A Note from Rabbi Javier Cattapan



Next Steps for our Worship Music

As we move into the High Holy Days planning, I would like to share with you where we stand on worship music at our congregation. As many of you know, we conducted a search for a full-time Music Director. The search committee, led by Howard Pitler, did a tremendous job in preparing the job description and posting it in every imaginable job list and website. After a two-month search, we didn't find a suitable candidate.

Due to the timing and preparation needed for the High Holy Days in late September, I am hesitant that we can be ready if we tried again over the summer to find a full-time person.

After much consideration by the staff and our Board, we decided to go a different route. We will hire two part-time individuals. One will be our Music Coordinator and the other our Choir Director. I am confident that we can find suitable candidates in the metro area. The Music Coordinator will serve as *sheliach/chag tzibbur*, worship leader. As part of our efforts to move toward a more relational approach, the MC will devote time to engage our members who have musical talent or who simply would like to be part of our worship teams. In order to continue with our tradition of having an adult choir and other ensembles, the Choir Director will be responsible for preparing all vocal ensembles for the Holy Days as well as throughout the year at Erev Shabbat and *chagim* services.

As the saying goes, "Four hands are better than two," I am trusting that having two professional musicians dedicated to our worship music will enrich and add more variety to our services.

At the time of writing, we have not identified who will fulfill these two positions, but we have some individuals in mind, and I am confident both positions will be in place on July 1st.

From now until the end of June, I am coordinating the professional musicians. Our member Lezlie Zucker, a professional musician and member of our worship services for over 20 years, has been engaged to organize and involve professional and volunteer musicians for Shabbat services. I hope that you will join us on Shabbat to experience the joy that Lezlie brings to our Shabbat services as well as the reach of our volunteers. Worship music enhances our services and makes them meaningful and engaging. I am looking forward to the next chapter for the Beth Torah community.

I want to thank Rabbi Kleinman for her willingness to step up during my illness. Laura Intfen kept everything going and kept me minimally informed; for all her quiet but essential work, I am thankful. In addition, my gratitude goes out to all the volunteer lay-leaders who have helped me make the Shabbat services less taxing on my body and voice, and to all those who sent me cards and emails and called wishing me well.

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Upcoming Changes Alert! From the CBT Board of Trustees

Our congregation values inclusivity. That includes warmly welcoming our young children to attend and participate in services. Our community encourages families to worship together, rather than diverting children away from the sanctuary. In the interest of acting on our values, at our Annual Meeting in May, the Beth Torah community passed a budget presented by the Board of Trustees. To reflect this dedication to inclusivity, and to reduce expenses, Shabbat child care costs were taken out of the 2019-2020 budget. This means the following:

- The last Friday night that Erev Shabbat child care will be offered is June 28th.

- After June 30th, Shabbat morning child care during a b'nai mitzvah will be an option for the b'nai mitzvah family to choose and sponsor.
- As usual, during High Holy Days child care will still be available.

We appreciate our long-time babysitters, Karen Boardman and Joyce Hafner, who lovingly cared for our children for over 20 years. **In their honor, a Nosh will be sponsored the evening of June 28th. During the next month, take the time to stop by the babysitting room on a Friday night and express your appreciation to these dedicated care givers.**



Several months ago the nominating committee asked me to serve as President for a two-year term. Within a 24-hour period I moved from “probably not” to a solid “maybe.” I have few higher priorities than CBT’s continued welfare and growth. My hesitancy rested on whether I still had enough gas in my mental tank to make a substantial contribution to the congregation’s future.

What took me from “maybe” to an enthusiastic “yes” was a flashback of my 25-year history with Beth Torah. My wife Amy and I got engaged in 1994 and were searching for the right congregation. Both of us were raised in small-town Conservative synagogues but were not attached to any particular movement. We heard great things about Beth Torah, but were concerned that the congregation did not own a building. At the time, CBT’s spiritual home was on the third floor of the Jewish Community Center. Our uneasiness vaporized on this first Shabbat visit. We were met with warmth, openness, and glowing testimonials from members who were so proud of their new congregation. The excitement was palpable, and a week later Amy and I joined CBT.

