A Note from Rabbi Javier Cattapan



Connecting to Judaism in 5780

Engage with Jewish values, celebrations, and spirituality. Voice your questions, discover multiple perspectives, and find what could be meaningful to you in liberal Judaism. Our new class, Introduction to Judaism, is an engaging multi-session course for anyone interested in exploring Jewish life through a Reform lens. Open to all, but this course is perfect for inter-faith couples, non-Jews raising Jewish children, spiritual seekers, and individuals considering conversion. Topics include holidays, life cycle celebrations, theology and core beliefs, Hebrew, prayer, the Bible and other sacred texts, history, anti-Semitism and the Holocaust, Zionism and Israel, the American Jewish experience, and the tapestry of the Jewish people today.

The class will begin this fall and will be taught by Rabbi Kleinman and me. Beth Torah will offer this class and will focus on making connections with each other and with our congregation. If you are already a member of our congregation and grew up Jewish, this class might not be a good match for you—we encourage you to take advantage of our other learning opportunities including our Shabbat class and the Hebrew class beginning this fall. You may still play a role, so keep reading.

Even if this class is not best for you, I need your help in identifying, encouraging and supporting those who may be a good candidate. You may ask, “Do Jews seek converts?” Centuries ago, Jews did engage in proselytizing, particularly during the Greco-Roman period of Jewish history, when thousands of non-

Jews living in Asia Minor embraced Judaism. The destruction of the Roman Empire and mortal threats against Jews who sought converts marked the end of such efforts to gain converts.

We are living in an open society and I think Judaism represents a valid religious tradition for everyone not just for those born Jewish. There is no doubt that Judaism respects the religious beliefs of others, as well as the convictions of those who choose no religion. At the same time, Judaism is an open religion that readily accepts and encourages those who look to it for fulfillment and guidance in meeting life's challenges. In recent years, the Reform movement has taken a more active approach to seek out people who might choose to become Jews. If you or someone you know might benefit from the class, please, do not hesitate to reach out to me or to Rabbi Kleinman. An interview and registration is required to join the class. See more information on page 8.

The class will answer a basic question: How do I know if Judaism is right for me? Our answer is a very Jewish answer: The best way is to learn as much as one can about Judaism and begin to practice those aspects of Judaism that most appeal to us. When talking to a prospective student, you may want to suggest one of the following ideas: If you already live with a Jewish person, encourage them to approach them and invite them to explore Judaism together, or

if they are at the beginning of their Jewish journey, invite them to seek out Jewish friends or Jewish family members, and our community, of course. Remind them that as they study and try out Jewish practice and customs at their own pace, they will become comfortable with those practices and prepare them for further steps.

Finally, it is good to remember that those taking the Introduction to Judaism class, will not be expected to convert. Our class is offered to anyone who wants to learn more about Judaism. They are most often attended by individuals considering conversion, and by interfaith couples learning together about Judaism and making

decisions about whether to have a Jewish home. Although many people do take the course as part of their process of choosing Judaism, there are no assumptions or expectations held about people taking the class. Again, those interested should contact our clergy.

Some of my most treasured memories are from teaching Intro classes, as I see myself in our students, discovering for the first time the wealth of ethical, spiritual and awesome wisdom our tradition has amassed in the last 5,000 years! I am looking forward to rediscovering them together. Join us!

Summer is a great time to socialize with friends. Everything moves at a bit slower pace. There are no blizzards or icy roads to concern us, and without school in session, shuttling kids back and forth is less frequent. However, for many of us at Beth Torah, summer is the calm prior to the storm as High Holy Day preparation moves closer.

Last year, the Board opted for a single morning service instead of early and later services for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The congregational feedback was highly favorable to this change. The most common response related to the intimacy created by the entire congregation celebrating together.

As you looked around the sanctuary this year, did you think of friends that used to belong to the congregation but are no longer here? Spending time with these friends made the holy days special. Maybe you made a point to sit with them at services, shared Erev Rosh Hashanah dinner, or celebrated life cycle events with them.

Perhaps after their kids' b'nai mitzvah and Confirmation their attachment to Beth Torah waned. A sermon from the pulpit, a personnel change, or a policy dispute that occurred years ago could have triggered the choice to end their CBT association.

It doesn't matter. What a great time to invite them to join you at any one of the events, services, or any other occasion to take another look at Beth Torah. Circumstances, priorities, and expectations change and Beth Torah might now be the perfect fit as their religious community.

Although our congregation is smaller than it was a decade ago, our commitment to being a warm, open, and diverse community has increased. The formal introduction of Relational Judaism, through our visiting scholar, Dr. Ron Wolfson, resonated with those who attended his presentation.

Our commitment to knowing each other better, and sharing our life stories, will continue this year with Rabbi Cattapan's introduction of small groups. For those members who may not feel involved enough with Beth Torah, the opportunity to interact in a positive and enjoyable way with other congregants is now available.

Great things are happening at Beth Torah. Our consistent commitment to social justice expands this year as we participate in building and remodeling homes for refugees. Larry Myer's Tikkun- KC project provides opportunities for all ages and skill levels to create permanent and comfortable housing for newcomers to America.

Our social action committee is focused on eight separate programs ranging from voter education, harvesting food, and helping families of deployed veterans. Bring your friends to Beth Torah for a first or second experience of our programs, services, events, and sense of community.

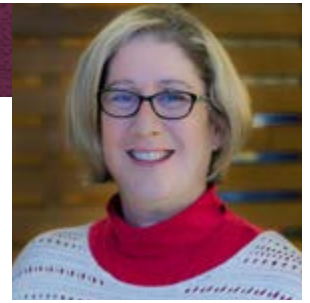

“When two human beings engage each other in a face-to-face encounter, relationship exists in the between. It is in that space that relationship can turn into ‘engagement.’ The goal of Relational Judaism is to foster the relationships that will bring people into deep, lasting engagement with the Jewish experience.” From *Relational Judaism, Using the Power of Relationships to Transform the Jewish Community* by Dr. Ron Wolfson.

