages into the country.

Museum Exhibit Opening and Celebration

This summer's exhibit, *Celebrating Jamestown Ferries: 150th Anniversary of Jamestown's First Steam Ferry*, opened on May 25 with a members-only party. The exhibit set the theme for many of the summer events.

In late June, a group gathered at the museum again to celebrate the completion of all the work on the outside of the building. The carpentry repairs, new paint and roof, and the gardens all look terrific. Many thanks to Rinaldi Brothers Roofing, Hanson Lawn Care, the Palmieri Fund, and Judy Knight and her team of gardeners.

In June, members visited the World War II Museum in Wakefield. Housed in a storefront, the museum displays a vast collection of World War II memorabilia, including D-Day maps, uniforms, posters, photos, recordings, weapons, and so much more. The guides were very knowledgeable. There's so much to take in that one visit is not enough to look at everything.

In August members were treated to a private tour of Vernon House in Newport. The house was built in 1708, modified in 1760, and was Rochambeau's headquarters during the Revolutionary War. It has some splendid original features and is now undergoing restoration by the Newport Restoration Foundation.



We had a big turnout for the Preview Party held at the *Boulders*, a lovely home designed by Charles L. Bevins. The large porch was perfect for a party. Many enjoyed a tour of the house and learning about the William Trost Richards painting over the fireplace in the front hall. Thanks to Don Carlson for hosting!

Four houses were featured on the house tour this year. Luckily Hurricane Lee turned east and the tour could proceed as planned. The volunteers were wonderful about helping us develop a contingency plan that we didn't have to use.

A large turnout of 300+ people enjoyed seeing the four houses, all built in the late 1800s. Each house offered something special. Lisa Sallee of *Vinecroft*, now the Lionel Champlin Guesthouse, went above and beyond and baked goodies for all visitors to enjoy. Everyone especially loved the charming dorm for visiting grandchildren on the third floor of *Full House*. At *Meadows*, which like the *Boulders* was designed by Charles Bevins, a trunk in the dining room belonged to the original owner's children and has traveled to exotic destinations. *Thorncroft*'s large yard is full of different species of trees collected by one of the original owners, an arboriculturist.

Introducing Your New Board Members

At our August 2023 Annual Meeting, eleven new board members were elected to replace members leaving the board and to expand the talent available to address the many projects the society has undertaken.

Bill Burgin, a former JHS president, is a registered architect in Rhode Island. In the last four decades, Bill has been the architect for many significant structures throughout the island. He worked on the 2000-2001 restoration of the Jamestown Windmill and the renovation

of Isaac Carr's 1829 general store. He restored the first level of stores and added the second level for apartments in the East Ferry Block and designed the Jamestown Police Station, Jamestown Town Hall, and the Jamestown Golf Club/multipurpose building. Bill is still actively designing building in Jamestown and across Rhode Island.

Abigail Campbell-King is a retired AIA Architect with 50 years of experience designing and renovating houses in Boston, Newport, and the New York Adirondacks. She was instrumental in founding the Arlington MA Historical Society in the 1970s, and is currently an Architectural Consultant for the renovation of the 1886 Belmont Chapel in Newport. She is also on the board of Preserve Rhode Island. Abby lives in a Charles Bevin's 1888 house in Jamestown and has done several neighborhood renovations including preservation of two of the three Sisters on Conanicus Ave.

with a focus in agriculture. She served three years in Jamaica with the Peace Corps as a soil scientist. She subsequently worked as a soil scientist, GIS specialist, and manager with U.S. Department of Agriculture over a 34-year career in several states. Her last posting was as State Conservationist for the state of Massachusetts. Christine retired in 2019 and returned to Jamestown to restore her childhood home.

Alma Davenport has lived on Conanicut Island since the late 1970s. She has both personal and professional interests in history and its documentation. She comes from a long line of New Englanders and was a member of the John Eldred chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). Her Masters of Fine Arts is in Photography and she is author of the text *The History of Photography – an Overview*. Alma hopes to be useful to the JHS in preservation of its photographic collection. To this end, she has digitized the JHS photographic glass-plate collection. Also, Alma has a few ideas for topics to broaden the JHS webinar offerings.

Nikki Gladding is a Jamestown transplant married to a 6+ generation Jamestown. She has volunteered in the JHS vault, provided social media support, and helped at the Meetinghouse. You may have attended a volunteer party at her home on Blueberry Lane.

