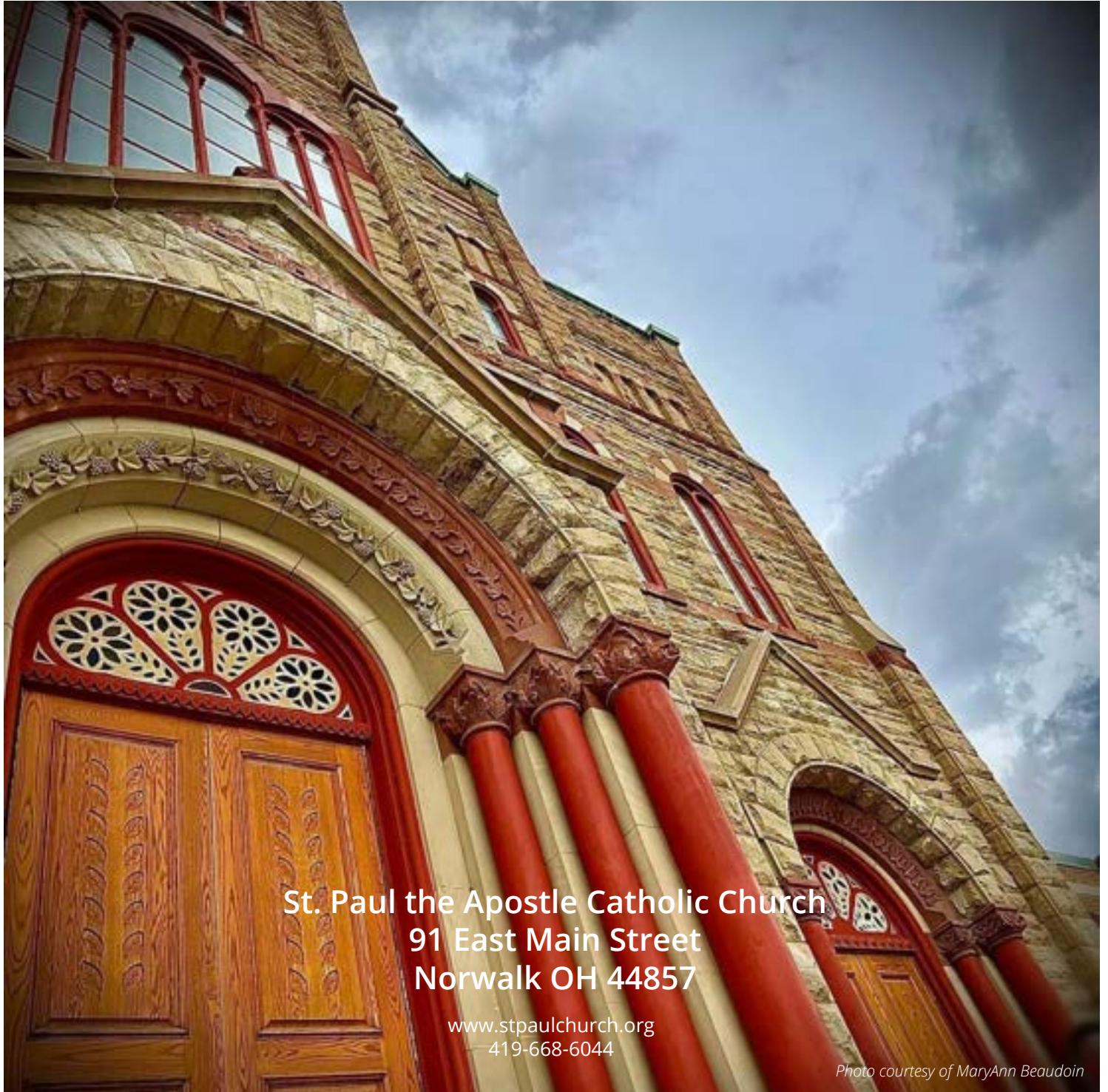

FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PASTOR

Receive the Gospel of Christ whose herald you have become. Believe what you read, teach what you believe, and practice what you teach.

