WELCOME TO ST. PAUL'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH. The health and safety is very important to us. In our sanctuary we now provide a choice of open seating or socially distanced seating. We also continue to offer services online where all are welcome to worship with us. Anyone who is ill, uncomfortable in groups, unable or unwilling to follow the most recent CDC guidelines is asked to stay home and enjoy the service online.

GENERAL SAFETY GUIDELINES

- 1. Wash and/or sanitize your hands frequently.
- 2. Anyone not vaccinated, or uncomfortable around others, is encouraged to take precautions -
 - A properly worn mask, covering both the mouth and nose, should be worn at all times.
 - Keep at least six feet of distance from anyone not living in your household.
- 3. Because safety protocols differ for those who **have** and those who **have not** been vaccinated, please be careful and respect a safe distance, especially while entering and exiting the service.

WHILE ATTENDING SERVICES

- 1. This Service is Being Recorded It's being livestreamed online to many worshippers who cannot be with us today. The members of our production crew are important worship ministers, making the service accessible to everyone. When you see them, remember all the people that are watching from home and lift a prayer for them. Also be aware that, since you're in the sanctuary today, there's a good chance you'll be seen on our livestream broadcasts. By joining us in person at St. Paul's, please understand that you're consenting to being seen and heard on camera.
- 2. **Two Options for Seating** For the sake of LOVE and inclusivity, some seats are reserved for social distancing (currently on the Loma Vista or "gospel side" of the church) reservations must be made in advance. Open Seating is also available (currently on the Memorial Garden or "epistle side" of the church) for those who, according to current CDC guidelines no longer need wear masks or keep their distance no reservation is required.
- 3. **Respecting the Needs of Others** Please keep your distance from those who prefer socially distanced seating. There's a good chance that anyone who's wearing a mask would also appreciate this courtesy.
- 4. **Singing in Church** In accordance with Diocesan protocols, all of our choir and musicians are fully vaccinated. Members of the congregation who are also fully vaccinated are invited to sing along with them. For now, those who are not vaccinated are asked to lift their hearts but not their voices. Thank you!
- 5. **The Passing of the Peace** Passing the peace is permitted in open seating, but please respect the needs and desires of your neighbors. A friendly wave or ASL hug is still a great way to show you care!
- 6. **Making an Offering** Plates can be passed in the open seating section only. A donation box is available for those who in reserved seating. Your donations are very much appreciated. Thank you for your support!
- 7. **Receiving Eucharist** Please wait for the usher to invite your row forward. Sanitize your hands as you make your way to the altar rail. Reserved seating will receive at socially distanced spaces. Open seating will receive side by side as usual. Walk-through Eucharist is offered following the service on the first Sundays of the month. Please see our E-newsletter for more information.
- 8. **Welcome Families!** Please help your children to enjoy their time here while maintaining social distance. We hope to be able to offer Childcare and return to in-person Sunday School classes this Fall. Until then, activity bags are available. Please keep your children with you while on campus.
- 9. **Interacting with Children** Current Diocesan guidelines do not allow direct physical contact with children outside family groups. Since children under 12 years cannot be vaccinated, they need to stay masked and distanced. Please offer a friendly wave and verbally help us remind our children and families that we love them and are happy to see them, but don't offer hugs or shake hands yet. Thank you!
- 10. Restrooms -Please be respectful, especially of those who still need to practice social distancing. Thank you!
