January 5 at 10:30 AM. Be sure to be part of this long-standing tradition at St. James—this one the last-ever on the Parkway.

St. Luke's Visits St. James

On Sunday, January 12, St. Luke's Episcopal Church will not celebrate a liturgy at their building. Instead they will come to St. James. We expect a crowd of people eager to gather with us in the name of Jesus. Our adult forum will prepare us for meetings with candidates for Bishop of the Episcopal Church of Minnesota as described below. Our 8:00 and 10:30 AM liturgies will be conducted exactly as normal, and we will share enhanced coffee hours. The purpose of this visit is for the people of St. Luke's to learn more about us as our consolidation conversations proceed.

St. Mary's Visits St. James

On Sunday, January 19, the people of St. Mary's Episcopal Church will worship with us at St. James. During Adult forum we'll discuss what we learned from meetings with Bishop candidates the prior week, and with our representatives to Convention who will cast our votes for Bishop on Saturday, January 25. Again, coffee hours will be enhanced, and we expect to be able to welcome a number of people. This is another Sunday not to be missed! As with St. Luke's visit, this visit is for the people of St. Mary's to learn more about us as our conversations proceed.

Consolidation Team Meets

St. James' Consolidation Team will meet on Tuesday, January 7. On Saturday, January 11

it meets jointly with St. Luke's Team and on Thursday, January 16 with St. Mary's Team.

Then, on Friday, January 17 they will be at St. Mark's Cathedral at 6:00 PM. And again... you are invited!

Finding Christmas lost

In early December Victor and I attended the Guthrie Theater's production of Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*. I was excited because this would be Victor's first time, and it would be the awakening of a long time Advent tradition for me when I lived in Philadelphia's environs. Every year I spent an evening at the Annenberg Center being wowed by Christmas.

The wow factor was just as great this year. The production is absolutely stunning in every way. But seeing it started me thinking about what Christmas is/was/shall be/should be/can be. Yes, I know that there is movement in Dickens' novella and in its play adaptations as the merciless, cruel Mr. Scrooge becomes the arbiter of grace for his family and for his city – and for us. But what does it say about our Christmases? About my Christmas?

I remember with great clarity Christmas moments of some 60 years ago. Gifts received. Snow falling. A wood fire heating and cheering the

house throughout the season. I remember “O Holy Night” sung every year by our church choir. And Christmas evening spent at our paternal grandparents' farmhouse with my father's five siblings, their spouses, and 19 of us grandchildren. And my grandmother putting small dishes of too little food on the table that always, some how, miraculously, became more than enough.

But then there was college. New traditions, including singing in the Muhlenberg College Choir for Christmas Lessons and Carols. And after college, working, traditions diminishing somewhat, becoming vestiges of their origins. Seminary brought work and lots of it at

Christmas. And parish ministry, well, the same. The first years were fun. But the fun seemed to decrease a little each year as I learned that all the new faces I saw on Christmas Eve were not making themselves eligible for evangelism and that I would not be seen again until 365 days later.

And the stories. The stories that we tell over and over about the animals and the shepherds and the angels and the inn and more, lost any sense of enchantment, any power to enthral me. I began to feel empty about Christmas. I know people who feel lots more alienated from the holiday than I do. But the fact remains: many of us have lost Christmas.

If I'm lucky, you will be reading this during the twelve days of Christmas. It is dated for January 1st, the 8th day of the Feast. So how has Christmas been for you? Really? Too much? Too little? Of what? Gifts?

Money? Time? Family? Friends? Depression? Love?

So how has Christmas been for you?

I think it's all about expectations. My expectations carried from childhood into adulthood were very high. It was to be the most wonderful time of the year. Today it's only a good time. But I think Thanksgiving is pretty

wonderful, too. And I feel like driving through the woods and by the horse farms near my house always makes for a wonderful day. And I love a day with friends on the lake. Love it. Maybe all of this is about differing expectations. I expect Christmastide to be magical and it turns out to be just okay.

But I've been working at changing my expectations. Instead of fretting about what is now, about how unwonderful a time, a place, a season, a holiday is, I try to focus on the moment. This moment. This time when I get a surprise hug from behind at church. Or this time when I sense that just like always, the people of St. James are faithful and full of life and we are fun.

This moment.

All of these things, in this moment. I now allow myself to smile, to even laugh, giving thanks to God for the great now. It is wonderful. It is truly magical. It is the power and the love and the beauty of God in Christ coming to us and living in us.

Maybe I need to set my expectations higher. Maybe I should expect Jesus the Incarnate One to make every moment shine with his glory. I bet He will.

Our part in selecting a new Bishop of the Episcopal Church in Minnesota

Adult Forum is the usually informal time (9:30-10:25 AM) between services Sunday mornings when grown-ups sit for conversation (sometimes pretty serious) with each other. With several major events coming up, January offers a varied menu.

Jan. 5 — 2 Christmas: Epiphany Pageant at 10:30 AM today. No formal Adult Forum topic.

Jan. 12 — 1 Epiphany: We'll talk about candidates and issues in the upcoming election (Jan. 25) of a new Episcopal bishop for Minnesota. Open meetings in the Twin Cities will hear the candidates in person and ask them questions on the 13th and 17th. We will discuss what to ask and what to listen for. Parishioners from St. Luke's will worship with St. James this Sunday, and we'll invite them to visit Adult Forum too. Tony Morley will lead discussion.