Both of us intended to be passive members, attending services but nothing more. During the following year, Amy became *havurah* coordinator and I chaired the Membership Committee. Much of our social life became connected with Beth Torah through our involvement in two *havurot*. In the ensuing years, we adopted two children from China, both of whom celebrated their bat mitzvahs and were confirmed in our congregation. Amy and I were worried that our Chinese daughters would be fully accepted by their religious school classmates and the membership, but that was never an issue at Beth Torah.

The decision to accept the position as this congregation’s president was the realization that Beth Torah had become the source of so much of my personal joy, growth, and learning. I’ve had the pleasure of chairing our efforts at reStart, coordinating the blood drive with Jeff Altman, and studying Torah with Rabbi Levin. I was thrilled to

see my daughter’s interest in Judaism ignite after taking a comparative religion class taught by Marcia Rittmaster.

The love this congregation bestowed on the Franklin family is overwhelming. Upon arriving home from China, we were greeted by yard signs made by Robin O’Byran that read, “It’s a Girl!” Serving as chair of the Social Action Committee, I watched new committee members create, staff, and manage their own projects.

The sacrifices of our recent leadership should be noted and commended. After serving a two-year term as President twenty years ago, Barry Katz returned to office after an unexpected blip in our succession plan. Although his stellar golf game no doubt suffered due to his congregational commitments, we at Beth Torah are better for his choice. His humility and self-effacing humor brought a welcoming spirit throughout our synagogue. I am pleased he will remain on the Board as Immediate Past President.

A friend once described Linda Zappulla as “the smartest kid in the class.” He was right. Linda possesses the ability to synthesize a variety of issues and concerns and all their implications in nanoseconds. She steadied the ship of state during a challenging presidency. Her three years of serving as Immediate Past President are complete. We hope the only boat she needs to steer now is one filled with fellow scuba divers.

As chair of the Membership and most recently Social Action Committee, I’ve witnessed the passion and dedication of our congregation. We have created meaningful and sustainable change for low income families, refugees, the area’s hungry, and began a warm interaction with Kansas City’s Muslim community. A little over five years ago, we experienced the loss of our founding rabbi and religious education director through retirement. An associate rabbi and an executive director left for various reasons. Rather than atrophy, the congregation and staff boldly stepped up and reorganized, repurposed, and rehired. Our strength and resilience is driven by a bond to each other and a commitment to sustain founding

principles and values. I am so proud to serve our membership as President.

“When two human beings engage each other in a face-to-face encounter, relationship exists in the between. It is in that space that relationship can turn into ‘engagement’. The goal of Relational Judaism is to foster the relationships that will bring people into deep, lasting engagement with the Jewish experience.” From *Relational Judaism, Using the Power of Relationships to Transform the Jewish Community* by Dr. Ron Wolfson.

Dr. Ron Wolfson came to share stories, ideas and community with us in December. In a session with Beth Torah’s lay leadership he shared the nine levels of relationships. He explained that relationships are formed by what happens **between**, or **in the connection**. The Hebrew term for this space is *bayn*. At the time I began this series, there were nine months until High Holy Days, and there happens to be nine levels of relationships. This series on Relational Judaism at Beth Torah will reveal, over the next few months, the “*bayns* of our existence.” Look for more information about Relational Judaism at Beth Torah during the High Holy Days of 2019, but in the meantime, you can look to this space so put Dr. Wolfson’s teachings into your Beth Torah life.

The Sixth Level:

Bayn Adam l’Am—Peoplehood

*“Wherever you go,
 There’s always someone Jewish.
 You’re never alone when you say you’re a Jew.
 So when you’re not home, and you’re some-
 where kind of newish,
 The odds are, don’t look far – ‘cause they’re
 Jewish, too.”*

If you know this song, it is now an earworm in your head (if you don’t know the song, head on over to <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=MJy7Jh8mxjk> and then it can be your earworm also). What is an earworm you say? It is something external that becomes part of your head.

You can try to listen or think of something else, but the earworm comes back to you every time. It is a part of you. And once you have that tune or saying in your head, there can be a million triggers to have it pop into your consciousness.

Kind of like being Jewish.

