## **Chicago Ride of Silence™ to be held May 16, 2018**

**One day. One time. Worldwide.  
In collaboration with Vision Zero Chicago**

### **We ride...**

- \* To HONOR those who have been injured or killed**
- \* To RAISE AWARENESS that we are here**
- \* To ask that we all SHARE THE ROAD**

On Wednesday, May 16<sup>th</sup> Chicago cyclists will join fellow cyclists around the world on an annual bicycle ride in silence to raise awareness of cyclists' right to ride on the road and to honor the fallen cyclists no longer with us. The 2018 Chicago Ride of Silence will collaborate with the Vision Zero Chicago initiative that aims to eliminate traffic crashes that cause death and serious injury through an equitable distribution of resources and inclusive community engagement. The initial Ride of Silence was founded in Dallas, Texas, in 2003; the first Chicago Ride of Silence was in 2005.

"We ride each year to honor the lives and memories of each and every cyclist who has been needlessly killed here in Chicago and throughout the world in traffic crashes," said Chicago Organizer Elizabeth Adamczyk.

Beginning in Daley Plaza, Chicago's Ride of Silence™ route will ride in silent procession to the West Side, where a ghost bike was recently placed at the site of Louis Ray Smith's death in June 2016. Ghost Bikes are powerful memorials to fallen cyclists created by painting a bicycle white and placing it at or near the site of the cyclist's death. The Ride will end at Keating Law Office (825 N. Milwaukee) across from the Ghost Bike of Lisa Kuivinen, near the intersection of Milwaukee and Racine on the city's near north side. According to Adamczyk, Illinois has more than a dozen Rides occurring this year. "This event unites everyone who seeks safer roadways for all. While we mourn the loss of so many fellow cyclists, we celebrate the unity of the community and the joy of riding a bike," said Adamczyk.

The ride organizers request that black armbands be worn and red armbands if you have had a bike/motor vehicle accident. Helmets are required; bright clothing and lights are highly recommended for the ride home. There are no fees charged to participate.

The Ride will conclude with a post-ride reception at 825 Milwaukee (Keating Law Office), rain or shine. In the event of inclement weather, participants are asked to gather at the post-ride reception location for refreshments, snacks, and more information about Chicago's Vision Zero initiative.

The Ride of Silence is held in many locations in the US, Canada, Australia, Europe, South and Central America and the rest of the world. This year there are over 300 locations registered throughout the world.

Founder and President Chris Phelan organized the first Ride Of Silence in Dallas in 2003 after endurance cyclist Larry Schwartz was killed by a passing bus's mirror on an empty road.

The Ride Of Silence is a free ride that asks its cyclists to ride no faster than 12 mph for no longer than an hour

The ride hopes to raise cycling awareness during bike safety month to motorists, police, traffic engineers, insurance companies, and city officials. The ride is also a chance to mourn, in funeral procession style, those who have already been killed.
