

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## So, what is CAP?

CAP (Civic Action Project) engages students in identifying issues that matter to them, making an intellectual connection to policy, and taking thoughtful civic actions to address their chosen issue.

The CAP curriculum features several academic pathways to choose from. Each pathway provides lessons focused on a topic or skill to prepare students to take informed civic action.

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## Pathways to Civic Action

Each academic pathway provides 5-7 lessons aligned to standards and research-based practices in civic learning.



### U.S. Constitution

Understand foundations of our democratic republic and contemporary relevance.



### Media Literacy

Enhance media literacy skills through the analysis, creation, and ethical use of media.



### Issue-Based Discussion

Examine and understand complex issues from multiple perspectives.



### Social Movements

Explore social movements in history that made a difference.



### Water Systems (Sci)

Explore water systems and analyze issues related to clean water and conservation.

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
## Student-Driven Civic Action

Each pathway culminates in a Civic Action Project (CAP) in which students choose to investigate an issue they care about and take informed civic actions to initiate positive and sustainable change in their communities.

After completing CAP, students say:



CAP aims to enrich students' civic knowledge, skills, and dispositions and to produce the next generation of informed and engaged citizens.