Whether it is a note on a hostel bulletin board in the Himalayan mountains announcing a Seder dinner, or an unknown person walking down the street wearing a Star of David necklace, or the sight of a *kippah* on a head in a crowd, we feel a connection to other Jews. And when there is a Jew in the news, we often feel the guilt or pride associated with the reported infamy.

Living in a part of the world where being Jewish is a rarity, there needs to be some care in our discussions of how we feel being part of a peoplehood. There are fears, tears, joys, and celebrations that only those that live Jewishly can relate to. We feel a special level of being heard when we share these emotions of being tethered to an entire People with another person here at Beth Torah.

This is where relational Judaism comes in. Dr. Wolfson comments in his book, “The challenge to create a sense of peoplehood is a formidable one indeed. It will require teaching the basic Jewish value of obliga-

tions to fellow Jews, responsibility for one another’s welfare...acting to support and connect with Jews who share in a relationship born of history, experience and destiny.”

Beth Torah is your safe place to speak Jewishly. While we teach and act in a manner here that is reflective of Jewish living, part of that is listening one on one to members of our community. When someone shares with you their form of living Jewishly, remember that Beth Torah is a safe place and there is no judgment of YOUR Jewish living experience or MINE.

Relational Judaism at Beth Torah means being the person to remind every soul who walks through our door:

*“Wherever you go,
 There’s always someone Jewish.
 You’re never alone when you say you’re a Jew.
 So when you’re not home, and you’re some-
 where kind of newish,
 The odds are, don’t look far – ‘cause they’re
 Jewish, too.

You guessed it, Educating our Future! Almost four years ago, the Board of Trustees voted to eliminate Religious School fees and move to a model adopted by many of the KC Jewish religious schools whereby a religious school education is considered part of your membership, motivating young families to try CBT first with our schools in the hopes of converting them to members AND to provide relief to the existing members. As you can imagine, this change was welcomed by most. Now we had to subsidize the cost per student which was approximately \$700+/student. This is where EoF was born, a targeted three-year-plan to help subsidize The Weiner Religious School, where we raised an aggregate of \$145,300. To give us an extra year, a dedicated EoF Task Force continued the campaign during the last fiscal year, bringing our aggregate total to \$182,100.

This coming fiscal year, we have retired the EoF campaign, partly in favor of the new High Holy Day appeal and the many other fundraising opportunities that are available to pick up the slack. If you have been an EoF contributor, it is critical that you continue to find it in your hearts to funnel your philanthropic EoF giving into other Beth Torah fundraising opportunities. EoF is gone, but the need continues and must be met elsewhere.

CBT now more than ever needs our members to recognize that with 1/3 of our membership on adjusted dues, those of us who can are needed to become Enhanced Donors, sponsor events (16th Annual Golf Classic, scholars and guests for Adult Education, Nosh, etc.), participate in Planned Giving, buy a leaf on the Tree of Life, honor your friends and family for special occasions with the various funds, and continue to give. We will be the eternal light that keeps CBT the modern Jewish house of prayer for generations to come.

Our volunteer Fund Development Committee of your fellow CBT members is going strong on the fourth year of facilitating and executing fundraising efforts. We just passed the annual budget for 2019/2020 and there is a LOT of work to do! This may sound elementary to many but if we want to defeat our deficit, the fastest way to get to a balanced budget is to bring in more members and/or FUNdraise our way through it!

Please help our committee help our community by doing a few simple things:

1. Say "yes" to CBT with your TIME (volunteer often to serve on a committee and/or LEAD an initiative, task, project, committee), TREASURE (open your checkbook), or your TALENT (come put your expertise to work or help us leverage your network to get more for CBT).
2. Influence your CBT network to get involved by attending and participating in fundraisers. If you can't be a sponsor, be an attendee!
3. Share your ideas! If you have a complaint, bring a new solution. If you have a compliment, we are all ears!

My interest is that every CBT member, whether you are brand new to our community or have been a member since the very beginning, take ownership that OUR congregation is OUR responsibility. Each of us has to do a little more with one or all of our TIME, TALENT or TREASURE to ensure we continue the excellence we all signed up to be a part of!