Nikki is a recovering engineer turned antiques dealer with a shop on Southwest Avenue across from McQuades. She and her husband own and operate two local construction businesses, K.M. Gladding Excavating and M.T. Lott Construction Management, and she had participated in the renovation of several homes in town. Nikki has also volunteered at the Beavertail Lighthouse Museum and is a Jamestown firefighter.

Sandy Good was born and raised in Newport and is a graduate of the Newport Hospital School of Nursing. Sandy and her husband Ted have two daughters and four grandchildren.

Sandy has moved around a bit, living in Rochester, NY, and Williamsburg, VA, before relocating to Jamestown in 2000. They live on Grinnell Street in a Baptist parsonage. Sandy has been a member of the Historical Society since 2021.

Lisa Harris grew up in Cambridge, MA. She graduated from Marlboro College and has a MA in Counseling Psychology from Lesley University. Her family was very interested in preserving antiquities. One of her grandmothers was a woodworker who collected old shipbuilding tools. That collection has since been given to IYRS. Her grandmother's home in Boston is now the Nichols House Museum. Lisa has been married to Ross Harris for 50 years, has two grown children and three grandchildren. They lived in Concord MA for 35 years and moved to Jamestown 14 years ago. One thing they love about Jamestown is being surrounded by history, which is so expertly enhanced by the JHS and the Beavertail Lighthouse Museum. She is involved in music activities in town and is a serious student of the classical guitar.

Joyce Hooley-Bartlett from a very young age was determined to be a teacher. After attending SUNY Plattsburgh and Springfield College she taught at Suffield Academy in Suffield, CT, for 18 years, teaching science, coaching, and filling various administrative roles. During that time she and her husband, Fred, fell in love with Jamestown. They moved here and Joyce got a job teaching science at the Moses Brown School.

Seven years ago Joyce retired from teaching and began work for several farmers and as a deckhand for the Jamestown-Newport ferry. She is the narrator for the Lighthouse tours and on the Coastal Queen tour boat. Joyce has served on the boards of the Friends of the Library and the Conanicut Island Art Association.

Karen Montoya's love for history started when she was 11 years old. Her dad was in the Air Force and was stationed in Germany from 1959 to 1963. The children had the run of the little town they lived in surrounded by woods and many old historical farms and buildings. They took trips to castles and to towns founded in the Middle Ages. It was like stepping back 150 years. Karen went to an American school but learned German from her German friends. Years later

she and her husband lived in Germany for 16 years before moving to Jamestown in 1993. They continue to travel to many other countries satisfying their love for history and different cultures.

Working Together

Conanicut Battery Park

The area of Conanicut Battery Park was a military installation during the American Revolution and during both World Wars. Along a 400-foot path at the crest of the hill above the 1776 battery - at an elevation of 125 feet - are six in-ground observation posts built in World War I.

When these posts were in use the surrounding landscape was entirely clear of trees so observers had an unobstructed view of the water to the east, west and south. The posts were manned by two to four soldiers and accessible only by ladder through an opening in the roof, which was slightly above ground level.

The pillars supporting the heavy cement roofs were rotting, making the emplacements dangerous. This summer, with the help of a Rhode Island Senate grant sponsored by Senator Dawn Euer and a contribution from the town, the supports were replaced. Netting was placed across the observation openings to deter visitors from slipping into the underground rooms.

North Road Wall

The stone wall along North Road between the meetinghouse and the Jamestown windmill has been in disrepair for several years. This spring JHS and the town, with the permission of the Dutras whose property it borders, worked together to rebuild the wall.

Town workers removed the vegetation between the wall and the roadway, essentially dismantling the wall. The society hired the recommended mason to completely rebuild the wall. Four very generous members contributed almost all the funds needed to complete the project.

The view of the windmill and the Friends meetinghouse from North Road is much improved.

Preserve Rhode Island Award

“On a lark,” reads the Preserve Rhode Island citation for this year’s Historic Preservation Home Owners Award, “a couple drive up from New York, fall in love with a coastal farmhouse, and purchase it. Wanting to protect the rare historic landscape from development, they acquire the adjoining lots on either side. Thus begins a decade long journey transforming the land back into a working farm, a colonial farmhouse - parts of which date to the 17th century - into an elegant home, and the couple from city sophisticates to local farmers.”