Jan. 19 — 2 Epiphany: This Sunday will continue pre-election discussion of choosing a new bishop on Jan. 25. People who heard the candidates during the week before, may report their impressions. Also, parishioners from St. Mary's may be present, specially invited to worship with us this Sunday. Tony Morley will lead discussion.

Jan. 26 — 3 Epiphany: Annual Parish Meeting for St. James today, starting at 9:00 AM. No Adult Forum.

From the Treasurer John Heintz

Financial Report: November 30, 2019

Through November, our budget is in somewhat better shape than we expected. Pledge payments were about \$7 thousand below budget, while other income was about \$12 thousand above budget.

Total expenses ran \$6,400 lower than budget. Result: an end-of-November operating deficit of \$17,779, about \$11,000 better than expected.

Our cash reserves have dropped since the beginning of the year, as expected when we budgeted an operating deficit. But they are sufficient to carry us through the end of the year and to accommodate the Vestry's spending plans through June 30th, absent any unforeseen problems. Think warm thoughts to keep utility bills down and keep those pledges up to date to help us finish the year on budget.

Onè! Respe! (Honor! Respect!)

What does it take to build a church in Haiti?

It clearly takes faith.

In March 2018 our friends in Bigonet told us they were ready to build a new church. For more than eight years Bonne Nouvellians had been worshiping in a hovel—scrap plywood, tarps, sheets of tin and crumbling cement block. All the while, people came to church. Dressed to the nines! Filled with praise. Filling the air with music, joy and yes, faith.

It takes patience.

Since earthquake destroyed their church in 2010, each month Bonne Nouvelle has taken a special collection for re-construction. Yearly cash incomes averaging less than \$500—it took eight years to collect enough gourde to pay an engineer to come up the mountain and approve a building site. Then it took months for people to carry rocks from the river—to stabilize the hillside and build the foundation.

No one asks when the church will be finished. Everyone does what they can, when they can. Patient that, someday, it will be complete.

It takes trust.

Bonne Nouvelle's leaders trust themselves, trust that people will show up when needed. The men, offering time and muscle without pay, who dug 4-5 feet deep into mountain rock—and then hefted rebar 20 feet into the air. The women who bend over charcoal fires, cooking lunch for the workers. The people who each Sunday convert this construction site back into a place of worship. They trust one another.



They also trust the people of St. James. I've lost track of the number of MoneyGrams we've sent in 2019. \$500. \$1,000. One big boost of \$3,000. Haiti Committee treasurer Kurt Hall can tell you exactly where it came from. And the people of Bonne Nouvelle tell us exactly where it's gone. Rebar, cement, washed sand, and more. Every dollar is spent, every dollar is accounted for.

It takes imagination.

Imagining a future. Imagining a friendship. Imagining how our futures can continue to weave us together—even in the midst of St. James uncertainties of where our own church will be six months from now.

All that and more is what it takes to build a church in Haiti. All that

and more is the opportunity that Sue Maas and Steve Scofield offer in the GoFundMe website they created, to help build the church in Bigonet. As I write, 22 people have contributed. The total for now is \$737. That's a ways from Sue and Steve's goal of \$5,000, but every contribution moves it closer. We purposely aim this appeal outside of St. James—inviting our own community, not to give money, but to spread the word wherever you can. Maybe you know someone who has \$10, \$20. Maybe \$100. Maybe you'd be willing to [click here](#) and send them the link. The people of Bonne Nouvelle have seemingly-unshakeable faith and patience. Trust and imagination. Who do you know who'd like to be part of that?


Our recent advent dancers led me to the image of St. James as a community of dancers—weaving our hands and bodies through the collective and individual decisions we face in this year ahead.

vigorously we look at the bright side, we all acknowledge that closing our building is hard work that inevitably, bring sadness and loss.

To share our past, collectively, Neal Cuthbert has created a space in the narthex for photos, drawings, and written word. As I write this, it’s looking pretty bare. So, please post your stories and memories. Invite friends and family once part of St. James to add to it. Bring them to church when you come on Sunday, or mail them to St. James (3225 East Minnehaha Parkway, Minneapolis 55417) marking the envelope “Stories”. Or email them to me, and I’ll make sure they’re added olson248@gmail.com.

In the weeks to come, watch for ideas (and requests for help) from Louis Hoffman, Host Extraordinaire! He’s volunteered to organize a spring-time celebration gala—date to be announced! Or better yet, email him with your own notions: hoffman.louis@comcast.net.

Collective opportunities to take care of each other abound. So, too, do the individual. Ask someone at coffee

hour—“What do you think of all this?” or “What do you think your family might do after June 30?” Keep the Consolidation Team in your prayers. Thank them for their work, or let them know what you’re thinking.

Finally, transitions involve property and finance. The individual and collective came together in our recent successful stewardship drive. Soon to come is Kerry and Vince Nelson’s offer to take inventory of our property—memorial benches, altar supplies, office equipment, etc. Let them know if you can help kjnven@gmail.com. Maybe think ahead to an eventual garage sale of items unlikely to find a home in a newly consolidated parish.

We’ve learned that the Episcopal Church of Minnesota’s (ECMN) Standing Committee and Trustees have recently developed a Property Committee that will be instrumental in decisions about St. James property and endowment. So far we know little about how they’ll be willing to engage us in that process but, on our end, we’ll continue to strive for a participatory and transparent process with them.
