A Note from Rabbi Javier Cattapan

Join us for Consultation on Conscience 2019



January is social action month at Beth Torah! Not in name, perhaps, but certainly because of our direct service mitzvah-centered programs: Cooking and serving meals at reStart and helping new refugees feel welcome to our country with a “Birthday Party.” (See [pages 6](#) and [8](#) for more details).

Many of us feel that our Jewish values compel us to stand up for social change in our communities, and we do it in at least two ways: By directly helping others by volunteering time, money and work to improve their situation (social action), and also by developing connections with other groups in town and around our country so that we could influence decision makers to act and make changes that will benefit those whom we are trying to help with our volunteer work (social justice).

“Consultation on Conscience” prepares for the latter. “Consultation” is the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism’s biennial social justice leadership conference. Held over three days in Washington, D.C. It is dedicated to training and empowering Jewish leaders like us to make real, lasting change at the national, state, and local levels.

As a Brickner Fellow of the RAC, I am committed to social action and social justice and would be thrilled to bring a delegation of Beth Torah members to the conference (May 19-21, 2019) with me. Four to seven people constitute a delegation and I think we can do

it! At the Consultation on Conscience, our delegation will work together to build meaningful connections (it is all about relationships!), learn and expand the skills needed to advocate for social change, deepen our knowledge on the critical issues facing our community, and lobby Congress together as a powerful collective force for change. Here are some of the highlights of the conference:

- Plenary sessions offer in-depth, Jewish conversations about pressing contemporary issues from subject matter experts.
- Workshop options are designed to meet the specific needs of congregational social justice teams. We can strategize workshop participation according to our delegation’s needs and interests.
- Time is specifically set aside for us to develop a social justice strategy that fits the needs of our congregation or community.
- We will spend time sharing, reflecting, and deepening relationships within our delegation and with members of other communities, allowing for a stronger and better future collaboration.
- Deepen relationships with other social justice leaders in your congregation, state, and movement.

I will be happy to meet you in person, for coffee or tea, and tell you more about this exciting

"Easier said than done." That's a cliché most of us have said and heard countless times throughout our lives. It crossed my mind several times during the recent visit from Dr. Ron Wolfson, who spoke to us about "Relational Judaism." Ron, as he insisted we call him, emphasized the importance of welcoming everyone who enters our building, starting conversations and telling stories. That's how we build relationships and strengthen our community. Easy enough to say, much harder, at least for some of us, to do.

I'm one for whom it's harder. During Ron's talk at Friday night services, he

assigned us each to find someone we didn't know to share some conversation for three minutes. That I managed to do quite easily, because I'm very good at following orders. But, the idea of doing that spontaneously and randomly is intimidating and I'll need to overcome that in order to pull my weight on this relational thing. It might help if you were the one who started the conversation.

On the other hand there is my wife, Linda. She is naturally outgoing and can talk to anybody about anything. But, after listening to Ron, she realized that it was not top of mind for her to start conversations with people she doesn't know well. So, now she has resolved to be more proactive about this. She just needed a little nudge.

And then there's Carol Ducak. During

Ron's talk she declared from the front row that she had to go clear to the back row to find someone she didn't know. Carol is the embodiment of being relational. Start a conversation with her about how she does it.

Wherever you are on the Barry, Linda, Carol spectrum, you can adjust your mindset to be more relational. Make that part of your commitment to Beth Torah. In the words of Ron Wolfson:

"What really matters is that we care about the people we seek to engage. When we genuinely care about people, we will not only welcome them; we will listen to their stories, we will share ours, and we will join together to build a Jewish community that enriches our lives."

Don't just say it—do it.

"When two human beings engage each other in a face-to-face encounter, relationship exists in the between. It is in that space that relationship can turn into 'engagement'. The goal of Relational Judaism is to foster the relationships that will bring people into deep, lasting engagement with the Jewish experience." *From Relational Judaism, Using the Power of Relationships to Transform the Jewish Community* by Dr. Ron Wolfson.

Dr. Ron Wolfson came to share stories, ideas and community with us in December. In a session with Beth Torah's lay leadership he shared the nine levels of relationships. He explained that relationships are formed by what happens **between**, or **in the connection**. The Hebrew term for this space is *bayn*. As there are now nine months until High Holy Days, and nine levels of relationships, I would like to share with you all, over the next nine months, the *bayns* of our existence. Look for more information about Relational Judaism at Beth Torah during the High Holy Days of 2019, but in the meantime, you can look to this space to help put Dr. Wolfson's teachings into your Beth Torah life.

The first level: Bayn Adam l'Atzmo-Self

Dr. Wolfson explains in his book that the root for the Hebrew term for prayer, *t'filah*, is *l'hitpalel*, a verb meaning to examine oneself. "The goal of Jewish prayer is not simply to praise God and ask for God's blessings. The goal of Jewish prayer is to be moved, to change one's self."

With this in mind, how do you pray when you come to services? Do you leave yourself open to the possibility that you may strengthen your relationship with yourself? No matter what age category you are in, what stage in life, or your state of mind and/or heart as you enter the synagogue doors, there is prayer, just waiting for you. At whatever level you need it to be.

Dr. Wolfson shares a nationwide study of congregational life called the FACT survey sponsored by the Harford Theological Seminary. It asked two questions of Reform and Conservative Jews: "Are your worship services joyful?" and "Is your worship inspirational?" Seventy-four percent of Reform Jews agree that their worship is joyful, the number drops considerably (58%) when Reform Jews are asked if they find worship inspirational. Getting back to the goal of prayer, when was the last time that prayer moved you?

In January, why not come to a worship service, and allow yourself to feel? Get to know more about yourself. What if you wept, laughed, swayed, or maybe even moved to dance? It would seem that the safe place of our synagogue and the safe time of *t'filah* is a wonderful time for you to explore this first level of relationships; engaging the self. I hope you will take this first step.





Career Skills & Connections Offers Free Coffee Club Every Monday