These words, spoken to the newly ordained deacons at ordination, have always been for me the measuring stick. *Do I believe what I read in the Gospel of Christ? Do I teach what I believe? Do I practice what I teach?* And so, as I approach the end of my time here at St. Paul, I have been reflecting back on these words and asking myself those questions. It seems an odd way to spend my time, but it has been helpful for me.

I recognize my desire to preach Christ's Gospel. Here, I believe I have done mostly well. We read in the Gospel of Christ about a merciful and loving God. A God who meets us on the road where we are, who searches for us until He finds us, binds our wounds, carries us somewhere to rest and heal, and promises to pay more than necessary for our care. We hear about a God who longs for us to be united and one, a community of believers working together to bring about God's Kingdom. I have grown to believe this more and more with each reading. The abundant and relentless love of God has become more apparent to me in each Word I hear proclaimed. I cannot deny it.

Have I preached this Word? Here is where I have begun to lack. While at times, I recognize that in my words and actions I have absolutely preached this word; other times, I may have not. In my interactions with students in our Norwalk Catholic School and Norwalk Catholic St. Paul High School, I have tried to live in such a way and speak in such a way that they know there is no bottom to God's love. In my words at the parish and in my actions ministering to others, I have tried to show that there is nothing that we can do to make God love us any more than God already does, and there is nothing that we can do that will make God love us any less. At times though, I have gotten caught in a trap of preaching a different gospel: not the Gospel of Christ, but the Gospel of Christ which was filtered through the mind of Fr. Michael. I allowed my own beliefs and half-formed ideas to creep in. I allowed things from outside of Christ and Christ's Church to guide my words and actions. In a world where everyone has an opinion and everyone believes their opinion is fact, I have fallen into the trap of allowing my way to supersede God's way. For these moments, I apologize and ask for prayers to continue growing.

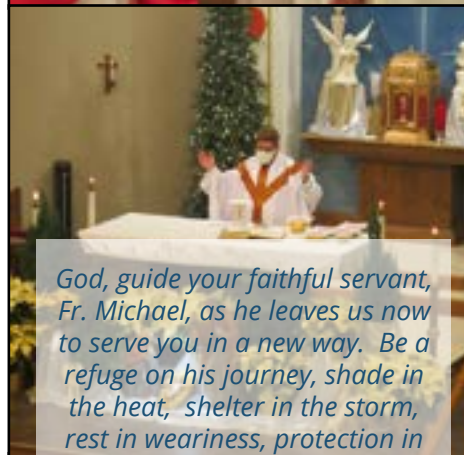
Have I practiced what I taught? Again, here I find myself lacking more. While I believe and preach a God of unrelenting love, I failed to love in the same way. I have struggled to love those who disagree with me, those who have criticized me, those who have spoken poorly about me. It's easy for me to say we must love and accept others, especially those who do not love us, but I have not done well with this. Like all of us, I am a work in progress. Though I also know that there are those who have felt long abandoned and unloved by the Church who have found in me a reminder that they are still loved. I am grateful that God could use me for the sake of their well-being, and I pray that all those here remember God's love for them, and God's love for their neighbor. I pray, that though I failed at times in my word and actions to encourage a community where truly all are welcome, that we can all learn to set aside our differences and focus on God's love for us and allow that to bind us together. I hope to practice that more in my life. There have been many here who have helped me to recognize where I have done that well, and there have been those who have helped me to see where I have failed to do that. I am grateful for all.

As my time at St. Paul and in Norwalk draws to a close, I would like to leave you with words that are not my own. Though I do not claim to be anywhere near as great as this man, the humility which he showed is something I strive to emulate. So, please know that these words spoken by President George Washington in his farewell address, I mean with my whole heart, with some adjustments made to apply to my situation:

