Quotes of the Week

Each year on July 4th, our nation pauses to celebrate its birth, its independence, and to renew our commitment to the values that are intrinsic to the American spirit: freedom, justice, peace and prosperity. As the prayers of the Mass on July 4th say: “Jesus spoke to us a message of peace and taught us to live as brothers and sisters... His message lives on in our midst as a task for today and a promise for tomorrow.”

In recent weeks we have been reminded, very powerfully, that the promise of a nation of peace and justice has not yet been perfectly realized, particularly for African Americans and other minorities. Members of the Black community, even now, often experience unjust discrimination, exclusion and unwarranted violence. For them, the American dream is a work in progress; it remains a “task for today and a promise for tomorrow.”

Mindful of that reality, I wish to invite all the members of the Catholic Church in the Diocese of Providence to spend some time during the weekend of July 3rd to 5th in personal and communal reflection and prayer for the promotion of justice and peace and mutual respect for all the people of our nation. This moment can be an occasion for an honest examination of conscience: What is my attitude about people of other races or ethnic groups? Am I committed to racial justice and equal opportunity for all? Have I failed, in my thoughts, words or deeds, to live these virtues? Do I have any blind spots in this regard? How can I do better in the future? ...

Perhaps individuals, or families, could pause for a few moments of silence in their homes to pray for those who have suffered and died because of racial injustice, and to ask the Lord to bestow upon our land the gifts of justice, peace and racial harmony...

It is important to emphasize that this weekend is not a placebo, nor will it be the final word of what we must do to address racial discrimination and injustice. Going forward we need to renew our commitment to study, pray and act, in concrete and tangible ways, to promote dialogue with our brothers and sisters, and to make real progress in securing racial justice and harmony. The Diocese of Providence in its “Strategic Pastoral Plan for Black Catholic Communities” announced last year, has already begun walking together along this path. The plan should be implemented in each of our parishes.

Dear brothers and sisters, as our nation celebrates its Independence Day we do well to rejoice in and thank God for all the blessings of freedom, justice, peace and prosperity he has bestowed upon us. Indeed, our country is “America the Beautiful.”

But it will be even more beautiful when “God mends our every flaw,” and the American dream becomes a reality for all of our brothers and sisters.

Thank you for your consideration of these requests. May God bless us, and may God bless America with justice and peace for all!

Bishop Thomas Tobin, “A Message from Bishop Tobin to the Diocese of Providence.” June 15, 2020.

“In the 15th century, the Catholic Church became the first global institution to declare that Black lives did not matter. In a series of papal bulls beginning with Pope Nicholas V's *Dum Diversas* (1452) and including Pope Alexander VI's *Inter Caetera* (1493), the church not only authorized the perpetual enslavement of Africans and the seizure of ‘non-Christian’ lands, but morally sanctioned the development of the trans-Atlantic slave trade. This trade forcibly transported at least 12.5 million enslaved African men, women and children to the Americas and Europe to enrich European and often Catholic coffers. It also caused the deaths of tens of millions of Africans and Native Americans over nearly four centuries.

In the land area that became the United States, the Catholic Church introduced African slavery in the 16th century long before 1619. In fact, at various moments in American history from the colonial era to the U.S. Civil War, the church was the largest corporate slaveholder in Florida, Louisiana, Maryland, Kentucky and Missouri.” “The church must make reparation for its role in slavery, segregation.” *National Catholic Reporter*. June 15, 2020.

“When we say that racism continues to pervade every aspect of our society, we as Catholics must stop pretending that this is something that others do. This is not a time to play naive. A full quarter of the U.S. population is Roman Catholic. Where can we hide?

Many Catholics in our society, whether in leadership or in the routines of our own homes, privately or publicly, promote racist attitudes and benefit from systems based on racial disparity. If we start acknowledging that, and if Catholic leaders are more forward addressing racism in the public square, then I can do a much better job talking about racism with my children.”

“Even before the coronavirus pandemic, the archdiocese had to support many of our parishes, schools, and other institutions that were unable to make it on their own. For instance, the archdiocese shares \$10 million per year with struggling parishes, while our schools receive \$40 million in annual subsidies in order to keep their doors open. In addition, many of the parents of our school students were unable to make tuition payments since February, due to loss of income because of layoffs, unemployment, or a drop in wages. Many of our generous supporters, like the Inner-City Scholarship Fund, and the Alfred E. Smith Foundation, stepped forward to help bridge the gap for the remainder of the school year. But, many of our schools have very few students registered for this September, as struggling families are unable to afford tuition, even with our scholarships, and we may be looking at a significant number of school closures, something we work very hard to avoid... The Cardinal’s Annual Stewardship Appeal, which helps fund many of the basic ministries of the archdiocese, is also down about \$4 million this year, even as the needs of the people we serve are on the rise.”

“The Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh announced Friday that two elementary schools would be closing, and two others would be merging together, citing financial concerns stemming from the Coronavirus pandemic. Saint Patrick School in Canonsburg will close, effective June 30, 2020. Our Lady of the Most Blessed Sacrament School in Natrona Heights will close, effective June 30, 2020. Saint Joseph Elementary School in Verona and Saint John the Baptist School in Plum Borough will merge, effective July 1.”

“Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh announces closure of two elementary schools, merger of two elementary schools.” *KDKA*. June 12, 2020.

“St. Augustine Catholic School [in Augusta, Kentucky] will not reopen for the 2020-2021 school year.”

“Holy Family Catholic School [in Moss Bluff, Louisiana] will not reopen this fall... The permanent closure is a result of declining enrollment numbers and resulting financial shortfalls.”

“After 95 years of operation, the Sacred Heart School in Bath [Pennsylvania] will close at the end of this school year, according to the Diocese of Allentown... Also closing is St. Francis Academy in Bally, Berks County.”

“After 95 years of lessons, Catholic school will close in Bath.” *Lehighvalleylive.com*. June 11, 2020.

“Everything is in such a state of flux. A lot of schools still don't have their [enrollment] information together. The registration period and re-registration is late March to April, when they ask you to commit again. That didn't happen. In addition is the whole tuition piece with people unemployed. And parents want to know what they're coming back to. They don't know that yet. And the schools don't know that yet. Parents don't want to commit to what they don't know. It's a huge mess.”

“Saint John the Baptist Catholic School in Kalihi [Hawaii] will be closing on June 30, 2020. School officials announced that the school had been struggling financially with the decline in enrollment and the increase in operational costs.”

“Sacramento Catholic schools are ordering a 55-gallon drum of hand sanitizer for every 20 students, just to start the first month of school. That's nearly three gallons a student, but [Lincoln] Snyder [the executive director of schools for the Roman Catholic Diocese of Sacramento] expects teachers and students to go through the supply long before the end of the year, if not the semester. ‘It's going to be thousands per school,’ Snyder said of the costs. [Kathy Mears, the interim president of the National Catholic Educational Association] agreed. Nationwide, she estimates additional cleaning and supplies overall will cost \$15,000 to \$25,000 per school. ‘That's an added expense that schools don't necessarily have in their budget,’ she said. ‘You cannot raise tuition where you're doing online learning and you're going to have to pay for the school to be clean anyway. It's just a big vicious circle for a Catholic school.’”

"In my opinion, the Knights of Columbus is no longer the small mutual aid society and fraternity founded by Fr. Michael McGivney in the 19th century. It is now a big, rich corporation that seeks to be a political player in the American scene. Its nearly 2 million members, the vast majority of whom never go to a meeting, give it clout. It is principally an insurance company, which underwrites \$105 billion in policies, has \$22 billion in assets. Money and membership that give it power.

The Supreme Council are extremely well paid. [Supreme Knight Carl Anderson] was paid more than \$2 million in 2014. His annual base salary is around \$900,000, according to press reports and tax filings. All of the other top brass is paid in the hundreds of thousands per year."

Christ the King Church Donates \$10,000 in Coronavirus Relief for Rhode Island

In the last three months, the parish community went above and beyond its regularly monthly contributions to local charities and donated \$10,000 to help those dealing with food insecurity in Rhode Island. As unemployment increased and more people depended upon food pantries for assistance, we responded:

\$1,000 to the St. Thomas Food Pantry in Providence; \$1,000 to Rhode Island Center Assisting Those in Need in Charlestown; \$1,000 to the Hope & Faith Drive Food Pantry in East Providence; \$1,000 to the Rhode Island Community Food Bank in Providence; \$1,000 to the All Saints Church Food Pantry in Woonsocket; \$1,000 to the St. Edward Food and Wellness Center in Providence; \$2,000 to the Johnnycake Center in Wakefield; and \$2,000 to the Assumption Parish Food Pantry in Providence.

\$8,000 of the proceeds came directly from parishioners' contributions to the parish during these months, and \$2,000 came from our Social Action Committee.

Thanks be to Christ our King, who has crowned us with so many blessings and works through us to serve the needs of His people.

The express train is coming... Your "conductors" are well under way getting the train ready for passengers! Now it is time to welcome our campers. The registration forms are on our website. Our dates are **JULY 27- 31**. We are following all the protocols put out by the CDC and the State of RI for summer camps. We will be well into PHASE 3 by the time we have our camp and rest assured we will be taking all precautions for a fun and safe VBS. Some of the details that we are planning:

- Station leaders will be adults and sanitize the room between each movement of a group.
- Teens/Jr. Counselors will wear special VBS masks at all times. These masks will be offered to campers as well for use while in the building.
- All stations will be set up for social distancing for campers as dictated by the State of Rhode Island Department of Health guidelines in effect at the time of camp. Counselors will be trained on how to separate each child... how about on a train seat!
- Groups will be limited to 10 campers who will remain together for the entire program. This will include snack, opening and closing activities.
- Any group activities will be OUTSIDE on the front lawn. In case of inclement weather we will use the church.
- All materials will go home every day.
- Campers will have their hands sanitized between each station.
- Most importantly, the cut off for receipt of application and payment is **SUNDAY, JULY 12**. We will not be able to accept any late or day of registrations OR changes to group assignments this year due to social distancing and number requirements.

We are asking each family to donate \$25.00 per camper, if possible.