The couple receiving the award on October 15 were Jeff and Abby Boal and the coastal farm they preserved and enhanced is Fox Hill Farm on Fort Getty Road. When the island was purchased in 1657, the farm was part of the land claimed by Benedict Arnold. Exactly when the house was built is unknown, although in 1733, Arnold’s grandson left the property and a house, elements of which form the base of the current structure, to his nephew.

Summer Exhibit

The summer exhibit at the museum celebrated the 150th anniversary of the steam ferry between Newport and Jamestown and the 96 years that steam-driven ferries were the lifeline of the island. The steamer *Jamestown* – the first of four ferries with that name – made its first trip across the East Passage on May 13, 1873. The *Jamestown* [IV] made the last trip June 28, 1969.

In Print

Over the summer, many of the articles on Jamestown history that appear monthly in *The Jamestown Press* were about ferries. In May, Peter Fay wrote about the dangers that ferrymen and passengers both faced as they crossed Narragansett Bay in sail ferries. In June, Rosemary Enright and Sue Maden told tales about famous people who rode the ferries. In July, their article talked about the purchase of the last ferries, and in October, they discussed Stillman Saunderson's opposition line, the Narragansett Transportation Company.

Not all the focus was on ferries. In August, Peter profiled Ormand Remington, a Jamestown slave who was able to buy freedom for himself and his family. In September, Rosemary and Sue wrote about Audley Clarke and his Beavertail golf course.

JHS Website

The website is in the process of being redesigned.

The main purposes of the redesign are to make the website more user friendly and easier to maintain. Although email is increasingly used for communication with members, the website is usually the way new members and non-members interested in Jamestown history find us.

Among the problems that have been brought to the attention of the redesign committee are the static nature of the landing page, the number of “clicks” needed to get to the collections database, and the difficulty in getting to the membership and donation page.

McDonough Case Exhibits

Each month a mini-exhibit is mounted in the case donated to the library by Jeff and Kim McDonough for historical society displays. During library construction, the case stands in the front hall of Town Hall.

The summer started with a display of badges that ranged from an 18th century British Royal Crest badge to toy police badges used as favors at the retirement dinner for Chief Thomas P. Tighe in 2011.

Other exhibits have shown some of the tiles in the collection, souvenirs of Fort Dumpling, archives of the Conanicut Yacht Club, invitations to house anniversary celebrations, and postcards of Fort Greble.

The November exhibit features objects that were found on eBay. These include the MGM report on Jamestown's Palace Theatre and a matchbook cover advertising Jamestown Shores Motel, which stood at the foot of the Jamestown Bridge and was demolished to make way for the John Eldred Expressway.

Collections

Our Collection Online

The Jamestown Historical Society has been collecting material about Jamestown since 1912. Information about the collection was computerized in 2000. In 2006, the database was made available through the JHS website by periodically uploading a static copy of the database. By mid-December 2023, the collections database is going to the cloud.

For someone interested in searching the collection, the major advantage is that information will be available immediately. For the catalogers and the Collections Committee, there are other advantages. The new software enforces the use of authority files, reducing the probability of error. Spelling is checked automatically. For many entry fields, duplicate entry is reduced by autofilling and advanced search functions.

The volunteers in the vault have spent much of October and November learning the basics of the new system. At the same time, they are continuing to enter new donations and acquisitions in the current system. It's been a busy time.

From the Collection (FTC)

Each month a member of the Collections Committee selects an object from the collection, researches its meaning and its place in Jamestown history, and writes about it in an email.

The FTCs in the past six months have highlighted the Mackerel Cove Beach Pavilion; the works of Jamestown artist Jeanne Bunkley; a mailbox in the shape

of a Jamestown ferry made by Manuel Neronha; the pennant flown on the *Governor Carr* on the ferryboat's maiden voyage; and photographs of Jamestown telephone switchboard operators at work.

The October FTC focused on *Jamestown Harbor at Sunset, 1895*, an oil painting by Edward Mitchell Bannister (1828-1901). Bannister, a Black artist who lived in Providence, owned a small sloop and spent summers sailing Narragansett Bay.

The photograph of the painting was also displayed at Rhode Island School of Design on November 2 in conjunction with a discussion about the importance of Bannister's paintings. The discussion was part of a months-long celebration of Bannister's legacy that included placing a statue of the artist at Market Square in Providence.

At the museum, a grant from the Palmieri Fund was used to remove the old plant material, test the soil, and prep and replant the garden.