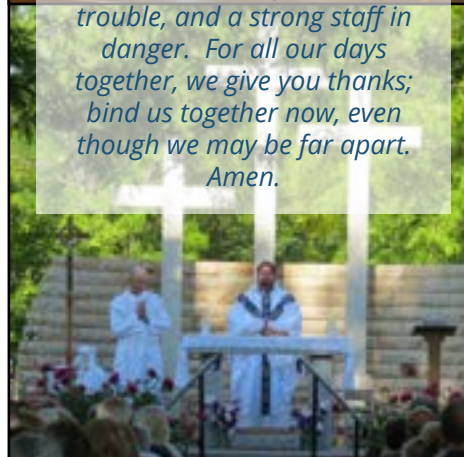
Though, in reviewing the incidents of my (assignment in Norwalk), I am unconscious of intentional error, I am nevertheless too sensible of my defects not to think it probable that I may have committed many errors. Whatever they may be, I fervently beseech the Almighty to avert or mitigate the evils to which they may tend. I shall also carry with me the hope that (this Parish) will never cease to view them with indulgence; and that, after (three) years of my life dedicated to its service with an upright zeal, the faults of incompetent abilities will be consigned to oblivion, as myself must soon be to the mansions of rest.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

July is the month dedicated to the Precious Blood of Jesus. Jesus poured out His blood for our salvation and gives it to us under the form of wine in the Holy Eucharist. In Jewish thought, the life of the individual was contained in his blood. Therefore, when we receive the Eucharist, we receive the very life of God. Note that the Eucharist is contained entirely under each form, so that when we receive the Eucharist only under the form of bread (the host) we still receive the fullness of Christ, body and blood, soul and divinity. Praise be Jesus Christ, who shares His very life with us in the most sacred sacrament of the Holy Eucharist!

July is also the month of transition for parishes. Priests are typically reassigned during this month. I arrived as the pastor of St. Paul last July as Msgr. Ken retired. This year I begin my assignment as pastor of St. Mary's and St. Anthony's. Fr. Michael will begin his time as the parochial vicar at All Saints in Rossford. Fr. Ron Schock will begin his assignment here as our new parochial vicar. Please keep us all in prayer as these transitions are sometimes difficult, yet also times of great grace.

Fr. Peter Grodi will be arriving in August as our second parochial vicar, and Fred del Guidice will be arriving as our seminarian pastoral intern in September. In July, Msgr. Ken will be helping us cover the many Masses in our parishes; we are grateful for his continued ministry in our parish. We are blessed in our parishes to have our sacramental ministries supported and filled by priests. Please continue to pray for more holy vocations to the sacred priesthood, so that every parish in our diocese will have a priest available as a spiritual leader in the person of Jesus Christ.

May our Lord Jesus bless you and may His most Precious Blood fill you with the grace and knowledge of His saving love.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Hi! My name is Fr. Ron Schock. I am so blessed to be named your new parochial vicar for St. Paul, St. Mary and St Anthony parishes, beginning July 1.

I may have a number of limitations, but I strive to focus on all that I can do rather than the things I am unable to do.

NATIONAL Eucharistic Revival

Mission: to renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist.

June 2022 - June 2023: Year of Diocesan Revival

June 2023 - June 2024: Year of Parish Revival

This second phase will foster Eucharistic devotion at the parish level, strengthening our liturgical life through faithful celebration of the Mass, Eucharistic Adoration, missions, resources, preaching, and organic movements of the Holy Spirit.

Let us take a look at how we at St. Paul Parish are doing within the 4 Pillars of this Revival experience:

I. Invigorating Worship

The St. Paul Liturgy Committee critiques, evaluates, and updates our liturgies each month. Each Mass is planned to inspire and invite the participation of the community who attends. You are the Church: your participation promotes the vibrancy of worship at each liturgy. *How can you more fully participate in our Masses?*

II. Personal Encounters

St. Paul Parish offers the following encounters with Christ beyond our regular Masses:

Adoration Chapel – Monday – Friday, 6 AM - 11 PM

Come sit with the Lord. (We hope to extend these hours with your help!)

Adoration Under the Stars – July 15, 2023

Worship the Eucharist under the night sky. This year's outdoor Adoration will be a deanery evening, beginning with Mass, at St. Alphonsus, Peru.