Dr. Ron Wolfson came to share stories, ideas and community with us in December. In a session with Beth Torah’s lay leadership he shared the nine levels of relationships. He explained that relationships are formed by what happens **between**, or **in the connection**. The Hebrew term for this space is *bayn*. At the time I began this series, there were nine months until High Holy Days, and there happens to be nine levels of relationships. This series on Relational Judaism at Beth Torah will reveal, over the next few months, the “*bayns* of our existence.” Look for more information about Relational Judaism at Beth Torah during the High Holy Days of 2019, but in the meantime, you can look to this space to put Dr. Wolfson’s teach-

ings into your Beth Torah life.

The Eighth Level: *Bayn Adam l’Olam—World*

Every week, at the end of our worship service, we recite, “*l’taken olam b’malkhut Shaddai*” which is translated to, “to repair the world in order to bring God’s presence.” This, in a nutshell, is one of the purposes of our organized religion. Jews exist to be a “light among the nations” in order to remind the world of a truth we carry from the roots of Kabbalistic mystics. The world was broken into shards after Creation and only intentional acts from human beings can put these pieces back together to achieve some sort of wholeness. Shalom. This is *Tikkun Olam*.

Within our walls, we are so blessed to have tools that we can use together to develop this Relational Judaism with the world. Our *Bayn Adam l’Olam* takes place in the gathering of our community to participate in Tikkun KC. Bringing shelter security to a family that may have never known it before is putting a shard in its place. Our Beth Torah Park Clean Up crew comes and beautifies our yard, reducing the emissions and chemicals

needed to have our landscaping company do the same job with mowers and weed killers. Working together no matter the weather is putting a shard in place. Getting together with a small group and heading down to reStart to paint, or to cook, or to clean is putting a shard in place. There are enough shards lying around for you to act upon your vision of *Tikkun Olam*.

Our small groups will be launching this fall, and you can gather some friends and use the glue of Relational Judaism to put a shard into place. Ron Wolfson reminds us in his book, “When we teach our people that being Jewish means to be in a relationship with the world, to work for tikkun olam, we are creating a Relational Judaism that anyone would be proud to be a part of—*bayn adam l’olam*.”

Choice Through Knowledge— even at the grocery store!

Happy Summer! Even though it's quiet around the synagogue office, we have lots of great things in store for the year ahead. You may have heard about our ongoing Social Justice initiatives that include Tikkun KC with Larry Myer, Voter-to-Voter registration with Marcia Rittmaster, the Beth Torah Park Cleanup with Greg Zabosky, and Coupon Clipping for military families with Sheila Goldberg.

But did you know there are ways to make positive change in this world each time you go to the store? I've recently learned about a website and app called Goods Unite Us (<https://www.goodsuniteus.com>), which takes a look at campaign donations from major corporations and their executives. It has started to change the way I look at my own consumerism and how my dollars, while not as plentiful as those of international corporations, can make a difference.

I've learned that some of the money I spend on products I enjoy are in turn donated to politicians whose political views don't align with me. The hours and hours of research that contributors poured into this database have resulted in a few easy-to-understand statistics:

1. The breakdown of Republican vs. Democratic politicians a specific company supports (as a percentage of the whole);
2. The top five politicians they support;
3. On a scale of low-medium-high, how much this company supports campaign finance reform by not getting involved in politics;
4. What percentage of donations come from the corporation itself compared to the corporation's senior employees.

Like any quality database, you can sort the information in a myriad of ways. Are you interested in how local companies like Hallmark, AMC Theaters, or Sprint use their "free speech" (aka dollars)? Looking to find out which companies donate to Sharice Davids, Pat Roberts, or Jerry Moran? What about the plethora of candidates in the Democratic primary? You can look by company, politician, or sector. The sector feature is helpful when trying to find alternatives should you decide to change your shopping habits. I'm working on it, but it's not easy. It's hard to break a Diet Coke habit, even though I see that Coca Cola and its executives spend a lot of money influencing politics, but I can also feel good when I see that my Green Bay Packers do not contribute to politicians or PACs with significant funds. It's a difficult goal to strive for 100% political agreement when shopping, but I am trying to be more methodical about where my money goes.

In the Reform movement, we often say that we make choices through knowledge—this typically means understanding the *halacha* (Jewish law) and deciding for ourselves how to incorporate it into our lives. Here is another way we can take advantage of the immense amount of knowledge available to us today and use it in ways that support an America we can believe in.

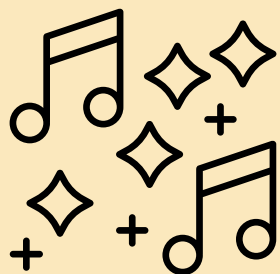

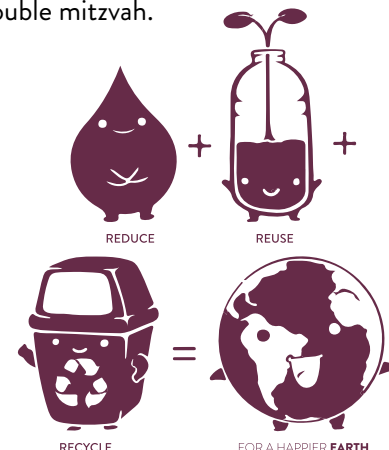


CONGREGATION BETH TORAH ETHICAL FOOD TEAM
