Dr. Tanisha Adams, M.D.

Tanisha Adams received her MPH at Tennessee State University prior to graduating from Meharry Medical College, where she was elected to the Gold Humanism Honor Society. She has served as a program director for Guidance Life Skills and Mentoring (GLAM Inc.) supporting young women through education and mentoring and been an officer at Meharry’s chapter of the Student National Medical Association. Tanisha joined the Child Track residency at UT Southwestern hoping to bring “compassion and the ability to see potential in those affected by hardship. [Her] primary goal as a Child and Adolescent psychiatrist is to foster that potential by allowing patients the opportunity to address trauma and provide a space for healing.”



Dr. Lydia Ademuwagun, M.D.

Dr. Ademuwagun completed her medical degree at The Warren Alpert Medical School of Brown University where she was elected to the Gold Humanism Honor Society and subsequently completed her residency at Duke University. At Brown, she contributed to meaningful projects reflecting her interest in exploring the lived experience of students from underrepresented backgrounds in medical training. Additionally, she helped organize pipeline and outreach programs, served as a liaison in SNMA, and participated in institutional committees aimed at improving the curriculum and student experience. As a child and adolescent psychiatrist, Lydia hopes “to shift stigmatizing narratives around mental illness, equip youth and their families with strategies and resources to facilitate psychological wellbeing, and increase access to mental health care among marginalized communities. “



Dr. Arnold Aslanian, M.D.

Dr. Aslanian completed his medical school education at Universidad Autónoma de Nuevo León Facultad de Medicina and is completing his residency at Texas Tech El Paso. As a medical student, he was a dedicated volunteer and during residency he participated as a rater in the NIH Study Latin American Trans-Ancestry Initiative for OCD genomics (LATINO). Arnold is pursuing a CAP fellowship as he feels that “to become the most effective psychiatrist I can be, I must understand mental health across the lifespan, beginning in childhood.”




Dr. Lauren Ford, M.D.

Prior to joining our Child Track Program at UT Southwestern, Dr. Ford spent a year directing a nonprofit program using tennis as a tool for community building in housing projects. As a medical student at UT Southwestern, she co-founded the Gender Inclusive Leadership Team (GIFT) and served as co-president of PRIDE. She also developed and led Mental Health Matters, an educational program for Dallas youth, and was Co-Training Chair at Hoops 4 Health, delivering medical services at the Dallas Mavericks Youth Tournament. Lauren wrote that as a child and adolescent psychiatrist, she “can imagine no greater honor than helping patients and their families through one of the darkest times in their lives.”



Dr. Ashley Huang, M.D.

Dr. Huang completed her medical school education at Baylor College of Medicine and is completing her residency at UTHealth Houston at McGovern Medical School. During medical school she volunteered to teach mental health classes at an underserved Houston high school. Through the “Launching! To Adulthood Program” at UTHealth Houston, she co-developed a Transition to Adult Healthcare lecture presented to Latino families of young adults with autism. She delivered a talk on best practices for treating bicultural patients at the 2025 American Psychiatric Association Annual Meeting. For Ashley, “pursuing a fellowship in child and adolescent psychiatry aligns perfectly with [her] goals: to intervene early, empower families, and create environments where treatment and education intersect in a culturally sensitive manner.”



Dr. Celine Lee, M.D.

Dr. Lee received her MPH from The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston School of Public Health prior to completing her medical education at Texas A&M Health Science Center College of Medicine. Currently, she is completing her residency at Baylor College of Medicine Baylor Scott & White Temple. She is committed to caring for underserved populations, receiving an Albert Schweitzer Fellowship where she designed and secured grant funding to lead workshops for refugee women; she also is a founding member of the TOMAGWA Healthcare Ministries Student Clinic. She serves on the Undergraduate Education Committee within Baylor College of Medicine Psychiatry Department. Celine hopes to become “a child psychiatrist who sees the whole child, cultivates agency, and offers care rooted in both science and deep human connection.”



Dr. Fayeza Malik, M.D.

Dr. Malik completed her medical education at Florida International University Herbert Wertheim College of Medicine. She is currently completing her residency at University of Miami/Jackson Health System. Prior to starting medical school, Fayeza implemented a human rights curriculum for refugee youth as a Fulbright scholar in Tenerife, Spain. She founded a Syrian refugee assistance program in South Florida and started a cooking class to support children and survivors of sex trafficking. At the NIH Undiagnosed Diseases Program, she collaborated with a multidisciplinary team to evaluate children with rare neuropsychiatric conditions and co-authored several case reports on pediatric catatonia. She also partnered with local low-income schools to evaluate the Monique Burr Foundation's child safety curriculum. As she looks toward fellowship, she hopes “to integrate clinical care with community-level prevention and research” and “bring a systems-oriented perspective that bridges patient care, education, community engagement, and cross-disciplinary collaboration.”



Dr. Gregory Morissey, M.D.

Dr. Morissey completed his medical degree at University College Dublin School of Medicine and is completing his residency at the University of Kansas (Wichita) where he has served as class representative on the Resident Education Committee. He participated in research at Laureate Institute for Brain Research and has a first-author publication on neurofeedback. Prior to medical school, Dr Morissey served in a year-long AmeriCorps position teaching and mentoring children in one of the poorest school districts in the country. He is drawn to Child and Adolescent Psychiatry as he wants “to be someone who can sit with children in their most vulnerable moments, help them and their families make sense of the chaos, and offer them steady, compassionate care.”

Dr. Ovalle attended medical school at the University of the Incarnate Word School of Osteopathic Medicine and is completing her residency at Texas A&M University where she served as co-chair on the TAMU Psychiatry Residency Didactics Committee and as a member of the TAMU Psychiatry Program Development Committee. During residency she volunteered at the Salvation Army Community Kitchen preparing and serving meals to individuals experiencing hunger. Prior to medical school, she traveled to Kenya to volunteer in hospitals, clinics and a local orphanage.