Anointing of the Sick – First Fridays, 9 AM Mass

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) - CGS focuses on building and strengthening a relationship with God and engages our young children in prayer. CGS is utilized by our parish PSR program and Sacrament Formation, and is held twice a month during Sunday Mass. Norwalk Catholic utilizes CGS at the Early Childhood and Elementary.

Corpus Christi Eucharistic Processions

Our procession around the campus is a witness to our neighbors of our belief in the Eucharist, the holy Body of Christ.

Divine Mercy Chaplet – Fridays, 3 PM in the Adoration Chapel

Evening Prayer – Wednesdays, 7 PM

We gather in prayer and petition for the Liturgy of the Hours during the liturgical seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter.

Family Adoration – 1st Thursdays, 6:30 PM in the church

This half-hour of Adoration is child-focused and family-friendly; however, all parishioners are welcome.

Hispanic Holy Hour - Thursdays, 7 PM

Parish Mission & Eucharistic Devotions, November 5 - 7, 7 PM

Fr. Tom McCarthy, OSA will be mission speaker.

Various Catholic Traditions and Feast Days are celebrated throughout the liturgical year.

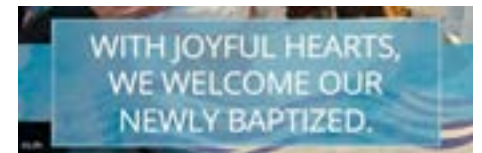

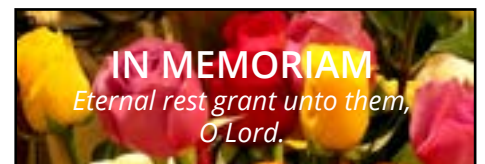

(1) Large portions of this line item are regular help to the Norwalk Area Food Bank (NAFB). While we do some direct aid in the form of food vouchers, most of our food needs are referred to NAFB. NAFB supplies food products directly to people in need.

(2) This does not include gift cards that were donated as part of the Sharing Tree at Christmas time. These cards are distributed to people in need along with the donations listed above. We are very appreciative of these cards as are the people in need.

It should be noted that 99% of your donations go directly to people in need.

Over the past 24 months we have seen an increase in requests from people due to challenging economic times. A big factor is the rate of inflation. The people in need that we serve are especially hard hit during these times.

The SVdP, Norwalk St Paul Conference provides immediate help with food, rent, utilities, and other related needs. We offer hope to individuals, giving them a chance to recover from their financial problems. In addition, we refer them to other agencies for additional temporary and long-term assistance and guidance, which is also an important part of our mission.

We call ourselves Vincentians in tribute to St. Vincent de Paul. What Vincentians have in common is a desire to serve those who are poor and suffering. In other words, Vincentians embrace the lonely, forgotten, and alienated by providing services to anyone in need. Our motto is: *"There is no work of charity that is foreign to the society."*

To respect the wishes of those who donate to us and support our work, we do our best to verify the legitimacy of our clients' claims of need before providing any assistance. We also must keep in mind the spirit of Christ, who leads our ministry, which means we help our neighbors based on need without judging them. The SVDP, Norwalk St Paul Conference would like to thank our generous parishioners and donors for the financial support you have given us.

As an additional show of our appreciation, the SVdP, Norwalk St Paul Conference has a Mass offered every month for the intentions of our donors, the people we serve, and all Vincentians.

The increase in the number of local homeless people is staggering. Homeless people are people like you: they need basic necessities to survive. Catholic Charities is a central access point to help the homeless and together with the community we can make a difference. Catholic Charities, Norwalk is asking for donations for its Blessing Bags for the homeless and clients who are staying in motels or on the streets.

Needed items include: Personal hygiene items (men's, women's, and children's); baby wipes; backpack or tote bags; diapers, sizes 1 to 5; hairbrushes; sanitary napkins; small blankets (that can be packed in a backpack or tote bag); socks (men's, women's, and children's); applesauce; beef sticks; cereal bars; crackers; plastic silverware; Pop Tarts; pudding; pull-tab canned goods; water (mini bottles); food that can be stored at room temperature and easily opened.
